Tahoe Magic to benefit from Vail Resorts charity program

For the 13th consecutive year, the 160-plus retail and rental shops of Specialty Sports Venture (SSV) located throughout Lake Tahoe, the Bay Area, and Colorado will rally customers making purchases in their stores to share the holiday spirit by contributing to a vital cause in the local communities where the shops operate.

Through Vail Resorts Echo, the company's corporate stewardship program, each region identifies its cause or charity and then

N. Nevada's tourism priority – special events

Big special events such as Hot August Nights, Street Vibrations and the National Championship Air Races help define tourism in Northern Nevada, and the Reno Sparks Convention and Visitors Authority wants to bring more of them to the region.

New special events – either homegrown or wooed from other locations – would fill slow winter months and generate business on free weekends during the summer, says RSCVA President and Chief Executive Officer Ellen Oppenheim.

But the challenge is balancing the needs of existing special events with the energy needed to bring new ones to the calendar.

“Special events are very important to this community. They are a proven draw for bringing visitors here, and as locals we have the added benefit of taking advantage of those events and being able to enjoy them,” Oppenheim says.

Ideas for new special events include a Western heritage festival, or a singles festival.

The RSCVA seeks both small events that might establish a strong following, such as the Santa Pub Crawl, as well as large-scale events. However, Oppenheim cautions, such events often come with large price tags.

The new Legislature began a special session called by Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger to fill the \$6 billion hole in the current state budget.

At the same time, mail balloting started for the special election Jan. 4 in the 1st Senate District.

Lawmakers flubbed a chance to save cash-strapped counties some real money by not allowing mail-only balloting for the race, which is not likely to be competitive because it is a Republican stronghold.

Instead, election registrars will have to open polling places just like they did Nov. 2, even though a tiny fraction of the electorate will turn out.

Ritz-Carlton at Northstar receives LEED certification

The Ritz-Carlton, Lake Tahoe that sits mid-mountain at Northstar-at-Tahoe has officially been awarded its LEED certification from the U.S. Green Business Council, becoming the first LEED certified Ritz-Carlton resort.



“Receiving this award is a further example of the Ritz-Carlton’s continued commitment to innovation in the hospitality industry while developing environmentally sensitive and sustainable resorts,” Allen Highfield, general manager for the Truckee hotel said in a press release.

LEED is the internationally recognized green building certification system, providing third-party verification that a building or community was designed and built using strategies aimed at improving performance across all the metrics that matter most: energy savings, water efficiency, CO2 emissions reduction, improved indoor environmental quality, and stewardship of resources and sensitivity to their impacts.

San Francisco-based Hornberger + Worstell was the design architect for the project.

LEED recognized features of The Ritz-Carlton Highlands, Lake Tahoe:

- Recycling/re-use of construction waste – 16,000 tons to date, which is 88 percent of all construction waste for the project
- Reduced building footprint – provided 66 percent of site as open space
- Provided daylight and views to 75 percent of the building
- On-site re-use of rock for retaining walls
- On-site re-use of trees for mulch
- Use of recycled materials – \$5 million value, or 9 percent of all materials used
- Use of local materials – 63 percent were extracted locally,

31 percent were manufactured locally

- Provided bike racks and lockers for employees
 - Stormwater retention management – no net increased run-off and stormwater treatment.

Tahoe-Reno struggling to find identity for sustainable future

It's the early 1930s.

At one West Coast university, an engineering professor laments about how many of his graduating students have to move East because of a lack of tech jobs in his area.

The area without enough tech jobs? Palo Alto.

The professor? Stanford University's Frederick Terman.

"Terman had a real interest in what happened to the students produced here," said Henry Lowood, curator of the History of Science and Technology Collections at Stanford University. "He was seeing students like David Packard taking his degree and

going to the East Coast to work for General Electric because there weren't enough jobs here in his field. So, the problem for him was figuring out how to seed something here so his own students don't end up going somewhere else."

Less than a decade later, Terman convinces Packard to return to the area to form Hewlett-Packard with another fellow student, William Hewlett. By 1951, Terman's pet project Stanford Industrial Park opens, attracting tenants such as HP, Varian Associates, Eastman Kodak and Lockheed.

Today, the Palo Alto area is known as arguably the most storied place for tech in the world. Terman, meanwhile, is affectionately regarded as the "Father of Silicon Valley."

As Northern Nevada works to wean itself from a heavy diet of gaming and tourism, Silicon Valley's story shows how it's possible to create a thriving, new sector with enough vision, effort and just the right amount of luck.

The area is wrestling with many of the same challenges Terman tackled decades ago, but Northern Nevada also is dealing with a key wild card: one of the worst economic downturns in its history.

The recession still casts a large shadow over the area, and the challenge for Northern Nevada is to stay the course on economic development without losing sight of the big picture, said Richard Bartholet, research director for the Bureau of Economic Research at the University of Nevada, Reno.

"It's much more challenging to do growth and economic development while working out of a hole," Bartholet said. "We've got in excess of 14 percent unemployment and significant fiscal challenges at the state and local level. But while it would be nice to have some short-term ideas under way, it's also important for business, community and political leaders to not get so focused on short-term challenges – like filling this budget gap – that they lose sight of where we

want to go and who we want to be in the long term.”
