

Underground movement to bank El Niño's rainfall

Gary Serrato watched as a tractor worked its way across a field of dried-up weeds, slicing the sandy dirt into orderly furrows.

The field was being readied not for a crop but for what he hopes will be a bountiful harvest of floodwater this El Niño winter. "We're going to capture as much as we can," said Serrato, general manager of the Fresno Irrigation District.

He was standing in the district's Boswell Groundwater Banking Facility near Fresno: A complex of 100 graded acres enclosed by low earthen berms. If El Niño lives up to its promise, early next year up to 10 feet of Kings River flood flows will inundate the shallow basins and slowly seep into the torn earth, replenishing growers' groundwater supplies.

With El Nino promising a wet winter, water districts across the state are working feverishly to capture as much rain as possible to recharge depleted aquifers.

A confluence of factors is focusing attention on stowing supplies underground, which is generally cheaper and less environmentally damaging than building a big dam and reservoir.

Pot farmers' pesticides poisoning forest animals

Fishers, those rare little forest animals barely larger than a big house cat, are dying from rat poisons left behind by illegal marijuana growers in California who abandon their plantations when the law closes in.

Ecologist Mourad Gabriel should know: He lives in Blue Lake, a Humboldt County town not far from the area's fast-moving hidden pot farmers. Nyxo, his pet Labrador retriever, died of a powerful rat poison last year while Gabriel was investigating the unusual deaths among fishers.

Fishers, related to the weasel family, live in forests along the West Coast from Oregon to Yosemite and the southern Sierra and are already proposed for federal protection as a threatened species. Once abundant, their populations have been declining for years as civilization closes in on their habitats.

But now Gabriel, along with colleagues at UC Davis and the Hoopa Valley Indian Reservation's tribal forestry department, have found that a variety of poisons are killing some of the fishers, although their primary enemies are still predators.

Heavenly, Northstar to open Saturday

Mother Nature is saying to heck with fall, winter is here – at least in Lake Tahoe.

Climate change may push 100 mil. into poverty by 2030

STOCKHOLM – Climate change could push more than 100 million people into extreme poverty by 2030 by disrupting agriculture and fueling the spread of malaria and other diseases, the World Bank said in a report Sunday.

Released just weeks ahead of a U.N. climate summit in Paris, the report highlighted how the impact of global warming is borne unevenly, with the world's poor woefully unprepared to deal with climate shocks such as rising seas or severe droughts.

"They have fewer resources and receive less support from family, community, the financial system, and even social safety nets to prevent, cope and adapt," the Washington-based World Bank said.

How to help poor countries – and poor communities within countries – deal with climate change is one of the crunch issues in talks on a global climate accord that's supposed to be adopted next month in Paris.

Those who say that rich countries aren't doing enough to help the poor said the report added emphasis to demands for billions of dollars in so-called climate finance to developing countries.

"The statistics in the World Bank report are suitably shocking and I hope they force world leaders to sit up and take notice," said Mohamed Adow of Christian Aid. "The Paris deal needs to support the poor and vulnerable communities to cope with unavoidable climate crises better, and to be more resilient to a changed climate."

Despite pledges to rein in emissions of carbon dioxide and other global warming gases, climate change isn't likely to stop anytime soon. Carbon emissions are expected to rise for many years as China, India and other developing countries expand the use of fossil fuels to power their economies.

But efforts to protect the poor, such as generally improving access to health care and social safety nets, and targeted measures to upgrade flood defenses and deploy more heat-tolerant crops could prevent most of the negative consequences of climate change on poverty, the bank said.

“Absent such good development, climate change could result in an additional 100 million people living in extreme poverty by 2030,” the report said.

The report referred to studies showing climate change could result in global crop yield losses as large as 5 percent by 2030 and 30 percent by 2080. It also referenced studies showing warming temperatures could increase the number of people at risk for malaria by 150 million.

K's Kitchen: Creamy, rich cauliflower soup

There are many wonderful things to embrace about the changing seasons. In the food world, it means soup.

As a vegetarian it can be frustrating to eat out and not be able to get the soup. So many places use chicken or beef broth even for what otherwise would be a vegetarian soup.

This just means having to make more soups at home. The best thing about this is having leftovers. With this particular soup, it got thicker with time. Adding water would be an option if the thickness is not to your liking. The flavors were still just as wonderful as the first night.



Cauliflower Soup with Feta

1 medium size head of cauliflower

$\frac{1}{4}$ C olive oil

2 medium leeks, white and light green parts only, coarsely chopped

5 large garlic cloves, minced

Kosher salt

1 large baking potato, cut into 1-inch pieces

1 C dry white wine

1 quart vegetable broth

3 thyme sprigs, plus 2 teaspoons chopped leaves

8 Brussels sprouts, separated into leaves or rough chop

4 ounces crumbled Feta

2 T chives, chopped

$\frac{1}{2}$ C heavy cream

Chop one-quarter of the cauliflower into half-inch florets, while coarsely chopping the rest.

In large saucepan cook the leeks and garlic in 2 tablespoons

of oil over medium heat. Add pinch of salt.

Add potato and chopped cauliflower, then wine. Cook until half the wine is gone.

Add the stock and thyme sprigs. Bring to a boil.

Simmer for about 30 minutes.

On a rimmed baking sheet toss the cauliflower florets and Brussels sprouts with remaining olive oil and a little salt. Roast at 375 degrees for 15 minutes or until lightly browned, tossing occasionally.

Mix cheese with chives and chopped thyme.

Remove thyme sprigs.

Puree soup until smooth. Slowly stir in cream.

Ladle into bowls and top with roasted vegetables and cheese mixture.
