

2 unrelated deaths on South Shore

Douglas County sheriff's deputies are investigating two unrelated deaths on the South Shore of Lake Tahoe.

Deputies went to a house in the 100 block of Mason Court in Glenbrook Monday night and found a 33-year-old man unresponsive in his bed.

Deputies had been called to the residence by friends who had not heard from the man in several days.

"While on scene, deputies also discovered narcotics inside the residence. It is unknown if any of these substances had been ingested by the decedent prior to death," a press release says.

The person's name is being withheld pending notification of his family.

The second death involves an 11-year-old boy.

Deputies were called about 6:25 Dec. 14 to the 700 block of Tina Court in Stateline. The boy was found hanging in the residence.

The initial investigation reveals no evidence of foul play in either case.

“It was kind of amazing to me,” Annie Brejc said of collecting things to send the soldiers. It hit home with her how she sleeps in a warm bed every night, but the soldiers

She and her fourth-grade classmates at the Environmental Magnet School in Meyers filled box after box with items for soldiers so they would have something special to open at the holidays.

Tatum Bunnett said some of the items were every day things that she takes for granted â€” like a toothbrush and toothpaste.

Teachers Kim Ilvento and Jen Seely put the project together as they were preparing to teach a lesson about Veterans Day last month. It morphed into something bigger.

They chose a particular troop from a website because these men and women wanted ornaments for a tree theyâ€™d dubbed â€œthings worth fighting forâ€.

The fourth-graders decorated wooden star ornaments with words that they wanted the soldiers to fight for â€” things like family, freedom and peace. A picture representing what America means to the students was part of the ornament as well.

Poems by the students were also sent to the soldiers.

â€œThe outpouring from the kids was amazing,â€ Ilvento said of the donations.

Eight boxes were full of things like blankets, DVDs, cocoa, popcorn and current magazines. These were all things the soldiers had requested.

STHS security guard's arraignment set

Larry Brown, the South Tahoe High School security guard accused of smoking pot and drinking beer with a female student, is expected to be in court Dec. 30.

Brown, 63, will be arraigned on one charge of furnishing marijuana to a juvenile.

Brown was arrested Nov. 6 during a routine traffic stop in South Lake Tahoe after El Dorado County sheriff's deputies said they smelled marijuana coming from the vehicle.

Brown was placed on administrative leave by Lake Tahoe Unified School District. It's not known if he is being paid.

Young scientists needed to solve fish problem

By the end of the day, once the mystery is solved, students will have a chance to discuss solutions to some of the environmental problems they learned about and be able to apply it to their daily lives.
