

Learn the ropes of backpacking

If you've wanted to try backpacking but weren't quite sure how to get started, then join the TRTA for Backpacking 101.

Led by seasoned guides and Snowcamping 101 instructors Wayne McClelland and Jordan Summers, this class will go over all the basics of backpacking from what to bring and how to pack to choosing a campsite and cooking your meals.

The two will guide participants to Gray Lake on a 5-mile hike with 2,000 feet of elevation gain. You must be able to hike 5+ miles per day at elevation with a 20-30 pound backpack. Participants must provide their gear, food and clothing.

Backpacking 101 is designed to equip you with the confidence to plan a safe backpacking trip. This course will start in the classroom, but then you practice the skills you just learned in an overnight experience. Specifically, your guides/instructors will cover: trip planning; packing; basic orientation skills; bear awareness; campsite selection and set-up; cooking hints and demonstrations; principals of Leave No Trace.

Dates: July 11-12.

Life at Kindertown Day Care was briefly out of whack this morning when what sounded like an explosion in the attic forced the evacuation and fire personnel to scour the area.

Brad Piazza, division chief with the South Lake Tahoe Fire Department, said everything looked fine when they arrived.

"We couldn't tell quite what happened," Piazza said. "We secured the heater and then cleared."

Nixon's Heating and Plumbing came out as well to see what might have been the cause. The hot water heater had been disconnected Tuesday in anticipation of a new being installed, but that is not believed to have been the cause of the noise.

Kindertown owner Maria Barrows-Crist said she heard an

explosion that literally shock her and caused the lights to flicker.

The center was evacuated briefly, but everything is back to normal now.

Nevada casino winnings down in April

CARSON CITY – After two consecutive months of gains, the gambling win at casinos on the Las Vegas Strip fell slightly in April, but baccarat play and roulette registered strong increases.

The state Gaming Control Board reported today the 41 casinos on the Strip won \$437.2 million, off 0.93 percent compared to April 2009 when the win dropped by 15.8 percent.

Statewide, the 329 casinos won \$810.4 million, down 5.7 percent from a year ago. It was the second-lowest month in the past year. Only October 2009, with an \$800.4 million win, was lower.

April is traditionally a “soft month,” says Frank Streshley, chief of tax and licensing for the board. Casinos don’t schedule a lot of events around Easter, he said. But it was “softer than expected,” he added.

Spike in visits to Heavenly help Vail Resorts' bottom line

More skier visits and higher ticket prices helped lift profits for Vail Resorts Inc. in its latest quarter.

The Broomfield-based ski resort and lodgings operator and real estate company (NYSE: MTN) reported results Wednesday for the quarter ending April 30, which it regards as its fiscal third quarter.

Net income attributable to the company for the quarter was \$72.8 million, or \$1.98 cents a share, up 18.1 percent from \$61.6 million, or \$1.68 cents a share, a year earlier. Those

earnings topped analysts' expectations of \$1.83 a share, Thomson Reuters reported.
