Cat-kitten adoption fee reduced for another month

El Dorado County Animal Services is extending a temporary reduction on adoption fees for kittens and cats through the

end of October.

The fee to adopt a cat or kitten through the El Dorado County Animal Shelters, which is normally \$80, will be \$40 through Oct. 31.

The \$40 feline adoption fee includes vaccinations, health exam, spay/neuter, microchip and de-worming (if needed).

“The kittens and cats are also litter box trained and socialized, so they are ready to go,” Henry Brzezinski, chief of Animal Services, said in a press release.

According to Brzezinski, the discounted fee on feline adoptions which began this summer was extended because of the late kitten season and a continued impact on the shelters with large numbers of cats and kittens.

The animal shelters are open Monday through Saturday from 9:30am-noon and 1-4pm and are located at 1120 Shakori Drive in Meyers and 511 Placerville Drive in Placerville.

There must be something about Oct. 5 because in 2010 Heavenly Mountain Resort received about 5 inches of snow and this year it tallied about the same amount by 11am Wednesday.

All Lake Tahoe ski resorts are covered in the white stuff, with Kirkwood early on boasting of about close to a foot of snow. Farther south, Mammoth had more than a foot from this quick storm. Both resorts last had people schussing down their slopes in July.

With it dumping hard Wednesday night, most Tahoe resorts today

are reporting about a foot and a half of snow on the ground.

While storm totals will increase as the day goes on, forecasters do not anticipate there being enough accumulation for resorts to open this month. A few years ago people were skiing before Halloween. Still, many Tahoe resorts are continuing with their pre- or near Thanksgiving opening dates.

With record snowfall a year ago, forecasters are saying it could be another doozy of a year. The National Weather Service says La Nina conditions are returning to the area.

Homewood ski area's final EIR/EIS up for review

Homewood Mountain Resort's final EIR/EIS was released this week, with meetings on the proposed project set to begin next week.

JMA Ventures, the San Francisco company that owns the West Shore ski area, wants to remake the resort into a destination. The project calls for a mixed-use base on the north area of the resort, a residential base on the south end, a mid-mountain lodge, and support facilities in the upper ski area.

Comments on the environmental document should be made by Oct. 12 so they can be part of the Oct. 13 6pm Placer County North Tahoe Regional Advisory Council meeting at the north base lodge at Homewood.

On Oct. 18 at 10:05am at Granlibakken in Tahoe City the Placer County Planning Commission will discuss Homewood.

TRPA's Advisory Planning Commission will take up the topic Nov. 9 at 9:30am in Stateline.

Dates for the TRPA Governing Board and Placer County Board of Supervisors to hear the Homewood proposal have not been set.

There have been many documentaries about comedians on the road, comedians who've performed overseas entertaining the troops, and comedians doing their act with some kind of back-story, but never have I seen a documentary about a comedian

who confesses that he's never quite "made it."

By that I mean a household name like a Robin Williams, a Sarah Silverman or even a Seth Meyers.

Bob Zany is well known within the comedic circle and never seems to have a shortage of work when it comes to getting booked either as a stand up or getting parts in movies. But as I've commented on numerous times there's no rhyme or reason getting famous in the comedy world because as much as talent plays a large part of it, there's also a lot of luck too.

Oh sure, good management, publicists and agents help, but it's still a crapshoot.

Consider this: Zany got his first break as a kid on "The Gong Show" back in 1977 only to get pulled off by a man dressed as a nun. As Zany described it,

"It was horrible. I was a funny kid in high school but after 'The Gong Show', it took me 10 years of work to get an act and pull it off."



Zany's documentary chronicles not just his ups and downs throughout his career, but also others who have done quite well and have branched out as writers, actors, performers and those who have earned a good living in comedy. Interviews with more recognizable names lend their talents to Zany's documentary. Some of those include interviews with George Wallace, Carrot Top, Ralphie May, Frank Caliendo, Fred Willard, Kathleen Madigan, Judd Apatow, Bob & Tom, Rick Messina and scores of others.

A good example of the Zany dichotomy would be the time he beat

out Carrot Top on "Star Search," and now Carrot Top is making a mint from his shows in Vegas, then cut away to Zany doing a one-nighter somewhere in the Midwest.

Zany has done more movies though than Carrot Top, if that's any conciliation. He appeared with Matt Damon in "The Informant!" and opposite Linda Blair in the lesser known, "Up Your Alley." His latest "23 Minutes To Sunrise" is slated for release next year and stars Eric Roberts and Nia Peeples.

Zany is also a semi-regular on the nationally syndicated "Bob and Tom Show" with "The Zany Report" (heard locally on my KRLT radio show every Tuesday morning). "Close But No Cigar: Bob Zany" is directed by Jay Kanzler who also directed Zany in "23 Minutes To Sunrise." Zany's also done a lot of work on the small screen having appeared on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno," the American Comedy Awards, "The Drew Carey Show", "Roseanne", "George Burns' Comedy Week", "Life in the Fat Lane", "Rodney Dangerfield's Really Big Show", Showtime's "Full Frontal Comedy", "Evening at the Improv", "Caroline's Comedy Hour", "Stand-Up Spotlight", "Star Search", and 17 years with The Jerry Lewis Telethon for The Muscular Dystrophy Association.

"Close But No Cigar: Bob Zany" screens Oct. 9 at 6pm with Zany and director Kanzler in attendance. This is a one-time only screening.

I gave it 4 out of 5 bagels in part because I laughed and cried in several of the same scenes.

Tickets are \$25, which also includes a beverage and popcorn. Proceeds benefit The Pet Network for all those dogs and cats that need a home. The movie is 21 and over as there will be a Champagne reception following the screening at the Heavenly Village Cinema in South Lake Tahoe.

Kindertown granted reprieve until November hearing

El Dorado County Superior Court Judge Warren Stracener has ruled there is no harm to the public to keep Kindertown day care center open until next month's final hearing.

The South Lake Tahoe facility has been embroiled in legal issues for more than two years. The state Department of Social Services keeps trying to close the facility.

The latest set of seven citations owner Maria Barrows-Crist is fighting includes a youngster being able to get out of the center who was later found a few blocks away walking along Highway 50.

The 41-page decision by Stracener grants the stay until the Nov. 18 hearing.

"He says there is an issue regarding the severity of the penalty imposed by the (state) department," attorney Mike

McLaughlin said of Stracener's most recent decision.

Next month Stracener can agree with the state that revocation of Barrows-Crist's license is appropriate, a lesser penalty or no action.

Opinion: Why Las Vegas should be part of Arizona

Las Vegas, we need to talk.

We've known each other a long time. I'm a proud native Nevadan. My family has been kicking around the Sagebrush State since 1881.

But there comes a time when you have to set personal history aside and do what's best for the community. That moment has arrived.

It's time for Clark County to secede from Nevada and attach itself to Arizona. Call it a native son's modest proposal.

I know it sounds irrational, but hear me out. It's the only reasonable way for Southern Nevadans to ensure their future economic prosperity. And the relationship is not without historical precedent.
