

Douglas County doctor set to be paroled faces murder charges in Arkansas

A former Douglas County emergency room doctor, scheduled to be released Sunday from Nevada on second-degree kidnapping charges, was charged Friday with capital murder in the death of the ex-husband of the woman he kidnapped.

Arkansas authorities will seek the extradition of Richard Conte, 61, to face murder charges in the May 18, 2002, deaths of Carter Elliott, 49, and his employee, Timothy Robertson, 25, in Conway, Ark.

Both Conte and Elliott had been married to Lark Gathright-Elliott. Conte's marriage to her in 2001 lasted three months.

A month after the pair were slain in Arkansas, Conte kidnapped Gathright-Elliott from Utah and took her to his Clear Creek Canyon subdivision home. A contract physician with Carson-Tahoe Hospital, he drugged her. Sheriff's deputies rescued her.

Conte pleaded guilty in 2003 to second-degree kidnapping and to illegally administering a controlled substance and received a 15-year sentence.

Opinion: Football field donors recognized by LTUSD

The excitement at South Tahoe High School was palpable Thursday, as athletes, coaches, donors, and staff members poured in to celebrate the completion of the artificial turf field. The 44-year-old stadium has undergone major renovations since June and the South Tahoe Vikings will play the first game under the lights next Sept. 2 against Fallon.



“This renovation project will revitalize our programs and instill a renewed sense of community spirit,” Superintendent Jim Tarwater said. “We are so proud and appreciative of how members of this community have stepped up to help make this a reality”.

A Buy-a-Brick campaign began in May, with over 100 bricks purchased to date. The bricks will be installed at the new concession stand this fall.

Kiwanis of South Lake Tahoe has pledged \$35,000 for the lights and Tony & Diana Gooding and the Gooding Family Foundation have contributed over \$30,000.

The fundraising efforts were spurred along in July when Heavenly Mountain Resort and the South Tahoe Alliance of Resorts challenged the community to match their donations of \$10,000 each.

That match came in August, when Barton Health and John Cefalu stepped up with a match of \$10,000 apiece. John Cefalu is the secretary/treasurer of Barton Health board of directors and husband of school board member Judy Cefalu. Stephen Bannar, doctor with Tahoe Orthopedics & Sports Medicine, also contributed \$5,000. Barton Health continues its history of supporting local schools through various health grants and now through this generous donation, which demonstrates their commitment to building a healthy community.

South Tahoe High School continues to be transformed, and the renovated stadium is a welcome addition. \$1.5 million is needed to complete Phase I of the renovation. To date, \$1,332,753 has been raised. The district earmarked \$1.1 million of developer fee funds for this project and applied for a \$92,000 tire-derived product grant from California. STHS Principal Ivone Larson is also applying for a \$50,000 grant from Field Turf, the manufacturer of the artificial turf.

ADA bathrooms, concession stand, and fencing should also be completed this building season. However, additional fundraising is needed to complete Phase II, which incorporates new bleachers and a press box.

California board looking at ways to collect unpaid taxes

A state tax board is examining more aggressive ways of persuading residents to pay taxes on out-of-state purchases, from sifting through shipping records to requiring tax preparers to ask clients if they bought goods online.

The five-member Board of Equalization, which oversees sales and use tax collection, contemplated such ideas this week while discussing unpaid taxes. Long-standing law requires California residents to pay "use tax" on out-of-state purchases.

Board researchers estimate that \$2.3 billion, or 5 percent, of sales and use taxes went uncollected during the fiscal year that ended June 30, 2010. Use taxes account for \$1.2 billion a year, they said.

California has debated online sales tax collection for years, but the issue reached a political peak this summer after Gov. Jerry Brown signed legislation aimed at forcing out-of-state retailers to collect California sales taxes. Amazon.com has already contributed \$5.25 million toward a signature drive to upend the law, Assembly Bill X1 28.

The Seattle-based retailer has not collected taxes so far on California purchases, believing that it remains exempt because it severed ties with "affiliates" who previously referred customers to its website. Under a 1935 law, Californians still owe use tax on out-of-state purchases, though few pay it.

The most controversial items proposed by Board of Equalization staff were pilot projects in which the state would sift through shipping records and marketing data to determine which

residents have probably purchased goods out of state.

The idea is to identify Californians most likely to owe use tax, avoiding the need to blanket all residents with appeals to comply with the law. Board aides emphasized the state would inform residents of their responsibility rather than send itemized bills.

Still, it would mark the most direct approach the state has taken in contacting individual consumers. Since 2004, the state has offered taxpayers a way to voluntarily report use tax on personal income tax forms, but it has never communicated individually with consumers.

Placerville voters to have a say in future of redevelopment

A small group of Placerville redevelopment opponents qualified a referendum asking the City Council to repeal the town's redevelopment plan or put the matter to a public vote.

About eight people circulated petitions on behalf of Save Hangtown from Redevelopment and Eminent Domain (SHRED), said Sharlene McCaslin, one of the group's leaders. They began the effort after the council adopted a plan in May.

"We were forever hopeful that the city would not pass it," McCaslin said.

The group opposes the potential for eminent domain – despite the plan's restrictions on its use – and questions its financial benefits.

"The city is spending money we don't have," McCaslin said.

The group submitted signatures of a tenth of the city's registered voters, which were verified by the El Dorado County Elections Department.

Nevada small businesses need access to cash, agency says

Federal funding in Northern Nevada could mean hope for small businesses, officials from the Small Business Administration said Wednesday during a visit to the region.

With Nevada's unemployment rate hovering between 12 percent and 13 percent, small businesses and innovation remain important economic drivers.

The Small Business Administration (SBA) has increased loan guarantees nationally for small businesses by \$45 million this year, opening up credit that otherwise would not be available, said Elizabeth Echols, a regional administrator for the SBA. The agency also will give \$1 million to the Rural Nevada Development Corporation, which will act as an intermediary lender to small businesses, today.

The availability of small business credit is essential to stirring motion in the local economy, Echols said. Small businesses often can't grow because they don't have capital needed to invest in equipment and expansion efforts, she said.

"As I've been touring around Northern Nevada, the number one thing I hear from small businesses is that they need access to capital," Echols said.
