

Opinion: Ex-SLT city manager on the outs in Wash.

Publisher's note: *This editorial is from the Nov. 6, 2015, Yakima Herald-Republic. Tony O'Rourke was city manager of South Lake Tahoe before leaving in 2012 for the Yakima job.*

Tony O'Rourke wants out of Yakima. The city manager has put in for at least two out-of-state positions. His house is on the market. He even said so – at a City Council executive session that violated state law, the legal point having been acknowledged by the city attorney.

But then, in a huff of hubris that careened into denial, O'Rourke rescinded his resignation, a move that sparked unprecedented exasperation and anger at Tuesday night's City Council meeting. The emotion-fraught verbal fracas fittingly corresponded with the flow of Election Night ballots for a new City Council that, apparently, will have to sort through a mess of the current council's and city manager's making.

We do know that the next City Council will have four new members among its crew of seven; what we don't know is whether O'Rourke will be the city manager who reports to them.

He shouldn't be. When Jan. 1 comes, Tony O'Rourke should be gone. If he isn't – and the current council shows few signs of being up to the task – the new council should perform this

dirty yet dutiful task.

Mysterious light in sky was test missile

Social media lit up Saturday evening as people reported seeing strange lights in the skies over California and Nevada.

South Lake Tahoe glitters as it turns 50

"History is what binds us."

That was just one of the sentiments expressed by South Lake Tahoe Mayor Hal Cole on Saturday night as more than 200 people came together to celebrate the city's 50th birthday.



It was on Nov. 30, 1965, that South Lake Tahoe became an incorporated city.

The milestones – some positive, some sad, all critical to the city being what it is today – were captured through video, personal stories, and the written word.

While the city is bound to have more parties at other significant markers, it is at 50 when many of those who helped establish the city are still here to tell their story. Yesteryear's visionaries aren't likely to be around for the 75th celebration. That is what made Nov. 7 special – the past, present and future were all in one room for a few hours.

It was a night to remember those who had the foresight to strive for incorporation, the recognition that the area would be better off governing itself than being saddled with decisions made 60 miles away in Placerville, and to illustrate what has occurred in these five decades and what is possible going forward.

Thirteen former or current councilmembers attended the festivities at Lake Tahoe Resort Hotel. Members of the Brad

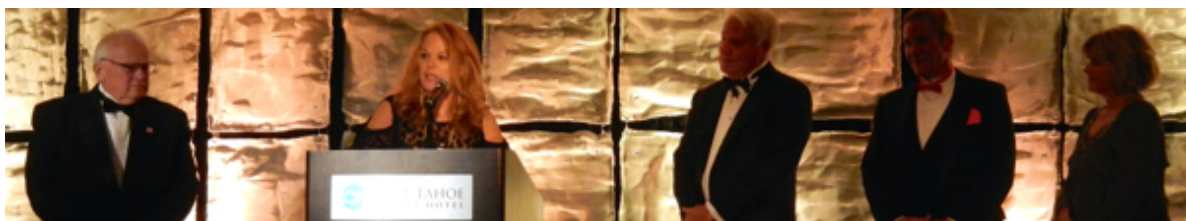
Murphy (the first mayor) and Norm Woods (councilman) families were in attendance.

The sold-out event included former and current city staff, as well as a who's who list of community members.

It was a night to better understand some of the struggles that have taken place – such as development and redevelopment, finances, the loss of local soldiers, and the Angora Fire.

It was a night to embrace accomplishments – Lakeview Commons, recreation center, environmental stewardship.

It was a night to look at the future – Lake Tahoe Wildlife Care moving into the city limits, Tahoe Mountain Lab building a hub for the untraditional work force, expanded recreation opportunities and a city that will be vibrant when the 100th celebration takes place.

Cole touched on four entities that to him have made a profound difference to this area:

- Heavenly – especially singling out how the ski resort was built by locals and had world-class events, and is still integral to the fabric of the city.

- Barton Memorial Hospital – recalling the days before there was a hospital and how it is rare for a community hospital to still be locally owned-operated.

- South Tahoe Public Utility District – for being a pioneer in treating sewage to keep Tahoe blue.
- Edgewood – to the Park family that has been key to Tahoe since the 1800s and is continuing to evolve.

