

Thieves snag unlocked skis-snowboards

El Dorado County sheriff's deputies are noticing an upturn in the number of reported ski and snowboard thefts from ski resorts in the Lake Tahoe area.

"People just decide not to use secure facilities. People, I think, this time of year get sloppy," sheriff's Lt. Les Lovell said.

He equated it to putting 10 \$100 bills in a snowbank. It's probably not going to be there when you get back – just like that \$1,000 board or pair of skis.

The department will be working with Sierra-at-Tahoe and Heavenly Mountain Resort to set up sting operations.

Sierra said it has reduced the number of ski and snowboard thefts every year for the last five years. The resort also

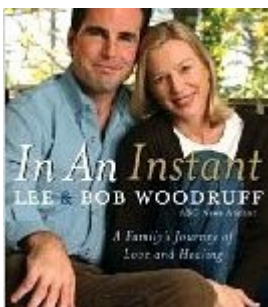
prosecutes to the fullest extent of the law. Officials would not release specific numbers.

“We did not have any more incidents than is considered normal activity on a holiday weekend,” Kirstin Cattell, spokeswoman for Sierra, said of this last weekend. “A lot of people pick up the wrong rental board and don’t realize it. By the end of the weekend it all gets sorted out because people return it any ways.”

Heavenly officials did not respond to an inquiry about thefts at the South Lake Tahoe resort.

Lovell said for the past decade snowboards were the item of preference among thieves. He said lately, though, skis are rebounding as being desirable to snag.

Powerhouse news couple gives talk at Squaw



Three years ago in Iraq , the lives of Bob Woodruff and his family changed forever when an improvised explosive device detonated near the armored vehicle in which Woodruff was traveling. He suffered a traumatic brain injury and nearly lost his life. The bomb’s devastation proved to be more than physical, however, and it had a life-changing impact on the entire Woodruff family.

The couple’s book, “In an Instant: A Family’s Journey of Love, Courage, and Healing,” documents their family’s journey to recovery following Woodruff’s roadside bomb injury. Lee Woodruff’s book “Perfectly Imperfect: A Life

in Progress,â€ tackles the universal topics of life, such as friends and family.

The former ABC World News Tonight co-anchor and current foreign correspondent Woodruff and his wife, Lee Woodruff, spoke at Truckee Tahoe Community Foundationâ€™s Queen of Hearts Womenâ€™s Fund lunch Feb. 17 at the Resort at Squaw Creek.

â€œ(We) talk about our own familyâ€™s journey to heal and also how being able to give back helped in our own healing,â€ Lee Woodruff, a contributing editor for ABCâ€™s “Good Morning America” and a freelance writer, said in a press release. â€œThe Queen of Heartâ€™s mission of philanthropy is near and dear to our own hearts.â€

Bob Woodruff is back at work reporting for ABC News shows on a variety of international and national stories with his â€œBob Woodruff Reportsâ€ unit. He has continued to cover stories that focus attention on the needs of veterans from the Iraq and Afghanistan wars.

The Woodruff family also established the Bob Woodruff Family Fund for Traumatic Brain Injury and Remind.org to raise money for members of the military who need cognitive rehabilitation and care following traumatic brain injuries while serving their country.

â€œWe got lucky as a family with our own healing,â€ Lee Woodruff said. â€œWe wanted to help those who served their country to heal with all of the resources we had.â€

Truckee Tahoe Community Foundation Queen of Hearts Women’s Fund launched in February 2006. The goal was to identify 1,000 women to give a minimum of \$1,000 and raise \$1 million within one year. The group exceeded this goal and has raised \$1.3 million to date. Queen of Hearts Women’s Fund is broad based in its funding interests making grants in nonprofit organizations ranging from arts, culture and public benefit to

health and human services.

‘The Laramie Project’ at LTCC

“The Laramie Project” is a docu-drama about the 1998 hate-crime murder of Matthew Shepard, a gay University of Wyoming student who was brutally beaten by two young men, tied to a fence, and left to die.

It will be performed at Lake Tahoe Community College’s Duke Theatre in March.

Writer-director Moiss Kaufman and actors of New York’s Tectonic Theatre Project journeyed to Laramie to interview townspeople about the horrific murder. After 400 hours of interviews, what emerges is an unusual and powerful theater piece focusing on the citizens of Laramie, how they were affected and ultimately changed by this act of brutality within their community.

Scotty Bahrke a last-minute add to Olympic team

VANCOUVER, British Columbia -â€ Complications from a recent appendectomy will keep freestyle aerialist Dylan Ferguson (Amesbury, MA) from joining his Olympic teammates in Vancouver. The U.S. Ski and Snowboard Association Wednesday

announced that aerialist Scotty Bahrke (Tahoe City, CA) will replace Ferguson. Bahrke is the brother of Shannon, who won bronze in Saturday's women's moguls.

"This is a great disappointment for Dylan, who had some of the Team's strongest results in the selection process," said USSA Vice President, Athletics Luke Bodensteiner. "At the same time, we're happy to have an athlete of Scotty Bahrke's caliber to replace him."

Bahrke, 24, has six top-10 finishes including a sixth on the Olympic hill a year ago. His best result came in the huge Moscow World Cup in 2008, where he was fifth.

"I am obviously bummed that I will not be able to compete and have my Olympic dream come true," said Ferguson from Park City, UT. "But if I am not able to compete, then I wouldn't have anyone else besides my best friend Scotty compete in my place. I know his jumps will be awesome and I am supporting him one million percent as well as the rest of the team."

Ferguson had appendicitis surgery on Feb. 3 and was expected to be cleared to travel with the team to Vancouver. But a subsequent infection prevented him from competing.

Bahrke was approved by the IOC as a replacement for Ferguson on Wednesday. He is already in Vancouver and is expected to begin training today or Thursday.

Biaggini served as commander of the Patrol, Investigations and Administration Divisions, Chief Deputy Coroner, Honor Guard Commander, Crisis Negotiation Team Supervisor, SWAT Sniper, Professional Standards Unit Leader, Lead Defensive Tactics Instructor, and supervisor of the Boat Patrol, Search and Rescue, Mounted Posse and Reserve Officer programs. Capt. Biaggini was a 1997 graduate of the FBI Academy.

Memorial services will be announced at a later date.

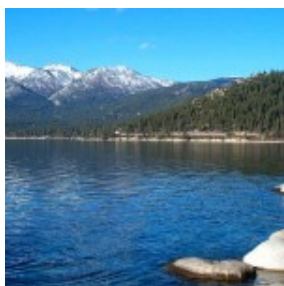
Nevada may close state parks, including Tahoe

The Nevada Legislature is thinking of closing state parks as

it considers how to patch an estimated \$900 million budget gap, a move that would save a few million dollars while killing the economies of rural towns and stunting tourism efforts across the state, opponents of the idea say.

Gov. Jim Gibbons has suggested a 10 percent budget reduction for a number of agencies, including the State Parks Division. But the Interim Finance Committee could take that a step further. At its meeting in Las Vegas on Thursday, the committee is expected to consider following the lead of
