

Squaw applies to build on-mountain coaster

Squaw Valley wants to build a coaster similar to what Heavenly Mountain Resort has at the top of the gondola.

The Timberline Twister would be near the base of the resort between the Far East and Red Dog chairlifts in an area that is zoned for this type of use.

The resort is in the preliminary stages of getting this built. Several agencies need to approve it, including Placer County, Squaw Valley Fire Department, Lahontan Regional Water Quality Control Board, and Placer County Air Pollution Control District.

The dissenters are already lining up.

“Does KSL really think Tahoe needs another manmade

attraction?" Tom Mooers of Sierra Watch asked in a press release. "Aren't the mountains and the lakes attractive enough already?"

To the visiting public, the answer to the second question would be "no" – at least if Heavenly is any indication. The South Shore resort has increased its non-winter offerings on the mountain, to which people are saying yes to.

Andy Wirth, president and COO of Squaw Valley Ski Holdings, told *Lake Tahoe News*, "Unsurprisingly, Sierra Watch continues to try to mislead the community with the deliberate exaggerations and contrivances they've concocted."

The ride is not a traditional roller coaster like something at Six Flags. They are closer to the ground, might have a small loop, are scenic in nature, and are not loud. They are gravity powered for the most part.

Summer recreation is a growing trend at ski resorts as they try to become year-round destinations. Activities outside of winter sports also helps them as climate change takes hold and in normal years cuts the season short.

Heavenly's coaster was offline this summer because it was severely damaged from the record snowfall last winter. Squaw plans to work with industry officials to help prevent the same outcome with its coaster.

Park City axes volunteer ski patrol program

"As our resort has grown significantly over the past few years, and in order to deliver our vision for the guest experience, we have decided to staff and further develop our patrol program using only employees and eliminating the NSP volunteer patrol program," the message states.

The Trump administration announced Tuesday that it was winding down the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival program, or DACA, which provided temporary resident status for immigrants brought to the United States illegally as children. The law affects 13,000 in Nevada, many of whom work in some of the state's many leading casinos.

Dining program helps Tahoe-Truckee students

More than 40 restaurants are participating in the Excellence in Education Foundation's Dining for Schools fundraising program this year.

Each cardholder receives 50 percent off an individual dinner entrée at participating restaurants in the Truckee and North Tahoe area. Some restrictions apply.

The Tahoe Truckee Excellence in Education Foundation is a private, a nonprofit organization that was created to enhance public education within the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District. The foundation's mission is to raise money and provide grants, resources and unique partnerships to benefit students, teachers and the overall educational community.

Dining for Schools cards are available starting Sept. 15 for \$50 per card, and are non-transferable, with all proceeds benefiting the Excellence in Education Foundation. Cards are valid Sunday through Thursday only (holidays excluded) from Sept. 24-Dec. 14 and April 15-June 14.

Several restaurants offer an extended period that makes the card valid from Jan. 7-April 5. Cards may be used an unlimited number of times at any participating restaurant during the valid period.

Campgrounds in EDC to be renovated

K's Kitchen: Butternut squash-black bean burrito

Some form of a burrito or taco is something I seem to eat on a weekly basis. I change up the concoctions based on what I have in the house.

Lately I have been loving the butternut squash and black bean combination. Then I go from there. While it can be a pain to deal with the butternut squash in terms of peeling it, the flavor is so worth it. There really is no substitute.

I used tequila because I've had it in the cupboard forever and decided I wanted to get rid of it. It does add a distinct taste. If you don't have any, use fresh lime juice. Start with a quarter cup and go from there.

The little peppers are nice because you can get more color into a dish than just using a single bell pepper. They also seem to be a little sweeter.

Butternut Squash-Black Bean Burrito

Butternut squash, peeled and cubed

1 small yellow squash, chopped

1 small zucchini, chopped

8 mini bell peppers, chopped

Olive oil

1 bunch cilantro, rough chop

$\frac{1}{2}$ C tequila

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp garlic salt

1 tsp cayenne pepper

1 tsp cumin

1 tsp turmeric

2 15 ounce cans black beans, drained

Tortillas

Cheese, shredded

Salsa

Coat large sauce pan with oil. Add butternut squash. Cook until almost soft enough to eat. Add yellow squash, zucchini and peppers. Cook about 5 minutes. Add tequila, cilantro and other spices. Then add beans. Cook until heated through. Adjust seasonings to your liking.

Heat tortillas. Fill them like a taco or burrito. Cheese and salsa are optional.