Opinion: Demand better tests, not fewer schools

President Obama is in danger of squandering one of his most important legacies – better public education policies – and doing real harm to our poorest students and America's future.

Last month, the president and Secretary of Education Arne Duncan called for limiting the amount of time that students spend taking tests. It's an unfortunate and tragically oversimplified response to the challenges facing our schools – challenges made plain by U.S. test results released recently, which show that students have lost ground in math for the first time since 1990.

To improve education, parents and teachers need to know how

well our students – of all ethnic and racial backgrounds – are learning. That’s especially true in communities where schools are the best hope for escaping poverty. Parents deserve to know how schools compare with one another so that they can demand improvements where they are needed and hold schools accountable for delivering results. The same is true for principals and elected officials, to say nothing of taxpayers. That’s why accurate information on student learning is so crucial – and like it or not, high-quality testing is an essential element of that.

Bob was born in San Jose to Mona and Robert P. Rockwell Sr. on Dec. 29, 1953. The family moved to South Lake Tahoe in the early 1960s and began a long history of running motels, shops, and other businesses.

Brought up with a great work ethic, his first job was cleaning up the beach at Ski Run Marina and taking out tourists in an aluminum boat over to Emerald Bay, acting as tour guide. He was only in grade school at the time. Folks loved his enthusiasm and hearing his knowledge of the lake.

He graduated from South Tahoe High School in 1972, where he earned his "block T" letter on the ski team. Working at the drive-in theater on Glenwood was a blast for Bob. Next he managed the A&W Drive-In for his folks, then later he became the tram operator at Heavenly Valley Ski Area. As an avid skier, this was one of his favorite occupations.

He worked for South Tahoe Refuse next, and was there for over 30 years, starting at the bottom and working his way up to supervisor of the collections crew. One person's trash is another one's treasure, and boy, the treasures he would bring home. He had so many hilarious stories of his days with STR.

His contagious laugh and great sense of humor made him an unforgettable person to know. Bob was a kind, caring, generous person who went out of his way to help others, be it snowblowing the neighbors' driveways, kitty sitting, or

sharing the veggies from his garden.

He loved skiing, boating, fishing, duck hunting, camping, and every aspect of living at Tahoe. Bob especially loved boat camping in his Bayliner cabin cruiser; rising early he would troll the tranquil waters of Emerald Bay listening to the ospreys call.

Bob leaves behind his loving father, Robert P. Rockwell Sr. of San Jose; brother Eric Rockwell of New York City; sisters Linda (Del) Sessions of San Jose, Michele (Larry) Mowrey of Sacramento; and loving partner of 25 years Christy A. Prouty of South Lake Tahoe.

Buddy the dog and Ashleigh the cat will miss him as well as everyone else who had the pleasure to know him. He was well known in our community will be dearly missed by many.

Fast, free in-flight Wi-Fi is uncharted territory for airlines

As broadband Internet service becomes increasingly widespread and free in public places, it has remained, to travelers'

frustration, stuck in the slow lane on airplanes.

But with recent developments in technology, sluggish in-flight Internet speed is starting, however fitfully, to change. Still, it might not catch up to passengers' expectations, as many are accustomed to a superior Internet experience on the ground.

"The thing that they must realize is that in-flight Wi-Fi is still a very new product, and the expectation that you'll get a good, strong signal like you do at home or office needs to be reined in," said Chris McGinnis, founder of TravelSkills, a blog that focuses on the business passenger, and an inveterate user of Wi-Fi while airborne. "Airlines are partially to blame for inflating expectations."

Snow, below-freezing temps in forecast

Saturday's blue skies are going to give way to storm clouds on Sunday.

Ed board takes no action regarding superintendent

No action was taken Saturday by the El Dorado County board of education during a special meeting.

The meeting was called to discuss Superintendent Jeremy Meyers who on Nov. 5 was arrested on four misdemeanor charges related to driving under the influence. His blood alcohol level was 0.19, according to the California Highway Patrol.

Shortly before Meyers crashed his truck in Placerville he had been at the county office of education working.

This is the second DUI arrest in about a five-month period for the elected official. He pleaded no contest in the first case. That incident was also in the middle of a workday.

The board of education expects to discuss the situation further at a December closed session meeting. As elected official Meyers does not fall under traditional employee

rules.
