

Mancuso leads U.S. in giant slalom

ASPEN -- Three-time Olympic medalist Julia Mancuso of Squaw Valley showed she has the speed to return to the Audi FIS Alpine World Cup giant slalom podium finishing eighth Saturday to lead the U.S. at the Visa Aspen International. France's Tessa Worley produced a blistering second run jumping seven spots to make it two Aspen wins in three years.

Sarah Schleper of Vail also bagged some World Cup points with 18th as three-time World Cup overall winner Lindsey Vonn, also of Vail, skied out in the opening run.

An overflowing sunglassed crowd roared as Mancuso rocketed to second in the opening run, just three hundredths of a second behind leader and Olympic gold medalist Viktoria Rebensburg of Germany. A small mistake at the top of the course slowed Mancuso enough to keep her off the Aspen podium, despite making up time through the bottom of the course.

"I remembered from the training session last time that you have to charge down the pitch through all the rolls," said Mancuso, the 2006 Olympic GS champion. "I skied pretty consistent with one small mistake in the middle, but then I really picked it up again toward the finish. All in all it was a good run. It's a fine balance between charging hard and taking it easy to finish."

The tricky Aspen set grabbed Vonn yet again as her skis locked up on the grippy snow and bounced her off course. The Olympic champion immediately turned her focus to Sunday's slalom by heading back onto the snow after the race to train.

"I just went a little too straight today and got a little too

excited and amped up," Vonn said. "I wasn't using the greatest tactics, but that sometimes happens in ski racing. I'm definitely disappointed in today but I'm still optimistic. My training has been going really well both in GS and slalom so I'm just looking forward to the next race and trying to stay positive and keep working hard."

Joining Mancuso in the second run was Schleper, who was laying down a solid run before a minor speed check bounced her coming onto the flats.

"The last three years I've been right around the top-20," said Schleper. "I want to start getting top-15s, top-10s. I want to get back into that routine."

Mancuso left the gate on fire in the second run, before losing her balance on bump in almost the exact spot as Schleper.

"I had a little problem on top and I felt like I lost my ski," explained Mancuso. "It was hard to get back in mentally. It was something in my head and I backed off."

American's Megan McJames of Park City and Laureenne Ross Klamath Falls failed to qualify for a second run, while Leanne Smith of Conway, N.H., skied off course.

McJames, Ross, Vonn, Schleper and Mancuso will be back in the start Sunday along with Resi Stiegler of Jackson Hole, Wyo., and Hailey Duke of Boise with slalom. It will be the first start for Stiegler in just more than a year.

Enter the path. It loops around.

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Study: Billions more from tourism, fishing than oil

WASHINGTON — An environmental advocacy group says tourism and fishing deliver \$204 billion annually to coastal economies along the Pacific, Atlantic and Florida Gulf shores — about four times the value of the estimated oil and gas that could be recovered every year from proposed offshore drilling nearby.

The study, prepared by Environment America, boils down the fierce and emotional fight over offshore drilling into a dollar-based analysis.

Michael Gravitz, the report's author, contends the numbers show that "the potential returns from offshore drilling are not worth the risk" of another oil spill that could contaminate reefs near Florida and salmon-rich Pacific waters.

"Our research makes it clear that clean beaches and oceans are worth much more than drilling for the last drops of oil off our coasts," Gravitz added.

Oil and gas industry leaders have argued that the value of the actual commodities that can be extracted only shows part of the picture — and overlooks the added spending tied to offshore drilling activities, from the salaries of rig workers in Louisiana and Texas to the pipes built in Rust Belt

manufacturing plants.

How green is your ski equipment?

How sustainable is that sweet pair of skis you're about to buy? You may soon be able to find out how green all your favorite products are through a new tool called the Eco Index. Designed in collaboration with over one hundred retailers, brands, and suppliers, along with the Outdoor Industry Association, the European Outdoor Group, and Zero Waste Alliance, the Eco Index is an environmental assessment tool designed to advance sustainable practices within the outdoor industry.



