

# California unemployment fund running \$10 bil. deficit

California businesses already pay some of the highest unemployment taxes in the country – and the tab is likely to increase.

The recession and the Legislature's decision years ago to raise benefits have drained the state unemployment insurance fund, which now has a estimated \$10.3 billion deficit.

The nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office, in a recent report titled "California's Other Budget Deficit," said the state will probably need to raise unemployment taxes on employers as well as reduce benefits to bring the fund back in balance.

Raising the tax would require a two-thirds vote in both houses of the Legislature and might be politically impossible. Gov.-elect Jerry Brown has promised not to raise taxes without voter approval.

But pressure is growing on Sacramento to fix the system soon – whether it wants to or not. California has borrowed about \$8.5 billion from the federal government to keep benefits flowing, and the repayment obligations are coming due.

Customers going online can save on postage and order free Priority Mail Flat Rate boxes. Priority Mail Flat Rate boxes are available in four sizes, with shipping prices starting at \$11.45 to Mexico and Canada, or \$13.45 to most other countries. Priority Mail Flat Rate boxes are also available free at any post office. Postage, labels and customs forms can be printed online anytime using Click-N-Ship.

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# California budget deficit

# projected to top \$25 bil.

In what has become a somber November tradition, the nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office projected Wednesday that California must close a \$25.4 billion shortfall next year, twice as large as legislative leaders predicted.

California faces another major budget problem because tax rates are slated to drop, the federal government will provide less relief and state leaders enacted a flimsy fiscal plan last month, the analyst's office found. The economy is recovering, but not fast enough to overcome the state's budgetary obstacles.

The latest projections suggest a difficult road ahead for Gov.-elect Jerry Brown, who will likely spend much of the next four years wrestling with budget problems. The LAO report forecasts annual budget deficits of about \$20 billion through 2015-16 without permanent changes.

The new deficit is larger than last year's \$19 billion gap, which took legislators and Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger until Oct. 8 to resolve, the latest budget enactment date in state history.

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## President Grant's trip

# through Nevada

Despite claims to the contrary, former President Ulysses Grant didn't get into hot water at Walley's Hot Springs or Steamboat Springs.

Grant, accompanied by his wife and son on a world tour, visited Nevada in October 1879.

Grant had long since left the military as a Union Civil War hero and recently completed two terms as president of the United States (1869-77). His itinerary in Nevada was tightly scripted. Virtually every step he took was covered by the area's newspapers.

On Sunday afternoon, Oct. 26, 1879, the Grant family detrained at Truckee. A carriage conveyed the party to Tahoe City where they were met at 2:30 p.m. by a delegation of prominent Nevadans, including lumber tycoon Duane L. Bliss. They boarded Bliss' steamship the Meteor and crossed Lake Tahoe to Glenbrook. There, according to the Carson City Morning Appeal, passage was taken on Bliss' narrow gauge Lake Tahoe Railroad to Spooner Summit. Renowned stagecoach driver Hank Monk held the reins of Grant's carriage as it traveled down Clear Creek Canyon to Carson City, where a throng of people jubilantly greeted the former president at 7pm.

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# South Tahoe gathers to honor local veterans

Veterans tend to carry scars upon their body, mind and soul. The scars never completely fade away – whether they have left the battlefield or left the service.

Speakers at South Lake Tahoe's Veterans Day ceremony at the packed American Legion Hall reiterated this reminder in their various ways, many on the verge of tears.

The more than 100 in attendance sat on the floor, friend's laps, stood and drifted into the hall to be part of this annual day to honor all veterans.

"We understand the sacrifices service members and their

families make every day,” said Curt Emrie of Legion Post 795. “We will remember you always not for protecting our freedom, but for putting service before self.”

With a heavy heart, George Ramirez, who is the POW representative for the area, spoke about how vets Bill Hanson and Gene Ross are not doing well – and will no likely be here for next year’s service.

Hanson was a prisoner of war. Ross is former commander of the local post.

For the six veterans at Barton’s Skilled Nursing Center, goody bags were to be taken to them after the ceremony to honor them.

El Dorado County Supervisor Norma Santiago spoke of her father who served in Vietnam and was in the Navy for 25 years.

“What I have learned from my father is to stick by what is right,” Santiago said. “As your supervisor, I am committed to the veterans of this community.”

She mentioned how next week she and her colleagues will be faced with making \$5.5 million in cuts for the next fiscal year – just half of what will be slashed in the coming months from the 2011-12 budget. Veterans’ services could be axed. Santiago, though, pledged her vote would be to keep the programs intact.

For Patty Smith and Kenny Curtzwiler, Thursday was about their sons who are no longer here. Smith lost her son, Timmy, in combat in 2008. Curtzwiler spoke briefly about his son, Kaleb, who had been in the military, who took his life earlier this year. The boys were high school friends.

John Lingar paid tribute to the prisoners of war and those missing in action. A table sat for one was at the front of the room representing the lone soldier against his or her captors.

The white table cloth a symbol of purity, a single rose for the blood that may have been shed, a yellow ribbon for hope of their return, a slice of lemon for their bitter fight, a flickering candle as the beacon of light in their dreams leading them home.

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# A glimpse into the rigors of operating a winery

STATELINE – Rattling off a slew of women's names, Maggie Bush proved men do not dominate the wine industry.

She credits the profession being only a few decades old – at least in the United States – for it being a field equally open to both sexes.

Bush, with husband Paul, owns and operates Madroña winery in Camino.

"I've never been in a spot where I was stopped or hit a bridge because I'm a woman," Bush told the group from Soroptimist International South Lake Tahoe on Nov. 10 at Harrah's. "Women have always been involved in wine."

As a family operation, she does a little bit of everything. She's picked grapes, crushed them, drove a tractor, tasted wines at 9am (to which she says she's learned to spit), figured out marketing is creating rack cards and knowing the wines are in the correct restaurant, dealt with cash flow (she was once a certified public accountant), and worked on frost protection (where 30 minutes can mean the loss of an entire crop).

Those are just some of the hats she wears.

Bush married into the business. Her in-laws, Dick and Leslie Bush, planted the first grapes in 1973, with the inaugural harvest coming five years later. The tasting room, where 70 percent of the business comes from, opened in 1980. Nine years ago they turned the reins over to the next generation.

Maggie and Paul Bush have two young daughters; one who tells people she is the owner and the other who wants nothing to do with the winery.

Madroña got its name from the large 300-year-old madrone tree in the vineyard that continues to be a pillar in the vineyard. It's the symbol on their label.

While some wineries buy grapes from elsewhere, all of Madroña's are from land the family owns – thus being able to use the term “estate” on all bottles.

Many wineries that bottle 12,000 cases a year specialize in a handful of varietals. At Madroña they grow 27 kinds of grapes. They make what they like to drink.

At the Wednesday gathering Bush was asked what her favorite wine is. She smiled, saying that's a bit like asking which of her children she likes best.

But she did admit Cabernet Franc, Malbec and Riesling are some of her favorites.

In fact, the family will be spending a few months next year in France immersing themselves in the world of Malbec. It's their travels that keep them rejuvenated, Bush said.

Creating wines that go well with food is one of Madroña's goals. For those who want to experience that, for one night there is no need to go off the hill. Madroña's wines will be poured Nov. 12 during the Soroptimists' annual wine tasting fundraiser from 6-9:30pm at Harrah's Lake Tahoe.
