

Man dies from injuries in Nifty Fifty Trolley incident

John Hunsberger, 60, of South Lake Tahoe died from the injuries he sustained this month when he stepped from a Nifty Fifty Trolley, according to police officials.

The incident occurred July 11. Hunsberger died at Renown Medical Center in Reno on July 15.

He is the fourth person this year to die in a traffic related accident in South Lake Tahoe.

To help combat traffic incidents, South Tahoe officers will be out in force in the Al Tahoe neighborhood this coming week.

Between July 11-24 South Lake Tahoe police officers conducted a concentrated traffic enforcement program within the Tahoe Keys neighborhood as part of its Neighborhood Traffic Enforcement Program. During that time, 54 traffic stops were conducted by officers, with 10 citations written for speed, 17 for stop sign violations, three for other traffic violations and 37 written warnings were issued.

Hot August Nights revs up for 25th year of classic car fun

Twenty-five years ago, Wolfman Jack took to the stage in the

parking lot at the Reno-Sparks Convention Center, and Hot August Nights was born.

“When Wolfman Jack got on that stage, the crowd went crazy. Everybody went nuts,” said Willie Davison, event co-founder. “That first night was something. We had to get a hold of that tiger by the tail. It was unbelievable.”

While only about 3,000 people were expected, Davison said 10,000 people showed up that first night and emptied a Coors truck loaded with a hundred kegs of beer. That was Aug. 1, 1986.

Davison said people jumped at the chance to relive the good times, classic cars and rock n’ roll from their high school years in the late 1950s and early 1960s. Hot August Nights drew 28,000 people for three days that first year in 1986, nearly three times more than expected. Today, it’s the biggest event in Reno and Sparks.

way to explore global destinations as well as their own backyards.

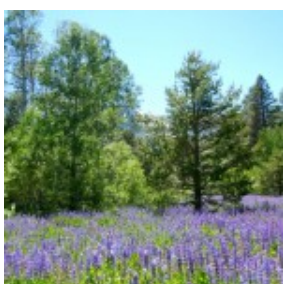
- Chevis Hosea has been hired as Squaw Valley's vice president of development.

Lupine dotting South Shore landscape

It wouldn't stop. The lupine just kept going on and on and on.

Instead of pedaling through our favorite patch of wildflowers two weeks ago, we walked our bikes because the water on the trail was midway up our calves.

The appropriate superlative has not been created to describe this lush, picturesque, tranquil, gorgeous and mesmerizing sea of purple.

What is spectacular about the field of lupine is how much of it there is this year. All this water is allowing flowers to pop up in places not before seen as well as in greater quantities.

We aren't ever quite sure how to get to the lupine because of all the trails that exist in this area. That's also one of the fun things about riding mountain bikes on the north side of Fallen Leaf Lake – all the routes make it an adventure each time.

One of the benefits of all the water was not too many mosquitoes were out. But as the water dissipates, the skeeters are bound to be a nuisance, especially for anyone lingering to take photos.

Not only was the section of trail where the lupine are under water, but other parts also required either finding a completely different route or walking our bikes around the obstacle.

Leading up to Fallen Leaf Lake is Taylor Creek – normally a rather subdued body of water that eventually flows into Lake Tahoe. Not earlier this month. It was raging like a river.

Getting there:

From South Lake Tahoe, go north on Highway 89. Turn left on Cathedral Road, which is just beyond Fallen Leaf Lake Road.

The trail starts as a road, but then up a bit a dirt trail veers off to the left.

I've never found the lupine patch the same way – so good luck.

Does anybody really know how green their hotel is? Does anybody really care?

The acronym “LEED” has flashed across the public radar screen often enough to make an impression as ... well, something or other to do with energy efficiency.

But even if you know that LEED is shorthand for Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design, and that LEED certification is sparingly bestowed by the U.S. Green Building Council for sustainable building performance and business practices, should it matter?

You may or may not rest easier on your next weekend getaway knowing that your hotel bathroom is equipped with low-flow plumbing, that your garbage is being recycled and composted, or that a switch in light bulb technology has cut the hotel's energy bill in half. You might even be irritated by that little sign on the counter guilt-tripping you into using your towels and sheets for a second day. (Then again, you might be impressed to know they're being laundered locally with nontoxic cleaning products rather than being trucked to a

regional processing facility 100 miles away.)

The point is, there's something to be said for being made aware of your choices.

With California at the forefront of investment in green energy, hotels are changing their wasteful ways – and most want their patrons to know about it.
