One other item has given us concern. The "estates" have been without a caretaker for some time now, and attrition in the form of vandalism and winter weather damage has been alarming. We would urge that you employ your good offices in an effort to acquire the funds and bureaucratic approval for caretaking facilities in that area.

New releases about Reno

history, Comstock era

More than a hundred years of Reno history, stories of the Comstock Lode and a big white bear fill up three new books by local authors.



“Remembering Reno” (Trade Paper Press, \$16.95 paperback) is filled with nearly 130 historic photos of Reno and the surrounding area.

The pictorial excursion begins with the days of Lake’s Crossing and progresses through subsequent booms, mineral and otherwise, into the 1970s.

Compiled by Donnelyn Curtis, head of Special Collections and of Research Collections & Services at the University of Nevada, Reno Libraries, “Remembering Reno” brings to life about 110 years of history.

The purpose, Curtis said in the book’s preface, is to “let photographs speak for themselves in presenting the history of Reno, with minimal interpretation.”

So, we see floods, celebratory parades, merchants and gamblers, family life, work life and many of the other elements that have made up Reno since its birth.

State Parks regrouping after ballot measure flops

The defeat of Proposition 21 on Nov. 2 means California State Parks will continue to experience partial closures, reduced maintenance and dwindling ranger patrols.

The measure failed by a 16-point margin, a spread that surprised many park advocates. It would have imposed a mandatory \$18 annual vehicle license fee while giving vehicle owners free day use at all 278 state parks.

Only 10 of California's 52 counties leaned in favor of the measure. Just two were outside the San Francisco Bay Area: Yolo and Alpine.

Elizabeth Goldstein, president of the California State Parks Foundation, chief sponsor of the measure, held out hope that parks funding might improve with a new governor in office next year.

"We're going to have to regroup, no question about that," she said. "This park system didn't get any less important because of the vote (last week)."

Memorial honors S. Tahoe's

young who died in combat

With snow on the ground and a chill in the air, the sun peaked through to shine a ray of light on those gathered for the somber occasion – the dedication of the memorial honoring South Lake Tahoe's children who have died in combat.

Pfc. Brandon Williams, 21, died in October 2006 and Sgt. Tim Smith, 25, in April 2008.

The memorial is on the same plot of land along Highway 50 where the children's memorial is.

The plaque on the large granite boulder reads, "This memorial is dedicated to all from our community who gave their lives and have served our country from all branches of service. We thank you for your sacrifice and you can rest assured that we will support your families and friends. You have served as an example to all Americans by giving of yourself to the ideals of freedom which is the basis on which our country was founded. May you rest in peace and forever remain in our

hearts and in our prayers.”

It was Patty Smith, the mother of Sgt. Smith, who in August suggested a special place in town be set aside for the children in the community who died in combat. Mayor Kathay Lovell promised to have it done by Veterans Day. The dedication came one day before that deadline.

Smith, who quietly sat with son Tommy in the front row, spoke briefly – admitting to having visited the memorial several times before the Nov. 10 dedication.

Brad Williams, the father of Pfc. Williams, was out of town. On his behalf his brother, Brian, spoke about the legacy these young men have left behind.

Gaming win down on South Shore, barely up statewide

CARSON CITY – Baccarat and sports betting helped Las Vegas Strip casinos register \$580.5 million in gross win in September, a 2.8 percent increase over a year ago.

“The baccarat win kept us where we had positives,” said Michael Lawton, senior research analyst for the Nevada Gaming Board, which issued its monthly report Wednesday. Without baccarat, the win at Strip casinos would have been down 3.2 percent.

The board reported, however, that downtown Las Vegas casinos suffered their 28th consecutive month of lower win figures, down 3.9 percent from a year ago. Gaming win is calculated before taxes and business expenses.

The board said statewide win was \$917.8 million, an increase of 0.73 percent. Lawton said this was the first time since September and October 2007 the state has reported an increase

in gross win for two consecutive months.

MontBleu's parent company reports quarterly profit

Las Vegas-based Tropicana Entertainment Inc. today said it earned \$1.5 million in the third quarter, despite the deterioration of the Lake Tahoe and Laughlin markets in Nevada where it has three hotel-casinos.

The company, which emerged this year from the Tropicana Entertainment Holdings LLC bankruptcy, posted net quarterly revenue of \$177.9 million. It's controlled by investor Carl Icahn.

There are no comparable numbers for the 2009 third quarter at the corporate level. The Tropicana Las Vegas hotel-casino was also spun out of the bankruptcy to unaffiliated investors and is not part of Tropicana Entertainment.

Tropicana Entertainment includes the Atlantic City Tropicana; Casino Aztar in Evansville, Ind.; Belle of Baton Rouge in Louisiana; Bayou Caddy's Jubilee in Greenville, Miss.; Lighthouse Point in Greenville; and Horizon Vicksburg in Vicksburg, Miss.

Its properties in Laughlin are the Tropicana and the River Palms; while its Lake Tahoe property is the MontBleu Casino Resort & Spa.
