

Sierra Day in Sacramento

Representatives from 19 organizations with a broad array of interests will gather in Sacramento today for the 7th Annual Sierra Day in the Capital. The message they'll bring to legislators and staff members is about the importance of the Sierra Nevada Region to the entire state.

Organizations representing cattlemen, businesses, water resources, land trusts, and other groups will walk the halls and attend meetings in the Capitol. Accompanying Sierra Day this year will be a Sierra photo gallery with works by professional photographers from throughout the region, as well as the unveiling of a permanent window box display showing the Sierra as the source for 65 percent of the state's water. Both displays are located in the hallway outside the governor's office.

DCSD settles with unions – no raises

ZEPHYR COVE – Financial issues dominated Tuesday's agenda for the Douglas County School District board of trustees.

The board on a 6-0 vote (Keith Roman was absent) agreed on a contract with the various unions that includes this school year and 2010-11. No raises will be given, but no one will be laid off because of budget cuts either. That was a critical agreement.

However, layoffs will occur because of declining enrollment. Those cuts should be finalized by the end of the month. Most likely three or four teachers will lose their jobs and possibly one classified position will be cut.

Susan Lacey, president of the Douglas County Professional Educators Association, said the dreary financial situation in the state led her group, the bus drivers, and support staff organization to settle now.

"We thought it would be better to get things wrapped up," Lacey told *Lake Tahoe News*. "We thought it better not to continue with language issues (in the contract) and just get the salary wrapped up."

The union had its eye on Washoe County where cuts have been harsh as well as Clark County because it may re-open labor negotiations.

No one is getting a raise. However, the district is funding the step increase (an automatic raise for teachers based on years of service) even though the state is not reimbursing it for this expense. The district is also funding a 0.5 percent

increase to the Public Employee Retirement System for the two-year period.

The money for this is coming from a reduction in insurance costs. Employees don't pay a penny for their health insurance – it's call covered by the district, which is self-insured. The district is going to pay close to \$90 less per month for a total of \$575/month for each of the nearly 900 insured employees. The savings will pay for the other items.

"That freed up money to deal with budget cuts," Assistant Superintendent Rich Alexander said.

Employees will not see a change in their health care plans.

"We have a budget for this year and next that keeps us solvent," Alexander said.

With Nevada looking to make further cuts to education, the future is murky for the state's school districts.

Also on the agenda Tuesday was a revision of the qualified school construction bond language that then affected Ameresco's energy savings contract.

The board expects to have a public hearing May 19 on the 2010-11 budget.

South Lake has work for painting contractors



To contractors,

I'm so glad to be able to finally release the 8-hour (1 day) Training Program we told you about. Working out the logistics took a few weeks longer than expected.

Lake Tahoe Community College is set to offer the training to all of you who expressed interest in getting some work out of the \$1.5 million grant we received to conduct Lead Based Paint remediation for 100 local homes during the next 2.5 years.

For the first 40 spots, the grant will cover the cost of the training except for \$50 (for the 8-hour course). Completion of the course will allow you to receive your EPA and HUD certifications for Lead Safe Workers. Call now to reserve your spot, or send in the registration form. After the first 40 spots are filled, participants can still get training, it will cost them between \$75-\$100.

Other training: You'll see on the flyer the Supervisor

training (1-week) course is being offered to up to 10 General Contractors – you must have a GC license to get this training. The grant will cover the registration (about \$900) for the course. You'd need to cover any hotel/personal expenses (the training is in Richmond).
