Mancuso donates \$10,000 to Tahoe City school district

During the Olympic Games last month, Procter & Gamble presented a \$10,000 check to Squaw Valley native Julia Mancuso, who was fresh from winning a silver medal in women's downhill and another in the women's Olympic combined. Procter and Gamble, Crest & Oral-B recognized Mancuso as one of five Team USA Olympians for the "Smile with U.S." campaign.

Mancuso has turned that check over to the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District.

"I achieved what I did at the Olympics in large part due to my childhood growing up in the Tahoe-Truckee region and all the

programs I was allowed to be involved in,” Mancuso, who was a student of TTUSD, told the district. “Giving back in this way feels so good and is a small token of my appreciation for all the people who helped me along the way.”

Mancuso asked for the funds to be earmarked for physical education and health. Besides skiing, Mancuso also suited up for the soccer and track teams at North Tahoe High School in Tahoe City.

Competing at the international level at such an early age made it difficult to maintain a normal high school schedule at Lake Tahoe and Mancuso ultimately landed at Park City where she attended the Winter Sports School. Mancuso’s young Tahoe-Truckee ski racing successors don’t have to move away to realize their dreams. Three years ago, TTUSD launched the North Tahoe Ski Academy.

Acknowledging the snow sports competitors’ often hectic travel schedules, the program allows students to schedule a portion of their course load at the high school, freeing them to train in the afternoons with the ski or snowboard team of their choice. Students then make up the balance of their required curriculum through independent study programs.

Chile temblor adds to Tahoe couple's vacation memories

One month ago today, Marty and Leslie DeTarr's vacation plans got shaken up a bit in a way that could never have been predicted.

The South Lake Tahoe couple was in Chile when the deadly and devastating 8.8 earthquake struck the South American country.

They were supposed to fly back to the States on March 1. That didn't happen.

"We were emailing American Airlines and the travel agent. There was no response," Marty DeTarr said. "(March 2) we got a response from the travel agent who said it might be 10 days."

The airlines said things would be back to normal at the Santiago airport in three days. That didn't happen.

"We heard later the ceiling at the airport terminal had caved in and wiped out all the computers," DeTarr said.

They didn't feel the earth move because they were about 1,000 miles from epicenter down in Patagonia near Torres del Paine.

But many of the people working at the resort they were staying at were from that country's capital and knew of family and friends who had died. One worker relayed stories about the tsunami on the small coastal town of Constitución.

"He said cars were in the street at night and the next morning they were gone. They had rolled out into the ocean," DeTarr said.

With no one coming and going, the Explora Lodge had no problem putting the DeTarrs up for a couple nights – for free.

“We weren’t in fear or concerned about our lives,” DeTarr said of the experience.

By March 3 their 3.5-week vacation was just about over. It meant riding a bus for more than four hours to Calafate, Argentina; finding their luggage at a different location across the border than where the bus parked; and then paying \$250 for a taxi ride to Buenos Aires. From there, it was a plane ride into Reno.

Ski patroller competition at Squaw

Squaw Valley is hosting the first U.S. Professional Ski Patrol Olympics April 16-18.

While several regions have hosted patrol contests in previous years, never before have ski patrollers from across the continent united for one epic competition. In honor of the 50th anniversary of the 1960 Squaw Valley Olympic Winter Games, Squaw Valley has invited patrollers from the East Coast, Rockies, Sierra Nevada and the Pacific Northwest to partake in this inaugural event. Several international patrol teams have also been invited to attend.

Competition includes an array of events from sled races and beacon competitions to simulated bomb throws. Registration costs \$89 per patroller, and tickets include a two-day lift ticket to Squaw Valley, two mid-mountain, on-snow BBQ lunches and admission to the Sunday night Awards Ceremony with live

CARSON CITY — Mrs. Joe Leavy was sitting on the bed in her home up the road from the Hoover Dam construction site when a mammoth wind on July 24, 1931, shook the house and carried her out of a window and into the sky.

Leavy was spirited away on a “magic carpet ride” on her mattress as a twister ripped apart 12 nearby homes and left seven people injured.

She “landed in a heap with the mattress, shaken up but unhurt,” according to the seemingly straight account in the Review-Journal.

“Autoists” described the tornado “as bounding along, in zig-zag fashion, coming down with its point here and there.”

USFS control burn on North Shore

U.S. Forest Service fuels management crews will conduct prescribed fire operations in the Mt. Rose area, off Highway 431, beginning March 27.
