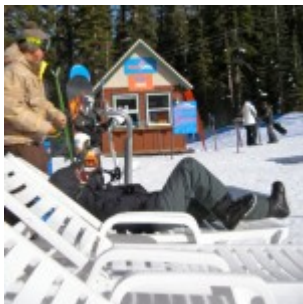


Tahoe ski resorts looking for local employees

Extrication drill keeps firefighters sharp for real emergency

By the time firefighters were done, it looked like a wrecking yard at the end of Lodi Avenue. Mangled vehicles littered the pavement that in winter is used by Caltrans crews as snow storage.

“It gave guys a chance to cut the doors off, roofs off and all the normal stuff we do in a good vehicle wreck to get to patients. They pushed the dash out to make room for people’s legs,” explained Tyler Jack, South Lake Tahoe firefighter.

As the department's vehicle extrication specialist, Jack arranged for the three days of training last week for South Lake Tahoe, Lake Valley, U.S. Forest Service and CalFire crews.

The 25 vehicles provided by individuals, Emerald Bay Towing and Welcome's Auto Body looked drivable at the beginning of the day. By the end of the exercise they were reduced to a mass of metal.

Realistic scenarios rescue personnel could encounter in the Lake Tahoe Basin were staged – including creating a rock cropping as though a vehicle had gone over Echo Summit or Emerald Bay.

An old BlueGo bus was tilted on its side for firefighters to practice rescuing large numbers of people at once.

Everyone being trained sat through a three-hour PowerPoint to learn about new vehicles and the various safety restraint systems. With airbags being in different locations, this is something rescue personnel need to understand before they are at the accident scene.

The group earned two certificates – continuing education units and a state fire marshal one that can be put toward firefighter 1 and firefighter 2 designations.

Jack is working on creating a larger training exercise next year for departments throughout California and Nevada that could involve cutting up 90 vehicles.

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El Dorado County bbq competition a bucket list item for chef

When 37-year-old Dwayne Joyner was diagnosed with kidney cancer, his wife asked him what his biggest regret would be should he not survive, besides—of course, missing her and his two young children.

“He said he had always wanted to enter a barbecue competition and, ultimately, open a catering business... and that’s how we came to create the Bucket of Nuts barbecue team,” says John Cain, Joyner’s brother-in-law. During the first weekend of October, Bucket of Nuts will join several dozen teams slated to compete in the Smokin’ for Gold KCBS sanctioned BBQ Cook-off at the El Dorado County Fairgrounds.

The competition on Oct. 2 is a part of the three-day Gateway to the Sierra Sportsmen’s & Outdoor Expo.

Cain admits that at first the competitions had a bitter-sweet undertone for the team, but recently Joyner had an MRI showing that he's cancer free.

"The first time we presented our chicken the skin slid right off and slapped the judge right in the nose. Of course that was the end of that competition," Cain said. One of the key judging points for barbecued chicken is to present "bite through skin." Cain thinks he and Joyner have finally figured out what that means and how to do it – but it's a secret.

In addition to chicken, teams will compete for prize money in a variety of categories, and one team will receive the grand trophy.

Thinning project irks North Shore residents

Hundreds of trees have been removed near Tahoe City this summer for fire prevention.

The 150-acre area that has been cleared, known as the Ward Creek Park project, is the largest of its kind in the area in recent years, according to area fire protection officials.

A spokeswoman for California State Parks said the trees have

been cleared because they've grown too thick, due to fire suppression efforts of the last 100-plus years.

"We have gotten these really dense forests that are unhealthy," said Tamara Sasaki of California State Parks.

Fight over snowmobiles on public lands

Insisting peaceful winter sports are increasingly being disrupted by noisy snowmobiles, critics are asking the government to alter the way the machines are managed on national forest land.



Snowmobile groups say the petition filed by a coalition of 90 conservation and recreation groups is an attempt to unfairly restrict their sport with unnecessary regulations.

The dispute is the latest example of mounting conflicts between those favoring motorized play on public land and others who insist the practice is bothersome and environmentally damaging.

“We acknowledge that snowmobiles are a popular winter use and that they have their place,” said Mark Menlove, executive director of Winter Wildlands Alliance, the Boise, Idaho-based group leading the effort.
