Softball game ends with stabbing, arrest

A stabbing at a popular park in Gardnerville during a softball game sent one person to the hospital and another to jail.

On May 14 at approximately 9pm, deputies of the Douglas County Sheriff's Office arrived at Lampe Park. They found 26-year-old Brandon Robertson injured from a stab wound and separate slash wound to the chest.

He had been stabbed and cut by 20-year-old Brandon Brown, deputies said.

Robertson and Brown had been at the park playing in a softball game when they became involved in a dispute for unknown reasons.

Brown was transported to the DCSO Minden Jail where he was booked on charges of battery with a deadly weapon. His bail was been set at \$25,000.

Robertson was airlifted to Renown Medical Center in Reno.

Investigation continues into the history between Brown – a resident of the Dresslerville Indian Colony in Gardnerville – and Robertson – a resident of the Woodford's Indian Colony outside of Markleeville.

In the week or so since Attorney General Jerry Brown filed a civil lawsuit charging two former high-level officials of the California Public Employees' Retirement System with massive fraud, there's been hardly a peep from public employee union leaders whose members' retirement fund was allegedly defrauded.

There's been no loud complaint registered by the state's Democratic establishment that usually walks in lockstep with union leaders – no press release from Senate President Pro Tem Darrell Steinberg or Assembly Speaker John Pérez. There's been no word from Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger either, even though recent large pension fund investment losses have added enormously to the state's massive budget deficit.

Lake Tahoe Orchestra Academy attracts international students

The inaugural class of the Lake Tahoe Music Festival's Orchestra Academy has been selected and 36 of the nation's top music students are Lake Tahoe-bound for the 10-day intensive residency program.

Candidates were selected after a three-month audition process where more than 50 students submitted YouTube audition videos. Participating students play a diverse range of instruments, from viola and cello to flute, oboe, bassoon and timpani, and come from hometowns as far away as Spain, Ukraine and Brazil as well as from across the United States and even Lake Tahoe.

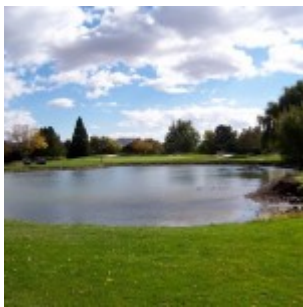
Geared toward bridging the gap between college music studies and a career in music, the academy includes rehearsals and master classes, solo instruction and practical sessions for career planning all led by professional musicians from major U.S. orchestras. The Orchestra Academy also performs at the festival's July 22 Best of Broadway and July 29 Simply Sinatra concerts along with intimate Strictly Classical concerts July 21 and 28.

Instructors for the 2010 session are Ariana Ghez, principal oboe for Los Angeles Philharmonic and Jerry Grossman, principal cello for New York's Metropolitan Opera. The festival's Artistic Director Timm Rolek serves the same role with the Academy.

Economy driving price down at regional golf courses

Golf in Northern Nevada and the Lake Tahoe area is getting cheaper, a clear indication that owners are reacting to the recession.

Many golf courses in the area have lowered their greens fees, in some cases significantly, for the 2010 season. Among the courses that have reduced their rates by 20 percent or more are D'Andrea (from \$85-\$95 to \$69), Dayton Valley (from \$70-90 to \$40), Kiley Ranch (from \$15 to \$10), Empire Ranch (from \$40-\$45 to \$27-\$32), Nakoma (from as high as \$85 a few years ago to \$55), Sunridge (from \$50-\$60 to \$40-\$50) and Tahoe Donner (from \$150 to \$120).

Borges joins select club in state Wrestling Hall of Fame

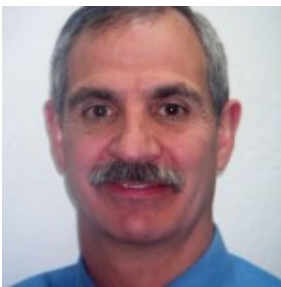

Dave Borges says he never made it to the elite category in wrestling. That changed Saturday night when he received the

Lifetime Service Award from the state Wrestling Hall of Fame.

“Dave is being recognized because of his long years of dedication and work and community service mindedness within the wrestling arena,” said John Taylor, who nominated Borges for the honor. “He has just given a lot of his time and efforts.”

Taylor also credits Borges for training referees in California and Nevada.

Borges was one of 11 people to receive the Lifetime Service Award at the May 15 dinner in Sacramento before hundreds of people. The actual hall of fame is in Clovis.

He is one of the younger inductees. He also got in on the first ballot.

For 43 of his 56 years Borges has either been a competitor or a coach. And most of that time on the mat has been in South Lake Tahoe.

“The thing that stands out for me is my teammates along the way. Even today, (Taylor) who nominated me, I wrestled in the early '80s and we are still great friends,” Borges said.

He said there is a camaraderie that grows as wrestlers compete, along with respect and lifelong attachments.

Although Borges has fleeting thoughts of competing in the senior circuit, he admits the sport is now a hobby and not a

vocation.

"I've had desires to compete in (senior nationals), but then I see who is on the list. They are tough," Borges said. "I keep it in proper perspective."

Some of the guys still competing have day jobs, like being a Marine, that are more conducive to competing regularly. Borges is a chiropractor by trade.

It was his older brothers who got him interested in wrestling when he was a seventh-grader at what was South Tahoe Intermediate School. They competed, so then he did. So did the youngest Borges brother.

It was at South Tahoe High School that he developed his skills that allowed him to compete at the university level. A hand injury prevented him from wrestling his fourth year at Pacific University in Oregon.

He calls himself an above average wrestler who could hold his own against the elite wrestlers back in the day.

As an amateur he wrestled in Japan and Korea.

"There's no money in wrestling. There are no sponsorships," Borges said. "A lot of top guys in mixed martial arts have a wrestling background."

Now Borges' emphasis is coaching kids, mostly ages 5-12.

"We have some tough wrestlers," Borges said of the youths on the South Shore.

They have a tough coach – a hall of famer, now.

Tahoe's Ruvalcaba refuses to give up on boxing dreams

In July 1989, when Ruvalcaba was all of 11-years-old, he was in the audience when future heavyweight champion Evander Holyfield stopped Adilson Rodrigues in two rounds there.

He was also present for the 1990 HBO tripleheader featuring Pernell Whitaker, Meldrick Taylor and Hector "Macho" Camacho in separate bouts, as well as for Lennox Lewis's heavyweight title defense against Henry Akinwande in 1997.
