Peanut-allergy death at Camp Sacramento prompts lawsuit

The parents of a 13-year-old girl with a peanut allergy who went into shock and died after eating a night-time snack at Camp Sacramento have filed a wrongful death lawsuit against the city.

Louis Giorgi and his wife, Joanne, charged in the suit, filed Friday in Sacramento Superior Court, that information had been conveyed “in writing and in person numerous times” to camp operators about their daughter Natalie’s peanut allergy. The girl was “conscientious about avoiding foods that contained peanuts or peanut by-products” and there were other children at the camp who shared the same allergy – a fact known to camp personnel, according to the lawsuit.

“Obviously it’s something we find no joy in pursuing,” Louis Giorgi said of the lawsuit, “but it is consistent with our approach to accomplish the goal to help raise awareness of people, to pay attention to this and know it can be fatal. We need to take simple steps to protect all of our children. There can never be another Natalie. And there should never be another Natalie. It can be prevented.”

Natalie Giorgi went into an anaphylactic shock July 26 after eating a Rice Krispie treat during a hula hoop contest on her family’s last night of a four-day vacation at the popular, city-owned Camp Sacramento facility near Lake Tahoe that has been visited by untold thousands of families since it was founded in the 1930s.

UC admission rates fall, foreign students increase

When Marcela Sosa opened her email last month and saw the “congratulations” message from the University of California, Berkeley, she was so shocked that she jumped out of her chair.

“I didn’t even think I was going to get in,” the St. Francis High School senior said. “I had always placed it above me. ... It makes me proud that I put in the hard work.”

Sosa is one of the lucky few to be accepted in the most exclusive admissions class ever at one of the state’s most elite colleges.

Even as the University of California accepted a record number of freshman for fall 2014, admission rates at its most selective campuses reached new lows. Huge increases in the number of applicants, changing admissions processes and a growing emphasis on out-of-state and international students are driving them down.

Preliminary UC admission data released Friday morning showed a record 86,865 freshmen accepted this year, an increase of 4.8 percent from 2013. The overall admission rate dropped slightly, but rates plunged at the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses, long the system's most selective, dipping below 20 percent for the first time.

K's Kitchen: Spicy cauliflower satisfies

Cauliflower used to be one of my least favorite vegetables. But like so many veggies, it's all about how it is cooked and seasoned.

Much like broccoli, cauliflower is usually cut into florets and then cooked. The recipe below cooks the entire head of cauliflower before cutting it into pieces to serve. For one, this makes for a different type of presentation. It would also allow people to take as much as they like. The problem could be that those who like this concoction may take more than their fair share.

It is so incredibly easy to make that this would be a good dish for kids to start with or have that novice cook help with. The only tricky part for kids would be cutting off the stem, so that would be better for an adult to handle.

You are bound to have leftovers of the marinade. It can be used on other veggies or meats or fish. Or go get more cauliflower.

The nice is this is healthy because yogurt is used instead of sour cream. Guilt free, good eating is always something to savor.



Spicy Cauliflower

1 T olive or vegetable oil

1 head cauliflower

1½ C plain Greek yogurt

1 lime, zest and juice

2 T chile powder

1 T cumin

1 T garlic powder

1 tsp curry powder

2 tsp kosher salt

1 tsp black pepper

Preheat the oven to 400 degrees. Lightly grease a small baking sheet with oil.

Trim stem and leaves from cauliflower.

In a medium bowl, combine all of the other ingredients.

Put cauliflower in the bowl to cover it with mixture. Use hands or spatula to cover thoroughly. Excess marinade can be stored in the refrigerator in an airtight container for up to three days.

Place the cauliflower on the prepared baking sheet and roast until the surface is browned with a crust on top. It will take 30 to 40 minutes.

Expect yellowjackets, mosquitoes to arrive early

Flying critters may become problematic sooner this year in the Lake Tahoe Basin.

With temps being in the 60s for much of last week and the basin coming off a relatively dry winter, it means yellowjackets could be in abundance.

And despite the lack of water, it's impossible to completely skip mosquito season.

Vector control is already suggesting people get their traps out for the yellowjackets.

"We are expecting a little more activity this year. Because of the dry winter a queen can survive the winter," Karen Bender with El Dorado County Department of Environmental Health told *Lake Tahoe News*.

Each queen can have a colony of 5,000 wasps. (Yellowjackets are a wasp, not a bee.)

This area had a huge influx of the insects late last summer. Getting rid of the queen now can help prevent problems later on.

Trapping the bees is the easiest way to rid them from a residence or business. Traps, though, need to be set away from any entrances to a structure so the yellowjackets don't fly in.

If people have a hive, vector control will come spray. Vector control does not necessarily get rid of the hive, nor do employees do anything with nests that are indoors. El Dorado County residents pay \$6 a year via property taxes for vector control, so home visits are free.

Most often hives are underground, under a deck or in the eaves. The underground ones are the most difficult to see because they could be under leaves or dirt. Step on one, though, and the stings will let you know you hit the jackpot.

When it comes to mosquitoes, Bender said her offices wants to know if people are getting bit. That way they can locate the

standing water and treat it.

“There’s not a lot of water, but what we’re seeing right now is a higher concentration of (mosquito) larvae that we are treating,” Bender said. “We haven’t seen any flying mosquitoes.”
