

Paddling community asked to weigh-in on Tahoe experience

Poles may have been exchanged for paddles with snow on the ground, but that isn't stopping the non-motorized boat community from gathering information from people.

A blog has been developed to seek input from paddlers about what they want Lake Tahoe to be like when it comes to having access and information. The blog will be taken down Dec. 15.

The comments will be incorporated into the Lake Tahoe Non-Motorized Boat Framework that is being developed by a working group of mostly public agencies that own lakefront property. However, homeowners are represented, as is the Lake Tahoe Water Trail Committee. (The business rep has never attended the meeting and the Washoe Tribe designee stopped going.)

"In addition to the framework that is on the blog, there is a

study report that will be published that documents all the data collected," said Sue Rae Irelan, the California Tahoe Conservancy representative on the task force.

That will come out the first quarter of 2011.

It's intended to be a resource for agencies, but not something that any group would adopt. Part of the document is the user survey of paddlers what was done in 2008.

The information will be given to applicable agencies early in 2011 so anything that could be addressed would be before the summer season begins.

"A lot of what is in the framework is geared toward managing the beaches for beach access, looking at if parking is acceptable, looking at how people get in in the winter," Irelan said.

Part of the education component for paddlers involves letting them know the differences between California and Nevada in regards to what is public v. private. The other component is knowing when private property can be accessed and responsibilities of being on that property.

One thing Irelan said that was discovered early on is how kayakers, canoeists and paddlboarders don't usually use traditional boat launches. They are getting on the lake from a beach. This means needing info about aquatic invasive species and other information being distributed at non-traditional locations.

Tips for a safe holiday season

To the community,

The holiday season is always a special time of year. It is also a time when thieves and con artists prey on innocent victims caught up in the hustle and bustle of the season. We can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware. So keep these tips in mind for a safe and happy holiday season.

Around the house:

- * Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes or just going down the block.

- * We all want our homes to reflect the joy of the season, but avoid displaying gifts where they can be seen from a window or

doorway.

- * Inside and outside decorations should not impede a clear vision of your property.
- * Set your indoor and outdoor lights on an automatic timer.
- * Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- * When leaving town, have a trusted friend or neighbor take care of your home by picking up the newspaper and mail.
- * If you're planning an extended absence and want extra patrol/vacation check contact the Sheriff's Office STAR program (530) 621.7545.

Shopping:

- * If you can shop with someone else and stay alert to your surroundings.
- * Carry your purses closed and snugly against your body; carry wallets in front pants pocket or coat pocket.
- * Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- * Take your time when making purchase. Be sure to collect your license, credit cards or check book and your receipt.
- * If you must use an ATM, choose one in a safe well-lighted area.
- * Take care in protecting your PIN, by shielding the ATM keypad.

Home shopping and package delivery:

- * Request a signature confirmation of delivery. By doing this, the deliverer will have to wait until you're available or deliver the package to a neighbor.

- * If you have an understanding boss, have your packages delivered to you at work.
- * Track packages online to see exactly when they're sent to your house for delivery. If you're out of town at the time, phone a neighbor to pick up the package for you.
- * Leave special instructions for where to deliver the packages. A good place is on the side or back of the house, so that the package is out of site from the road

Vehicle safety:

- * Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- * Park as close to your destination as possible and take notice to where you have parked.
- * Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave items in your vehicle place them in the trunk or cover them.
- * Look inside your car and around it as you approach. Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- * Park in well lighted areas.

Operation identification:

- * The idea behind Operation Identification is to deter property related crime and to assist the El Dorado County Sheriff's Office in identifying stolen property and returning it to its lawful owners
- * Mark gifts with your California driver's license number. Do not use your Social Security number.
- * On items that cannot be engraved, photograph them.

Although this is a large list, most of the tips are relatively easy to apply and by doing so you could reduce the chances of being a victim. If you find yourself a victim of a criminal act, report it immediately to your local law enforcement agency. The El Dorado Sheriff's Office wishes you a safe and joyful holiday season.

Reno hotel tax collections increase despite lower room rates

The average charge for a night's lodging in the Reno-Tahoe region over the first nine months of this year rose 1.4 percent from 2009, according to the region's tourism agency.

But as temperatures fall with the advent of another winter of recession, downward pressure on room rates is coming to bear. And area properties are facing the challenge of filling rooms – but at what cost?

Discounts of up to 60 percent were posted recently on Expedia.com for one area property, Grand Sierra Resort, which for a time in November also was offering two nights free without an additional booking. GSR officials declined to comment.

The head of the Reno-Sparks Convention and Visitors Authority downplayed her concern even though two-thirds of the agency's budget is financed through taxes of up to 13.5 percent,

depending on locale, on room receipts.

Nevada board votes to make substitute pot illegal

RENO – Products sold as legal substitutes for marijuana will soon be illegal after a vote Thursday by the Nevada State Board of Pharmacy.

The vote means head shops, which specialize in articles of interest to drug users, will soon have to remove products containing certain synthetic cannabinoids from their shelves.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) on Nov. 24 announced it will use its emergency scheduling authority to temporarily make five chemicals used to make synthetic marijuana products illegal. Products including chemicals JWH-018, JWH-073, JWH-200, CP-47, 497 and cannabicyclohexanol will be illegal in the United States after Dec. 24. The DEA then has one year, with the possibility of a six-month extension, to determine whether the chemicals should remain illegal.
