

Mixed reaction to Reid's speech to Legislature

None of Washoe County's legislative delegation considered U.S. Sen. Harry Reid's call to end legalized prostitution in Nevada much of a priority, in a session where the budget shortfall dominates all other topics.

But they did find other parts of Reid's address to a joint session of the Legislature on Tuesday more agreeable.

"Maybe someone who was listening will introduce a bill (to outlaw legalized prostitution). I don't know," said Sen. Greg Brower, R-Reno. "But we have so many challenges that we're working on every day in an effort to get this state back on track economically through job creation and education reform and getting the budget balanced. Those are really the priorities of this session."

What most Washoe County legislators did like was Reid's call to reform education, properly fund it and to focus on making the state the renewable energy capital of the nation.

"He makes the point that it's hard to diversify the economy and attract new businesses to the state when you are in a cutting mode with education," said Assemblywoman Debbie Smith,

D-Sparks.

Reid, the U.S. Senate Majority Leader and a former state assemblyman, said the state cannot keep asking for cuts in education.

Federal budget contains funding for Auburn Recreation Area

Buried in the Obama administration's \$3.7 trillion federal budget proposal is a gem for the Sacramento region. It would provide \$2.7 million for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to continue managing lands in the footprint of the long-dormant Auburn dam project.

The money is more than double this year's funding.

In the 1960s, the bureau purchased about 40,000 acres in the north and middle forks of the American River to build an Auburn dam – later scuttled by cost and earthquake concerns.

For decades, the bureau has paid the California Department of Parks and Recreation to operate the Auburn State Recreation Area on those lands as an interim public benefit.

Wounded veterans to take to

the slopes of Sierra

Adaptive Action Sports hosting disabled military personnel and veterans at a three-day “Pipeline Learn to Ride and Race” Feb. 24-26 at Sierra-at-Tahoe.

The goal is to develop their snowboarding skills.

The camp, built on the framework of past successful AAS camps, is intended as the first in a series of AAS snowboard camps to be in South Lake Tahoe on an annual basis for Wounded Warriors.

One of AAS’s goals is to expand the series to include non-military disabled individuals, eventually resulting in development of a permanent home base for Adaptive Action Sports and adaptive snowboarding in the South Tahoe community.

With the expectation that Adaptive Snowboarding will soon be accepted as a Paralympic event, AAS hopes to provide adaptive veteran and other adaptive athletes a training pipeline with a potential end-goal of inclusion on a future US Paralympic Snowboard Team.

Seven disabled veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan conflicts will be attending the weekend camp.

Reno-Tahoe airport to spend \$5 mil. on baggage claim upgrades

The airport is preparing plans for a \$5 million face-lift of the baggage claim area which, officials said, will mean improvements designed to continue the rock-woodsy-outdoors themes that adorn the renovated ticket counter area.

"We want to move that look, that Tahoe feel, down to baggage claim," said Marily Mora, executive vice president/chief operating officer at the Reno-Tahoe Airport Authority. "When people leave Reno, they get to see it. So now, when they come in, we'll try to showcase what the community's about."

That means upgrades that will include rock and wood facing on columns and beams, an all-tile floor, improved signage and, with a nod to locals, the elimination of the chrome in the ceilings.
