Firefighters gaining control on Geiger Grade Fire

The Bain Street Fire on Geiger Grade near Toll Road is about 40 percent contained this evening and full containment is expected by Tuesday, according to fire officials.

The blaze scorched about 600 acres in steep terrain Sunday afternoon, and fire officials expected containment of the fire on Tuesday.

Fire officials said that about 40 percent containment of the Bain Street Fire was reached Sunday evening.

Onlookers were being asked to stay out of the area and the Nevada State Patrol closed the unimproved area of Toll Road, near the fire, to keep onlookers out.

Officials also asked motorists who had to travel on roads near the fire to use extra caution because fire crews and apparatus are working in the area.

Fire investigators have determined the fire was human caused and are in the process of questioning witnesses and suspects.

"From the onset of the fire, conditions were extreme; all of the elements that make for a difficult fire attack were in place," Reno Fire Department Battalion Chief Tim Spencer said Sunday. "Crews (Saturday night) did a great job of protecting structures from the fast moving and erratic fire. We made large strides with constructing hand and dozer lines which complimented a highly effective air attack."

No structures have been lost and no injuries have been reported.

Wildlife thrives on a N. Nevada desert island

In a lake that's arguably one of the most unique in the world, it's a special place in its own right.

Anaho Island, located off the east shore of Pyramid Lake, is a volcanic formation studded with odd-shaped tufa deposits.

It's one of the few American white pelican nesting colonies in North America. This year, thanks to plentiful water and lots of fish for food, four times the number of pelican chicks were produced than were last year.

A desert island in a desert lake, it teems with life – both feathered and scaled.

"This island is really amazing," said Donna Withers, a refuge specialist with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Withers, who spends her time on the island studying pelicans and other inhabitants, said this year was an important one for Anaho.

That's because like other places, Anaho benefited substantially from a big winter that left a huge mountain snowpack, swelling the region's rivers and streams and raising the levels of lakes and reservoirs.

One result was a huge spawning run for Pyramid Lake's cui-ui fish, a primary food source for pelicans. A big year for cui-ui translates to a big nesting year for pelicans.

After only about 500 pelican chicks were produced during nesting season last year, roughly 8,000 adult pelicans converged on the island this spring and summer, producing about 2,000 juveniles, Withers said. The adults hung around in large numbers, producing and protecting their young because of the presence of plentiful food.

"With the amazing cui-ui run we had, that success will translate to the pelicans," said Beverly Harry, environmental manager for the Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe.

"It's an amazing relationship," Harry said. "The pelicans have always been here. This is their home."

This is not to say adult activities are not taking place. The Rum Bar is right on the beach, offering up a slew of cocktails that make you want to sing a Jimmy Buffet tune. Food is served a few steps away in a permanent structure.

For those who didn't bring their water toys, ones are available for rent. Personal watercraft is available and people are in the air parasailing.

Tour boats dock here, too – like Harrah's Tahoe Star and the Bleu Wave.

A game of beach volleyball is being played, while others toss a football.

California leaning toward returning to June for primary election

Tired of presidential candidates treating California like an ATM, raising vast sums of money here but spending it in states where campaigns cost less and matter more, state officials four years ago agreed to hold the 2008 primary in February.

The early date, they hoped, might focus more attention on the Golden State. "Now California is important again in presidential nominating politics," Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger said at the time.

But more than 20 other states moved their primaries up, too, and California, if not the afterthought it was in previous elections, was marginalized yet again.

Now, Gov. Jerry Brown is expected to sign legislation moving next year's presidential primary back to June, consolidating it with the statewide primary election.

"We've learned that shifting a date doesn't matter," said Jaime Regalado, executive director of the Pat Brown Institute of Public Affairs at California State University, Los Angeles. "Only if we had a more competitive balance between the two parties, then I think we would play a larger role ... Then they simply wouldn't drop in, parachute in to get money, and leave."

Assembly Bill 80, by Assemblyman Paul Fong, D-Cupertino, to

shift the primary election to June, moved through the Legislature with bipartisan support, though some Republicans said they voted for it reluctantly only because of the cost savings involved.
