

Nev. lawmaker wants to ban sanctuary cities

CARSON CITY – A group associated with state Sen. Michael Roberson filed paperwork Monday for an amendment to prevent sanctuary cities in Nevada to be added to the 2018 ballot.

The filing with the Nevada secretary of state was submitted by Prevent Sanctuary Cities political action committee. Nevada has no official sanctuary cities – jurisdictions where local law enforcement limits its cooperation with federal immigration authorities – but state legislation was proposed this year to create sanctuary cities.

Roberson, R-Henderson, said the constitutional amendment is needed to prevent laws that would make Nevada a sanctuary state.

It's not just residents in the northern Bay Area who are at risk from wildfire. Millions of other Californians live in fire-prone areas and many homes were built before modern fire codes.

Buildings don't have to lie directly in the path of the flames to be at risk. The larger concern comes from something much smaller.

"During a wildfire, the major source of ignition is the wind-blown ember that lands on or near the house," says Steve Quarles of the Insurance Institute for Business and Home Safety.

Housing development proposed near Alpine Meadows

The Alpine Sierra subdivision project calls for 47 single-family residential units and five secondary dwelling units in Alpine Meadows on about 47 acres.

Public comments on the draft environmental impact report close Nov. 3.

Lot sizes would range from 0.41 to 1.0 acres, averaging 0.70 acres.

Up to five of these lots would be allowed to include separate guest facilities. The 20 lots in the western portion of the project site are proposed to include 14 halfplex sites and six custom cabin home sites.

The proposed subdivision site is located within Bear Creek Valley on the east side of Alpine Meadows Road, approximately 0.25 miles north of the Alpine Meadows Ski Resort and 2.7 miles west of Highway 89.

EDC taking its time addressing VHR concerns

If the intent was to waste 2½ hours of people's lives, the goal was accomplished.

If the intent was to educate people about the El Dorado County's policies on vacation home rentals, it was a poor attempt to do so because the only department represented at the Nov. 1 meeting was the tax collector.

If the intent was to find out what people want changed with the current policy, it was a haphazard approach that took more time than needed. Instead of allowing people to take three or five or some other arbitrary number of minutes to talk, county Treasurer-Tax Collector Cherie Raffety selected a topic and

had people speak to it. This meant the more than 70 attendees had to wait the entire time if they wanted to address each of their individual concerns.

And then Raffety, who is an elected official – not staff, ended the meeting before everyone had their say.

Many of these same people in October gave the Board of Supervisors their two cents when the electeds were in town for their annual Tahoe meeting. **Lake Tahoe News** was the lone local media outlet to cover that meeting.

It would have been more effective for Raffety to put out a survey with pointed questions as well as open ended ones to gather input. Plus, that approach would reach a greater number of people – including out of town VHR owners who can't attend a 2pm Wednesday meeting.

It was also perplexing since the elected officials are doing their own intel gathering. Raffety said the point of her meeting was to get info to bring to the supervisors for a potential ordinance revision.

El Dorado County first adopted its VHR ordinance in 2004.

Supervisors Sue Novasel and Michael Ranalli are the members of the board's ad hoc committee that is tasked with addressing the VHR issue throughout the county – not just the basin. While Tahoe is a problem, the Apple Hill area also has a great number of short-term rentals.

Those two have met with staff twice and plan to conduct public meetings in the future, though they may not occur until after the new year.

Novasel told *Lake Tahoe News* those meeting will include all appropriate departments “and anyone else we need to sit down with the public to have these discussions.”

At the meeting on Wednesday many of the complaints were the

same ones people in South Lake Tahoe have – trash, noise and parking. The frustrations are so great that some called for moratorium, much like the city is on a path to enact.

Most who spoke were against VHRs in residential neighborhoods, saying this is a commercial use of a home. Legally, though, that argument is not valid. Still, the county could ban these types of rentals if so desired.

While VHR and real estate industry reps were in the audience, they did more listening than talking.

Opinion: Bump at the pump wasn't necessary

California already has some of the highest gas taxes and worst roads in the country. As of Nov. 1, our gas taxes are second to none.

The largest gas tax increase in California's history took effect Wednesday. Motorists will now be paying an additional 12 cents per gallon of gasoline and 20 cents per gallon of diesel fuel as a result of Senate Bill 1, the \$5.2 billion

annual transportation tax proposal passed earlier this year.

The frustrating thing is that we didn't have to take a single penny from Californians in new taxes to fix our roads. But after years of diverting billions of transportation dollars to ridiculous pet projects like the high speed rail, we're now left paying for the same service twice.

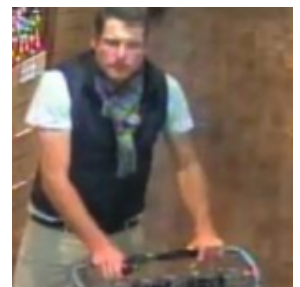
So how are the people supposed to believe that this time, the new gas tax money collected will actually be spent on transportation when 30 percent of the new funds have already been allocated to non-road projects like state parks and mass transit?

Also frustrating is the timing of the gas tax increase. It's no coincidence that Nov. 1 is the day when California retailers begin switching from summer to the less-expensive winter gasoline. Winter blends usually run about 12 cents less per gallon than summer blend. Essentially, the switch to winter blend will be even with the gas tax increase, so Sacramento politicians are hoping consumers won't notice the bump at the pump.

This was not the only option. Republicans developed a transportation plan that would have provided funding without raising taxes. But apparently we're in a legislative contest to see how expensive we can make staple goods and how unlivable we can make this state for the poor and middle class. We aren't taxing champagne and caviar. Transportation is a basic need to live and work and raise a family.

- 23 bottles of Caymus 2013 Special Select Cabernet, valued at \$165.70 per bottle
- 2 bottles of Stag's Leap 2014 SLV Cabernet, valued at \$157.13 per bottle.

The suspect is described as a white male, approximately 6-feet tall, 180 pounds, and wearing flip flops.

Americans retire later, die sooner, sicker in between

The U.S. retirement age is rising, as the government pushes it higher and workers stay in careers longer.

But lifespans aren't necessarily extending to offer equal time on the beach. Data released last week suggest Americans' health is declining and millions of middle-age workers face the prospect of shorter, and less active, retirements than their parents enjoyed.

Here are the stats: The U.S. age-adjusted mortality rate—a

measure of the number of deaths per year—rose 1.2 percent from 2014 to 2015, according to the Society of Actuaries. That's the first year-over-year increase since 2005, and only the second rise greater than 1 percent since 1980.
