When I look back on this year in movies (my Best of/Worst of comes out in late December) I know already that some of my favs were based on true stories or were bio pics. Maybe because true life trumps fiction or you know the characters are real people. It's amazing the human spirit can overcome practically any adversity.

Hilary Swank has starred in real life based movies such as "Amelia," "Million Dollar Baby," "Iron Jawed Angels," "Boys Don't Cry," "Cries Unheard: The Donna Yaklich Story" and now "Conviction" where Swank again turns in a powerful performance. It's a little predictable knowing the eventual outcome, but like most things, the journey is usually the best part.

Swank virtually channels Betty Anne Waters, a high school dropout from Ayer, Mass., who grew up in a series of foster homes with no stability other than that of her older brother, Kenny, (played convincingly by Sam Rockwell). Her only semblance of family life is her brother, so when he's convicted of a 1983 murder Betty sets out on a journey to do anything to prove him innocent. She believes that he's been wrongfully accused of murder. It doesn't help that a few corrupt individuals bent on making sure he never sees the light of day divvy small-town justice out. Without giving too much away, the murder victim was responsible in part for Kenny's predicament in life so it seemed only natural that Kenny would be the prime suspect.

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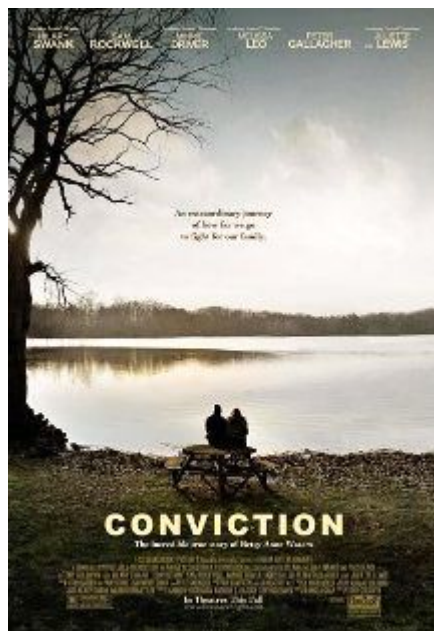
It's ironic that Betty's drive to lift herself out of her predicament happens when her brother is incarcerated and her journey starts from getting her GED to eventually getting through law school where she meets her best friend and colleague Abra Rice (Minnie Driver) that things start to rev up in a dramatic fashion. Another driving force during this time is the introduction of attorney Barry Scheck (Peter Gallagher).

The timing looking back is incredible, and had DNA not found its way into the national spotlight, things would have been dramatically different. Rockwell captures the troubled personality Kenny; revealing his hotheaded attitude that only strengthens the case for the prosecution. He's no angel. That's evident by crooked Officer Nancy Taylor (played by Melissa Leo) bent on putting him away.

There's a lot of white trash here and it's hard at times not to pigeonhole people, even Betty. But outward appearances can be deceiving and soon you find yourself believing you can't just judge everyone by one broad stroke. Swank's passion in her character is Oscar worthy and she stops at nothing and lets no one misdirect here even when the roadblocks placed in front of her at times are insurmountable.

The cast of "Conviction" is outstanding and you know you're watching a good movie when you forget that the actors are

playing real people; some you loathe and have to step back emotionally knowing that they are just acting. Case in point: Juliette Lewis as a low life, sub-human who is just evil and you want to just yell obscenities at her on the screen but then that wouldn't be a good thing to do now would it?



I walked away from this movie wondering why can't we have more lawyers like Betty? Granted she became one with only one purpose in mind, but to know you're right and can't be denied is pretty powerful stuff. Director Tony Goldwyn uses his cast wisely balancing the emotions created and building the tension to the point of boiling over and then slowly pulling back to let a few cooler minds prevail and in the process taking us along for the ride that is well worth the price.

"Conviction" is rated R for language and some violent images and clocks in at 1 hour and 45 minutes.

Cloud seeding operations within the Lake Tahoe and Truckee River Basin can proceed this winter following action today by the Truckee Meadows Water Authority.

TMWA's board of directors approved \$155,000 to go toward cloud seeding in the Tahoe-Truckee area. The action follows an earlier action by the Western Regional Water Commission to provide up to \$100,000 for cloud seeding during the winter of 2010-2011.

The money will allow the Desert Research Institute to run five cloud seeding generators in the mountains west of Tahoe.

Clear Lake officials use Tahoe as model to work on water issues

LAKEPORT – What to do about managing Clear Lake's algae and weeds brought together local and federal officials for an informal Friday workshop.

The meeting took place Friday morning in the Board of Supervisors chambers in the Lake County Courthouse in Lakeport.

Those sitting around the table included Congressman Mike Thompson and his district representative Brad Onorato, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Civil Works Program Chief Brandon Muncy and Col. Bill Leady, County Administrative Officer Kelly Cox, Supervisors Denise Rushing and Jeff Smith, county Water Resources Director Scott De Leon and his water engineer Tom Smythe, Lake County Chamber of Commerce Chief Executive Officer Melissa Fulton, Dr. Greg Giusti of the University of

California Cooperative Extension, Dr. Harry Lyons of Yuba College, Lakeport City Council member Suzanne Lyons, Lakeport City Manager Margaret Silveira, local businesswoman Kathy Fowler and Clearlake Keys resident Dennis Locke.

Cox told the group that the increase in algae issues in recent years – and the accompanying bad press about it – has had devastating effects on the county’s economy.

Dr. Harry Lyons noted that the lake has now gone into its “winter regime” due to changes in nutrients, sunlight and weather.

“The system is nonlinear,” he said.

He added, “That should leave us optimistic because the more we do the more, in essence, the algae can respond to it.”

Tahoe basin sky likely to be smoky Thursday

U.S. Forest Service fuels management crews plan to conduct prescribed fire operations on Lake Tahoe's West Shore in the

Ward Canyon, Blackwood Canyon and McKinney Creek areas beginning Oct. 21 and continuing through early next week.



This and other prescribed fire projects are designed to reduce wildfire risks to communities and critical resources.

The size of the project could total 300 acres if weather and fuels conditions permit. Because of the project size, Lake Tahoe residents and visitors can expect to see a significant amount of smoke rising from the project area.

Forest Service prescribed fire managers expect good dispersion of smoke based on predicted weather. Smoke management is part of every prescribed fire burn plan, and efforts will be taken to reduce actual or potential smoke impacts on community areas.
