

Revisions being made in proposed STPUD booster station

People who want to comment on the proposed booster station on Grizzly Mountain Road now have until April 28 to do so.

South Tahoe Public Utility District has been working with neighbors in the area on a redesign of the building to better satisfy their desires while still providing the necessary configuration for the South Shore district to pump water.

Here is the latest design.

While neighbors are expressing gratitude toward STPUD's willingness to make changes, as of April 25 they were still waiting for information on "some new possible sites where this booster station could go".

The South Tahoe PUD is expected to vote on the project May 5, with it going before the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency hearing officer review on May 19.

Snippets about Lake Tahoe



- South Lake Tahoe Women's Center's rape crisis counselors served 161 adult and child survivors of sexual assault in 2010.

- Choices for Children funding is projected to be cut again in July. California is expected to further reduce funding by 15 to 20 percent, affecting 100 families starting July1.

- Algonquin Power & Utilities Corp. subsidiary Liberty Water Co. is acquiring three additional regulated water utility assets – Louisiana Land and Water Co., Noel Water Company, and KMB Utilities Company for \$8.3 million. This will add approximately 7,400 customer connections. Algonquin is the parent company of Liberty Energy, which provides electricity to California customers at Lake Tahoe.

- Lake Tahoe Environmental Science Magnet School has been selected by California Business for Education Excellence as one of 1,221 public schools in California to receive the title of 2010 Honor Roll school. This is the second consecutive year that LTESMS has earned this honor.

South Tahoe council pushes back, makes philosophical stand

What may have been the most significant discussion at last week's South Lake Tahoe City Council meeting was about a \$1,000 bill.



The lengthy discussion on the consent agenda item about a snowblower at Lake Tahoe Airport and the consultant working on the specs signaled a shift in how these five do business. Rubber-stamping what staff brings to them didn't happen. Making the person prove they worked the hours is new. Chastising staff in public for having the work done without a contract approved by the council is new.

"I'm very troubled by this," Councilwoman Angela Swanson said. "I don't want to see this happen again from any of our departments."

What happened is Airport Director Sherry Miller brought forward a \$20,000 bill from Reinard Brandley for engineering and consulting assistance in the purchase of an airport snowblower. This is twice the amount it was originally expected to be.

The city's portion is \$1,000, with the Federal Aviation Administration picking up 95 percent. But it is all taxpayer money.

In the discussions April 19 it was brought up that the Brandley, who has been associated with the airport before the city incorporated in 1965, had to re-do the specs for the bid. The city is being billed for his mistakes.

Councilman Tom Davis was adamant he isn't going to agree to pay this bill until he sees an accounting of the work done and hours associated with it.

The blower is expected to arrive this summer, so delaying payment to the consultant is not delaying the item being built.

Miller explained a consultant was needed because the airport via FAA regulations has unique requirements. The \$507,000 blower is being built just for the South Lake Tahoe airport.

It's likely the contract with the consultant will be before the council again at the May 3 meeting.

Opinion: Rape of women in military 'a national disgrace'

Women in the U.S. military are more likely to be raped by fellow soldiers than killed by enemy fire. I know what you're thinking – it sounds too unbelievable to be true. But it's not.

The Department of Defense estimates that more than 19,000 service members were raped or sexually assaulted in 2010. Due to a military culture heavy on retaliation and light on prosecution, only 13.5 percent of the victims report the rape.

The system of justice designed to adjudicate cases of rape in the military is in complete shambles. Victims are blamed. Assailants are promoted. Unit commanders – whose promotions are dependent on the conduct and performance of the soldiers they supervise – have an incentive to see that allegations are few and convictions are fewer. As a result, the overwhelming majority of cases get swept under the rug.

This abomination is not new. The Pentagon has largely ignored the recommendations of 18 reports on sexual assault and rape in the military over the past 16 years. As a result, the problem is now worse than ever. So I have pledged to speak about this issue every week on the floor of the House of Representatives until this Congress and this administration do something more than offer lip service.

While the incidence of rapes and sexual assaults is shockingly high, the personal accounts of victims add even more horror to the picture of a military at war with itself.

Technical Sgt. Mary Gallagher, an Air National Guardsman, was allegedly sexually assaulted by a fellow sergeant in 2009. He pushed her up against a wall, took his right hand and pulled her pants and underwear down, and then used his hand to rub her private parts. He simultaneously ground his genitals against her, and talked about how much he was enjoying the assault. Command's only response was to reassign the assailant and order him to refrain from any contact with her. She was then lectured by the base chaplain, who claimed that 96 percent of sexual assaults on women occur when drinking is involved. Technical Sgt. Gallagher had not been drinking.
