The Brotherhood Motorcycle Club could not have done this without the more than \$4,000 in raffle prize donations from

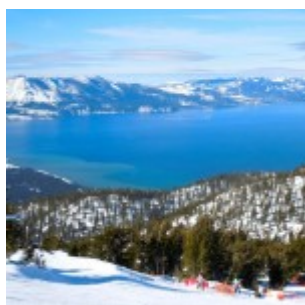
our wonderful community and numerous individuals for our annual event.

Holiday season comes to light with Barton's Festival of Trees

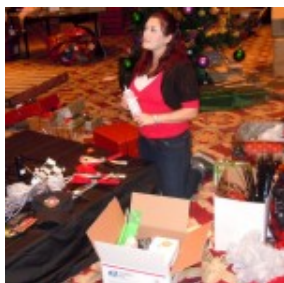
STATELINE – It was not the traditional Santa's workshop, but a definite holiday buzz was coming from MontBleu's convention center.

By 10am the Mardis Gras tree was well assembled, as was the Party in a Box tree. Food Network star Guy Fieri sent items to Tahoe for a tree with his name on it. Hollywood is showing up with an Eat, Pray, Love tree.

All of these trees and more are part of the second annual Festival of Tree and Lights. The three-day event – Dec. 3-5 – is all about giving local youths some holiday fun, families an indoor activity, and the Barton Community Clinic a unique vehicle to raise cash.

Each designer has a 10-foot by 10-foot space to work in. Decorating the winter wonderland was supposed to be done as

the clock struck midnight Wednesday. Although the public doesn't get to look at the splendor until Dec. 3, Barton employees will be treated to a special event tonight and a VIP gathering was last night.

"Most of the growth is in mini trees and table tops," Kindle Craig, executive director of the Barton Foundation, told *Lake Tahoe News* as she walked among the clutter Tuesday.

Although she would like to be able to have more large trees, the space doesn't allow for it. But MontBleu is not charging for use of the space.

"I'd really like the convention center (across the street) to open so it could be bigger," Kindle said.

New this year is two trips on the Polar Express on Sunday because of the sell-out last year. A Teddy Bear Hospital is also new. A Champagne brunch fashion show had been planned,

but has since been crossed off the event schedule.

The inaugural event raised almost \$28,000 for the clinic. With not having the start-up costs associated with last year, organizers are hoping to raise even more money this year. It is also hoped more people will participate. Last year 2,500 people were part of the festival.

More than a dozen trees are elaborately decorated – mostly with a theme, such as the Powder tree. Each tree has a sponsor (Barton's orthopedics are behind this one), and each has a decorator. Sponsors pay \$1,200 per tree. The designer is reimbursed up to \$600; the other \$600 goes to the clinic.

Gifts under the tree – like the goggles, skis and chairlift are donated. In this case, the chair came from Sierra-at-Tahoe.

Then, the tree and everything associated with it is auctioned off to the highest bidder. In 2009, the most expensive tree went for \$3,000 even though it had a value of about \$5,000.

That money, too, went right to the community clinic coffers.

The clinic plans an \$800,000 renovation that will begin next year. It is at capacity with 11 exam rooms, so more will be added, along with a larger waiting area. The clinic saw nearly 1,600 patients in October.

The Gingerbread Junction will have holiday coloring pages and holiday craft projects for kids.

Swarm of quakes keeps Reno scientists on their toes

Seismologists at the University of Nevada, Reno are keeping their eyes on the ArrowCreek area of Reno where a swarm of 21 small earthquakes were recorded between Friday and Sunday and another small temblor hit Monday morning.

"The earthquakes have all been in about the same spot," said Ken Smith, a seismologist at UNR's Nevada Seismological Laboratory. "It's a little cluster. I felt it in north Reno."

The strongest temblor was measured at a magnitude 3 on Friday. The quake Monday at 10:22am was a 2.1 magnitude. No damage was reported from either event.

He said such earthquake sequences aren't unusual in Nevada, but because quake swarms are sometimes precursors to stronger temblors, his lab is keeping tabs on the activity.

Carson City man hospitalized after being buried in

avalanche

A Carson City man who grew up in South Lake Tahoe is being treated for severe head injuries he sustained in an avalanche near the Carson Pass.

Darren Johnson, 47, was backcountry skiing with his friend Matthew Beler of South Lake Tahoe on Sunday when he triggered an avalanche as he going from the saddle of Red Peak to Crater Lake.

Beler was able see Johnson's poles sticking out and dug him out in about seven minutes. He was conscious, but responsive at that time. Renown Medical Center in Reno where Johnson was taken is not releasing his status. Alpine County sheriff's officials knew he was alive and still at the hospital early Wednesday afternoon.

"With as much snow that had fallen, the chance of an avalanche was extreme," said Lt. Ron Michitarian of the Alpine County Sheriff's Department.

Even though the two skiers were considered experienced and carried beacons, it is still necessary to understand how that much snow would be unstable.

It took Beler about two hours to ski out to Highway 88 where he was able to flag down a deputy. The deputy in turn called out all the search and rescue crews. A CalStar flight crew located the avalanche field about 12:20pm.

A California Highway Patrol chopper lowered a paramedic to Johnson who packaged him in a rig to airlift him to Blue Lakes. From there CalStar flew him to Reno.

Because Johnson was on a cliff the search and rescue crews on snowmobile were not able to reach him.

Also assisting in the rescue were Woodfords volunteer firefighters, South Tahoe fire and Lake Valley fire.

Squaw's Ganong in top 10 in training run

BEAVER CREEK – Travis Ganong of Squaw Valley produced another strong result, finishing seventh in the second Audi Birds of Prey downhill training run before the race was canceled after 45 racers because of visibility. Austria's Michael Walchhofer, who won the season's opening downhill in Lake Louise last weekend, led the run in 1:48.34.

"The course is in great shape. It's a little slicker than it was the first day – you can really take at it. It's pretty fun," said Ganong, who was 24th Tuesday. "It's my first top-10 in a training run or anything, so I know I have the speed."

Olympic gold medalist Bode Miller led a tight string of U.S. with 11th followed by Steven Nyman of Utah and Andrew Weibrecht of New York in 12th and 13th.

A third training run is scheduled for Thursday at 10am.
