Witness dies before trial of 1989 South Tahoe teen's killing

DAYTONA BEACH – A former local investigator for the state Department of Children & Families who was a key witness in an ongoing serial-murder case has died.

Cheryl Rose, 52, was found dead in her home in Ocala on Tuesday, according to the Marion County Sheriff's Office.

She had several medical issues and was prescribed numerous medications, and the Sheriff's Office is awaiting toxicology results to determine whether she could have died from an overdose, according to Detective Ryan Robbins.

Rose, who was an investigator in Daytona Beach for five years before being fired for poor conduct in April 2009, was the key witness in a trial in California against her ex-husband, Joseph Nissensohn, involving the 1989 murder of a 15-year-old South Lake Tahoe girl. The trial was set for January. He is also charged with murdering two other teens in 1981, before he met Rose, a prosecutor said.

K's Kitchen: Tofu salad worthy of an entree

Reading this month's issue of *Cooking Light* magazine took me back a bit as I read the calorie intake for several items on a Thai menu. Naively, I think of all Asian food as being rather healthy.

Thai food often contains coconut milk – not exactly a slimming agent. Fish sauce and curry paste could put you over your daily sodium needs.

Sometimes you just have to say to heck with nutrition, I want to eat what I want. But it's that awareness that is so important – that you know what you are consuming.

I was at Orchids Thai restaurant in South Tahoe recently for a business lunch. I ordered one of my favorites – Tofu Salad. (It's much better than it sounds.) I tried making it at home once before, but had not marinated the tofu long enough for it to absorb the flavors of the marinade.

I decided to try again. By no means is the recipe below Orchids' recipe. Theirs is made with cilantro and has a sweet taste to it. Plus, the tofu is deep fried. While I can see the benefit of deep frying the tofu – a firm, crispy finish – I just don't deep fry food.

How healthy is my version? Probably not very. But it is one of those salads that can be a meal. It would also work well as a side dish.

One of the nice things about what I came up with is that the marinade is used as the cooking liquid and then as the dressing.

I had a bunch of red leaf lettuce, so that's what I used. With the farmers' markets having fresh greens, I'd suggest using those. Also, I think peanuts or cashews could easily be substituted for the pecans. I happened to have an open bag of pecans, so that's why I chose them. Just remember that some nuts come with a ton of salt.

Tofu Salad

1 package firm tofu

1 bunch basil

1/8 C soy sauce

1/4 C sesame oil

3/8 C rice vinegar

2 T hot chili oil

1 bunch lettuce

6 baby carrots

1/2 C pecans

Drain tofu and cut into cubes. Place single layer in baking dish. Add chopped basil and liquids. Gently toss so all pieces of tofu are covered. Cover, marinate overnight or for several hours. Toss pieces every so often so marinade soaks in to each side of tofu.

Pour tofu mixture, including liquid, into skillet or wok on high heat. Gently stir. (Tofu may break apart a bit.) Cook until heated all the way through.

Put bite-size lettuce pieces in serving bowl. Add carrots that have been cut into matchsticks. Add chopped pecans.

If serving salad immediately and you want to serve a warm salad, pour tofu mixture over greens. If you want to serve later or a cool/room temperature salad, let tofu mixture cool.

Dugard case should be a wake-up call

Trash bin laws to deter bears not uniform in region

Bear season is approaching its peak, and Washoe County will let another summer pass without a law controlling management of the trash responsible for worsening human-bear conflicts.



While a showcase ordinance does control how people handle their garbage at Lake Tahoe's Incline Village – nothing is on the books for many other bear-prone places in Washoe County, including Verdi, Washoe Valley, Sky Tavern, Galena and Caughlin Ranch.

"The lack of an ordinance in Washoe County is an exasperating problem," said Carl Lackey, a biologist and bear expert with the Nevada Department of Wildlife.

"They're not helping the situation at all, they're really not," Lackey said. "They need to deal with it."

Ed center exposes public to importance of Tahoe wetlands

TAHOE CITY – Each facet of the Eriksson Education Center seems meticulously designed to accompany a paramount theme of the project, which is the importance of wetlands in the Tahoe area. An example of this attention to detail is the ovate pathway that makes up the outdoor section of the exhibit, consisting of pavers resting on layers of rock and soil so the

ground remains permeable and doesn't act as a blockade for stormwater.

The pathway isn't the only interesting aspect of the outdoor display. Six cedar wood-framed information tablets resting atop wrought iron legs highlight the emphasis of each section of the track, with facts and data about topics ranging from native plants and wildlife to how wetlands filter the water that eventually runs into Lake Tahoe.

One of the information tablets explains the removal of the concrete weirs in the stream, a small section of Polaris Creek, and the use of the willow logs as check dams for grade control.

The UC Davis Tahoe City Field Station was filled Saturday with tables displaying information and soliciting activities meant to engage children in the more gripping sides of science, all the while showing minute traces of the lab work normally orchestrated in the facility, such as sediment traps pushed aside and closets containing scuba gear sharing a section of the space rife with traffic.

The most riveting spectacle of the day was the unveiling of the prestigious Eriksson Education Center. The UC Davis annual Children's Environmental Science Day dovetailed into the occasion.

While giving an extensive tour of the center, Heather Segale, education and outreach coordinator for the UC Davis Tahoe Environmental Research Center, described the overall message of the exhibit.

"In the end, our choices affect the environment," Segale said. "The wetlands are an important part of keeping Lake Tahoe blue."

The perimeter of the outside exhibit is decorated with painted cardboard fish cutouts made from old political signs, a joint effort between Tahoe Lake and Kings Beach elementary schools.

The remainder of the center is indoors, with the lineage of the Eriksson Education Center being told through a dark blue wave-shaped timeline that circles the room. The timeline includes information about the history of the Tahoe City Fish Hatchery that once occupied the facility, along with the vast species of fish that have inhabited the wetlands near the building.

Wind, humidity levels combine for red flag warning

The National Weather Service in Reno has issued a red flag warning for Reno, Carson City, Minden and the surrounding foothills for July 12 from 3-9pm.

A red flag warning means that critical fire weather conditions

will occur.

Winds will be from west at 15 to 25mph, with gusts as high as 35mph. Humidity levels will drop to 10-15 percent.

The combination of dry fuels, gusty winds and low humidity will create critical fire weather conditions.
