The Animal Coalition of Tahoe has planned a fun, family event where you can get a little exercise with your pooch, play poker, and maybe win some prizes.

The Sixth Annual Mutt Strut Poker Run will begin at the Super 8 Motel at 3600 Lake Tahoe Blvd. in South Lake Tahoe on Oct. 10 between 11 and 11:30am.

Participants will pick playing cards at stops along a 1.2 mile route, hoping for the best poker hands. No experience is necessary.

The fun continues after the walk, with a party at Timber Cove Marina featuring music, giveaways, raffle drawings, and contests such as best trick, best smooch, and musical sit.

Poker hands may be purchased for \$10 each, or three hands for \$25. One free raffle ticket with each poker hand purchased.

Fall training for CASA El Dorado volunteers

There are many children in South Lake Tahoe who are in need of a special "voice". These are children who have been abused or neglected and have not had a voice to speak for their own safety and needs.

The South Lake Tahoe branch of CASA El Dorado County is offering a fall training class starting in October for those adults interested in becoming a volunteer advocate and a powerful voice in Court for children.

There will be an informational meeting on Sept. 21 from 3-4pm at the EDC Superior Courthouse conference room. You will learn about CASA El Dorado and what it means to be a child advocate, pick up an application for the training and ask questions of case managers.

CASA volunteers are appointed by a judge and advocate for a child's best interest in court. Many of these children have been removed from their homes and are placed in foster care. The CASA volunteer is often the only consistent person in their life during a traumatic time, serving as an advocate, a mentor, and a friend. CASA volunteers are truly making a difference in the lives of children every day.

Women's-only backpacking course

If you've wanted to try backpacking, join the TRTA for the Women's Backpacking 101 course.

Led by volunteer Tahoe Rim Trail Association guides and experienced backpackers Ellen Goldsmith and Sue Henson, this class will introduce the basics of backpacking, trip planning, how to pack, bear awareness, campsite selection and set up, meal preparation and Leave No Trace principles.

Beginning backpackers are welcome, but should be able to hike at elevation with a 20-30 pound backpack. Participants must provide their own gear, food and clothing. Gear can be rented

for a small fee from the TRTA or outdoor stores, such as REI. A gear list will be sent to participants.

This course will start with a review of participant gear. The guides will assist in fitting participants with their packs for best performance. Participants will follow the Tahoe Rim Trail through Big Meadows toward the western shore of Dardanelles Lake for an overnight camp. The total mileage for two days is 8 miles.

Gliding may unite Minden with would-be sister city

A possible sister-city link between two “world mecca” gliding centres – Omarama in North Otago and Minden in western Nevada – is being investigated.



As well as gliding, both regions have much in common, including the recent introduction of centre pivot irrigation on to dryland areas and recreational attractions such as boating, fishing and hunting.

The proposal, from Glide Omarama's Gavin Wills, has won the support of the Omarama community and now the Ahuriri Community Board has asked the Waitaki District Council to investigate the possibility.

Wills has regularly visited Minden (population 2,500) in Douglas County for the past 12 years to fly gliders and teach cross-country soaring.

Nevada resurrecting annual tourism conference

Former Nevada Gov. Richard Bryan, who developed the first Governor's Conference on Tourism more than two decades ago,

will be honored at December's revamped two-day event.

But a representative of the Nevada Commission on Tourism's marketing committee warned that if the event is more fluff than business, it could be the state's last Governor's Conference for the state's leading industry.

"The Governor's Conference took a hiatus, and it's coming back in a new format," said Commissioner Ferenc Szony in this week's marketing committee meeting. "But when people come back to their businesses after the event, they've got to be able to say that this either taught me a lot or 'I met the right people.' If this gathering is a boondoggle, it's going to be the last one we ever do."

The conference has been the top gathering of tourism professionals in the state for 24 years. But in 2008, the event was abruptly canceled when Gov. Jim Gibbons called lawmakers into a special session to solve the state's budget woes days before the event.

Red fox thought extinct sighted near Sonora Pass

A rare Sierra Nevada red fox has been located in the Stanislaus National Forest near Sonora Pass, confirming that the species continues to survive in a region where it was thought to be extinct for nearly a century.

"It's really exciting," said Adam Rich, a wildlife biologist with the Stanislaus National Forest. "It's one of the Holy Grails for a wildlife biologist in California."

The Sierra Nevada red fox is one of the rarest mammals in North America. Until now, only about 20 were known to exist in
