K's Kitchen: Mother's Day brunch egg dish

How many times has mom made breakfast for you? Maybe she is still doing it. Sunday is Mother's Day – breakfast in bed or even in the kitchen would be a nice way to start the day for her.

The egg dish below was inspired by the cookbook "Best of the

Best from Arizona.” I followed the directions in the book and didn’t like the end result so I refined it, made it again and came up with something worth sharing.

Sometimes I wonder how recipes get published. Do the editors try them? I have given the cookbook away, so if you picked it up at the recent El Dorado County library book sale, be warned that I wasn’t completely impressed with the cookbook.

The original recipe calls for corn tortillas. I thought they overpowered the other flavors. I’m also partial to flour and use those in everything – so it could be my taste buds.

I like salsa with many egg dishes. This one originally didn’t call for it, but I would put it as a condiment on the table to let mom or whomever else decide for themselves.

Any cheese could be used.

Definitely grease the pan; I forgot one time. Set the timer for 45 minutes and stick a fork in it to see if any egg comes off. Cook longer at five-minute segments until the egg doesn’t stick to the fork.

To make a full meal, include some fruit on the side – not a whole apple or banana – more like a fruit salad. For meat eaters out there, diced ham, crumbled sausage or small pieces of bacon could easily be added to the egg dish.

Southwestern Egg Bake

8 corn tortillas or 4 medium size flour tortillas

$\frac{3}{4}$ pound grated Co-Jack cheese or combination of Cheddar and Monterey Jack cheeses

8 ounces diced green chiles (a can is just fine)

Sliced black olives

8 eggs

1 cup milk

$\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon chili powder

$\frac{3}{4}$ teaspoon black pepper

$\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt

Crushed corn chips

Sour cream, cilantro, salsa (optional)

Break tortillas into greased 9 x 13 pan. Mix together grated cheese, chiles, olives, eggs, milk and seasonings. Pour over tortillas and top with crushed corn chips. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour. Top with sour cream and cilantro, if desired. Makes 8-10 servings.

Crabb giving up most of his law work to have fun

Retirement is not a place Dennis Crabb wants to rush to. Instead, the long-time municipal attorney is easing into it.

In June he will have given up all his lawyerly responsibilities except for attorney for Truckee and Happy Homestead Cemetery District.

He is phasing out his job as counsel for Sutter Creek, Clean Tahoe, Tahoe Resource Conservation District, and Tahoe Transportation District. A request for proposal for an attorney for TTD will go out May 14.

Crabb is also wrapping up work for his private clients.

The 62-year-old moved to South Lake Tahoe in 1978 after spending the first five years out of law school as a deputy city attorney in Monterey. He was city attorney for South Lake Tahoe from 1979-95.

"I've been trying to cutback for the last two years," Crabb said. "No matter how hard I tried, I couldn't get below 30 hours a week. You get to the point in your career where you've been doing this long enough that it's time to go have some fun."

He and his wife, Pat, are ready to explore the world some more. She retired from the South Lake Tahoe branch of the El Dorado County Library two years ago. In September they will be spending three weeks in China.

"We have a whole list of things on the bucket list we both want to do," Crabb said.

Now they split their time between South Lake Tahoe and Reno. Their home in the Del Webb community makes winters more tolerable. There they have joined the symphony and museum. Pilates and Zumba are regular activities.

"I don't see ever leaving Tahoe permanently. The community has been very good to me," Crabb said. "I love a lot of things about it. It would be hard to not be there."

He along with a handful of other people was instrumental in forming the Tahoe Tallac Association. Crabb was on the board for 20 years, serving as president twice.

He also served a term as president of the former South Lake Tahoe Chamber of Commerce.

Crabb was attorney for South Tahoe when redevelopment was in its infancy – when the Ski Run Boulevard parcel was in bankruptcy and Heavenly Village was initially being talked about.

“I’m proud when I drive around South Lake Tahoe and recognize a lot of good things in South Lake Tahoe that would not have happened without all of my battle scars,” Crabb said.

He calls Truckee, where he has been the town attorney since 1994 when it incorporated, a special place with a philosophy that reflects that uniqueness.

Crabb has also been an integral player in the Sierra Business Council, though not in recent years. He credits SBC for instilling in other agencies the belief that “the environment and economics in the Sierra are not mutually exclusive, they are the same thing.”

He likes looking around and seeing that philosophy taking root throughout the Sierra.

Crabb expects to be fully retired in two years.

“What I have discovered is the people who successfully retire are the ones who transition into it. They gradually work less and gradually fill their time with other activities so when the move finally comes there is no gap,” Crabb said. “I’ve been blessed. I’ve had opportunities beyond my wildest imagination.”

TRPA: Grading season arrives with caution

Construction kicked into gear this week at Lake Tahoe, marking the beginning of the grading season in the basin. To protect from erosion, open digging and grading projects are limited to dry months between May 1 and Oct. 15 at Lake Tahoe.

Regardless of the date, however, grading is limited to times that soil is the most stable and activity is likely to cause the least amount of potential polluted runoff.

With some residual snow on the ground this spring, each site should be examined carefully to make sure conditions are suitable for construction activity, said TRPA officials.

Grading is the cutting or moving of soil for construction of a driveway, parking area, utility line, building or other structure. Grading also includes filling, excavation and

clearing of soil and is not permitted during periods of precipitation or when a building site is covered with snow.

Any project involving more than three cubic yards of soil disturbance requires a grading permit.

Feeding nuisance bears may be a good idea

It flies in the face of conventional wisdom, but one solution to control nuisance black bears in the United States may be to offer them snacks, one biologist says.

Especially in the western United States, black bears will often break into cars, homes, and campsites in search of food. And as humans increasingly move into bears' habitats, more bear-human interactions have been occurring, experts say.

Many scientists say feeding black bears makes the animals more aggressive, in part because the animals come to see people as food sources. But black bear biologist Lynn Rogers thinks "it may not be so clear-cut. Instead, hunger is largely to" blame for so-called nuisance behaviors, he said.

Brown, 63, was charged with one felony count and two misdemeanor counts related to his arrest in November involving marijuana and a 16-year-old female student.

Brown was arrested Nov. 6 during a routine traffic stop in South Lake Tahoe after El Dorado County sheriff's deputies said they smelled marijuana coming from the vehicle.