The Eco Index is based on a framework created to guide product development. Developers assess where their materials came from and how they were processed along with packaging, product manufacturing and assembly, transport and distribution, use and service, and finally end of life. After assessment, the Eco Index scores a product on a 119-point scale. "There is a lot of green-washing going on right now because everyone has their own standards," said Beth Jensen, Corporate Responsibility Manager at OIA. "This will hopefully provide a way to measure products against a standard so that companies can make more informed product lifecycle decisions."

Christmas tree lot wouldn't be the same without Benny

Choosing the perfect Christmas tree is important. Sometimes it takes the right person to find the right tree.

For many people, Benny Kunibe is that person.

Kunibe, who turned 93 this month, is the man behind the Optimist's annual Christmas tree lot near El Dorado Beach.

“People will come to the tree lot and only want to talk to Benny to get the best tree,” said Terry Powers, a fellow Optimist.

The tree lot has been an institution in South Lake Tahoe since 1963. The club had to find some way to raise money after taking a huge financial loss with a car race that was supposed to raise money but instead created a deficit of thousands of

dollars and required lawyers to get out of the mess.

The lot was first at the old Nevada Lumber Company, where CVS at the Y is. Only local trees were sold. Many came from the Wrights Lake area. At the time it was the only tree lot in town.

The Optimist has sold trees up and down Highway 50, including in Nevada, and inside the Fremont Center when it was a dance hall. The lot has been in its current location since the early 1990s.

Although there are other places to buy trees on the South Shore that are less expensive, the Optimist lot is the only one to give money back to the community.

"This is the only big money maker we have. It's how we give money to the kids," Kunibe said.

The Optimist Club is all about raising money for various youth groups in the area. At the club's meeting on Nov. 17 there is discussion about a request from the Pop Warner Cheer group needing money. (It's mostly men in attendance upstairs at Steamers.) They talk about how at times there are as many young girls cheering on the sidelines as there are boys playing football. The cheerleaders are getting their money.

It's a business meeting with levity. Kunibe has what looks like a Clorox bottle turned into a decorated pig where fines are paid into the back end. He is getting people to put in money for infractions that aren't entirely evident to the uninitiated.

"The guys keep me young," Kunibe said.

But the guys wonder what they would do without their senior most member – in terms of age and membership.

"Benny remembers all the supplies we need," Powers said.

This means shopping after the holidays for deals on things like tree stands that will be used the following year. It means knowing how many hot dogs or packets of hot cocoa to have for various events.

Kunibe has had an interesting life, though not always easy. During World War II he was placed in an internment camp in Colorado. In 1955, he moved to Lake Tahoe from Sacramento.

He started off working at George's Basque restaurant. He worked for a time at the old Lampson Store. Kunibe lived behind the store in a 600-square-foot house with his wife and four kids.

When Fritz Wenck joined Optimist in 1970, Kunibe was still sprinting around the bases for the club's softball team.

Baseball is very much a love of Kunibe's to this day. He's wearing a San Francisco Giants hat and lights up when questioned about this year's team.

"They made history," he says of the World Series champs. Still, though, it's Willie Mays who he has a soft spot for.

When Kunibe isn't doing something for the Optimist Club he can be found fishing on Fallen Leaf or Topaz lakes.

"Age doesn't mean a thing. I don't sit around," Kunibe said.

He definitely won't be sitting much for the next few weeks as the Optimist Club sells Christmas trees. The lot opened Friday. It is open weekdays noon-8pm and weekends 10am-8pm. Snow can change the hours up a bit.

"Benny enjoys life and he wants to make sure everyone else does," Powers said.

Washoe County and Reno already share dozens of services through inter-local agreements, memorandums of understanding and consolidation.

After a staff analysis, Washoe County and Reno decided to move forward and hired Matrix Consulting Group to analyze the feasibility of combining the services in a way that would improve service and save money.
