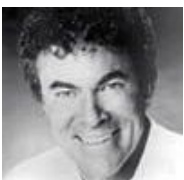
# Breck Hall, entertainer with roots in Tahoe, dies

It returned numerous times in several incarnations during the '70s, '80s and into the '90s. Breck and his partner Patrick Maes also produced adult revues that played Harrah's, Harveys, the High Sierra [now Horizon] and elsewhere, the most successful of which was 'Passion.' 'Bottoms Up' was his signature show in which he starred for many decades. Very funny, silly at times, and risque to say the least."*

It was a simple passing in the news on Monday that Breck Wall had died at the age of 75. If the name rings a bell, then you are really a Vegas fanatic.

Breck Wall is best known around Las Vegas for his 40 years of the comic revue "Bottoms Up." I first caught the act when we moved here in 2001. The campy, vaudeville style burlesque show was playing at the Flamingo. The last incarnation of it was at the Harmon in 2007.

## **Caffeinated alcoholic drinks to be pulled from shelves**

Stephanie Lake has seen the effects at UC Davis – students hospitalized after consuming high-octane alcoholic drinks that contain caffeine that masks how drunk they're getting.

Lake, who coordinates the university's alcohol intervention services, has been warning students that so-called "blackout in a can" drinks like Four Loko are too dangerous to drink.

"They need to take it off the market," she said.

That will start happening.

The federal Food and Drug Administration said Wednesday that adding caffeine to alcohol is "unsafe" and gave the four

manufacturers of the beverages 15 days to either stop using caffeine in their products or stop selling them entirely.

Caffeine, health officials say, hides the effects of the alcohol and prevents people from realizing how intoxicated they really are.

- South Tahoe Police Chief Brian Uhler has issued a press release warning people his department will be ticketing and towing people if vehicles are in the way of snow removal equipment.

# Municipal trouble – all economics is local

America's most sordid government scandal of the year was probably one that took place inside one of its tiniest governments: that of the city of Bell. Bell is really more of a blue-collar neighbourhood within the vast conurbation of Los Angeles than anything recognisable as a city. But the city elders, eight of whom are now awaiting trial, nonetheless paid themselves outrageous pensions and salaries—almost \$800,000 a year in one case, about twice what Barack Obama makes—while fleecing residents in countless innovative ways.

Bell is a reminder that local government can cause big problems. There are roughly 90,000 local governments in America, mainly cities, counties and school and utilities districts. Together with the 50 state governments, they account for 15% of total employment. But whereas the private sector did most of its job-shedding early in the recession and is now slowly hiring again, state and local governments began lay-offs later and still have far to go. The National League of Cities thinks nearly 500,000 workers in local government will lose their jobs in the current and coming fiscal years.

The main revenue sources of local governments are sales and property taxes. Sales taxes dropped along with consumer

spending and remain depressed. Property taxes only began falling some time after the housing bust, because the houses first had to be reassessed at their lower values. But now they are down for the foreseeable future. So are other local revenues, such as hotel fees, which depend on travel.

# November is National Novel Writing Month

November is National Novel Writing Month. Perhaps you know that already. Perhaps you're trying to reach word 23,338 by night's end. If you don't know NaNoWriMo, think of it as a literary marathon with nearly 200,000 mostly amateur writers. The goal? To write a 50,000-word "novel" in 30 days.

"Novel," in NaNoWriMo-speak, means "laughably awful yet lengthy prose." What began in 1999 with 21 friends has grown into a nonprofit called the Office of Letters and Light, whose purpose is to get people to throw their literary inhibitions aside, work within a communal deadline, and have fun.

This enormous coterie of writers had produced nearly a billion words as of a couple of days ago. (In 2009, the total was nearly 2.5 billion.) At the end of the month, writers upload their work for a word count. Last year, slightly more than 19 percent of NaNoWriMo writers won, which proves just how hard it is to keep up a pace of 1,667 words a day, even if they're laughably awful.
