The El Dorado Irrigation District and the U.S. government corrected a long-standing ownership oddity with a swap of land parcels this week.

The exchange comprised 14 parcels amounting to 755 acres.

Two parcels were at Silver Lake off Highway 88, where the ownership of land had long been the opposite of what logic would seem to dictate.

For years, the Forest Service has operated Silver Lake East

campground, partly atop land owned by the irrigation district.

"Get your vacation on" is the slogan for the South Shore campaign that begins in May. Fingers are crossed it will bring people to the area.

Gordon Horsley, the Nevada sales manager at Amador Stage Lines, remarked on the presence of social media at Thursday's two-hour forum at LTCC.

"I think it's great that we are getting that word out to local citizens about what Tahoe has to offer," Horsley said.

A new twist on Tahoe's image

This year's South Tahoe television and webspots keep the emphasis on gaming elements, but lend themselves a little more toward the active lifestyle Tahoe supports, like mountain biking, hiking, cycling, skiing and water sports.

Fishing definitely has a large draw to the area, but seemed to be left out of the LTVA marketing campaign.

Victor Babbitt, from Tahoe Fly Fishing Outfitters, said, "I didn't see one comment or view of fishing (on the advertisements). Correct me if I'm wrong, fishing is the nation's No. 1 outdoor recreational activity, especially for families."

The \$3 per night lodging tax collected in South Lake Tahoe through the Tourism Improvement District is a major source for LTVA's advertising campaign.

This will be the first ad campaign by Duncan/Channon of San Francisco for the South Shore. They were brought in a year ago to replace Mering and Associates, the Sacramento firm that created the Blue World campaign.

Geotourism

Collaboration with National Geographic brought Bob Kingman from the Sierra Nevada Conservancy and Nicole DeJonghe from the Sierra Business Council to the Tahoe Tourism Forum to showcase a geotourism. The idea of geotourism is to sustain or enhance the geographical character of a place – its environment, culture, aesthetics, heritage, and the wellbeing of its residents.

Involvement on the local level is crucial to the website's content. The website involves people living in the communities and parks. Visitors to the website can nominate areas, historic destinations, park – everything from vineyards to artists to drive tourism to other less well-known parts of the state.

Lake Tahoe Restaurant Week

Police issue warning about

fire inspector scam

South Lake Tahoe police are issuing a warning to local businesses concerning a company called National Fire & Safety Inspection Co. which may be performing fire inspections they are not licensed to perform in South Lake Tahoe.

In February, two males arrived at a local business in the Y area and advised employees they were there to conduct a mandatory fire inspection. They had uniform shirts with a logo and looked official. They completed an "inspection" and sent the business a bill for several hundred dollars.

The business did not pay the bill and instead contacted the South Lake Tahoe Fire Department for more information.

While this case is still under investigation, it appears this company is attempting to scam local businesses by arriving unannounced, performing unauthorized inspections, and billing the company hoping to get paid.

Local fire inspections are conducted by Fire Marshall Ray Zachau from the South Lake Tahoe Fire Department. There are legitimate companies that service fire alarms in businesses, but business owners should already know their legitimate alarm service providers and be expecting service/inspections.

If any business has "Fire Inspectors" show up to conduct an inspection, business owners and/or employees are encouraged to confirm the service has been requested and when in doubt, contact Fire Marshall Ray Zachau at (530) 542.6160.

A third arrest was made Wednesday in connection with the deadly stabbing that erupted during a birthday party in west Santa Rosa on Saturday night.

Edward Scuitto, 24, of Santa Rosa was arrested by South Lake Tahoe Police and the El Dorado County Sheriff’s Department in South Lake Tahoe. He was charged with two counts of attempted murder, two gang-related enhancements and a parole violation.

He was booked into El Dorado county jail and is being held without bail, according to police.

Tahoe's white pines are threatened by a nonnative, incurable fungus called white pine blister rust. The Sugar Pine Foundation finds trees that are resistant to the fungus and plants their progeny.
