

Squaw's Shanley dominates moguls

WINTER PARK, Colo -â€ Zak Watkins (Telluride, CO) and Laurel Shanley (Squaw Valley, CA) were on top wrapping up U.S. Freestyle Selectionsâ€™ last day of moguls competition on Friday. Watkins and Shanley showed impressive composure to win the competition.

Watkins, a young skier who likes to go fast and big, did just that in Fridayâ€™s competition besting teammates Jeremy Cota (Carabbassett Valley, ME) and Joseph Discoe (Telluride, CO) to take the top step on the podium.

â€The competition was extremely tight today,â€ explained U.S. Freestyle Moguls Coach Todd Schirman. â€Zak Watkins set the bar high early in the finals.â€

Jimmy Discoe (Ridgway, CO) and David Digravio (Farmington, ME) put together solid runs to finish fourth and fifth.

Shanley added another victory, after winning Wednesday, ahead of teammate Heidi Kloser (Vail, CO) in second. Trailing Shanley and Kloser was Alison Digravio (Farmington, ME) rounding out the podium placing third.

â€We are really excited and proud of Laurel,â€ said Schirman. â€She has proven that she is a World Cup skier and dominated the womenâ€™s event.â€

The U.S. Freestyle Selections awards the top finishers, based on their results Wednesday and Friday, World Cup starts. The starts will be allotted next month in Deer Valley and Lake Placid. The World Cup starts provides the athletes an opportunity to qualify for the Olympic team. The athletes

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Tahoe snowboarder cross competitors in middle of pack

TELLURIDE – A dynamic, never let you rest snowboardcross course courtesy of Olympic course builder Jeff Ihaksi tested the world's best SBX athletes Friday as men and women competed in qualifications for the Visa U.S. Snowboardcross World Cup at Telluride Resort in Colorado. The U.S. qualified nine men and two women into the competition, which is set for Saturday afternoon.

The U.S. men were led by none other than Olympic gold medalist Seth Wescott (Sugarloaf, ME) who was second. Three other U.S. men marked top 10 speeds with World Championship bronze medalist Nick Baumgartner (Iron River, MI) in third, 2002 Olympic halfpipe gold medalist Ross Powers (Okemo, VT) in sixth and five-time X Games gold medalist Nate Holland (Squaw Valley, CA) in ninth.

"It's great. The speed is really good across the board and I'm

pretty excited to see how the pack races go,” U.S. Snowboarding Head Coach Peter Foley said.

In the women’s race the sun started to sink in the sky, throwing shadows across what most are calling an inventive and relentless course, and making the women’s race a challenge to make the top 16. The one and only Lindsey Jacobellis (Stratton, VT) marked one of two U.S. women’s spots, finishing eighth.

“Last week she trained a lot faster, especially in comparison to the boys, than what she did today. It’s fine where she’s qualified, but it seemed like she wasn’t riding at her top speed,” Foley said.

Following Jacobellis was Salt Lake City’s Faye Gulini who rounded off the women’s field in 16th.

If the day left spectators with anything, it’s that Saturday’s World Cup, the second of five Olympic qualification events for the U.S., will be competed on a course that never gives the athletes a moment’s rest.

“It’s a super challenging course in a lot of ways. The features are sharp and kicky at first, then it goes into high speed sections. The jumps are varying in length, so you can’t just ride off of each one, you have to suck it up or pop it to get to the landing,” Foley said. “Then there are turns and you have to be a great turner in those. After that you have another set of big jumps. There’s really a wide variety of skills involved and all kinds of different challenges.”

Storms bring good news for Sierra snowpack

Last weekend's snowstorm brought a marked increase in the snowpack for the Walker River Basin, according to the figures collected by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Natural Resources Conservation Service SNOTEL monitoring sites..

Basin wide, the Walker River Basin SNOTEL sites jumped from 60-percent of yearly average on Dec. 11 to 100-percent of yearly average on Dec. 14, before falling back to 98 percent on Dec. 15.

LTN: Suicide coverage

deserves respect

People say the worst thing anyone can go through is to bury their child.

Parents of a Zephyr Cove Elementary School 11-year-old must do that after their son took his life this week.

News publications have historically shied away from covering suicides. It's personal. It's not usually news. It hits the news meter when it occurs in a public place or the person is well known.

Lake Tahoe News first reported the tragedy by publishing a press release from the Douglas County Sheriff's Department about two deaths investigators were working. We did so because it is unusual for the small South Shore agency to work two unrelated deaths in one night and because of the age of the younger person. At that time it was not known this was a suicide.

We have chosen not to publish the boy's name or do a full story on him out of journalistic integrity and respect for his family and friends.

The *Tahoe Daily Tribune* has criticized us for our original coverage. We stand by what we have done.

We don't believe suicide is preventable. The *Tribune* in its editorial today said it is.

This is wrong. And it is so incredibly callous to chastise parents, friends and teachers "to imply they should have done something more to help this youngster. Their grief is enough to last a lifetime without any publication placing blame and suggesting more should have been done.

The boy was getting help. People knew he was not happy. In the most simplistic of terms, happy, well-adjusted people don't

take their own lives.

For a child to even know what suicide is and how to accomplish it is sad in itself. To see no reason to live, especially at 11, is nearly incomprehensible.

We must remember that as humans “ even 11-year-olds “ we are capable of hurting ourselves and others.

As a community we have a choice how we react to this loss, what we learn from it and how we grow.

A child’s death, no matter how or when it happens, is a tragic loss.

Lake Tahoe News offers its condolences to the family and friends of this boy whose life ended far too soon.
