15-week science program for students

Are you a high school student who is interested in learning more about science? Would you like to add a great experience onto your college resume while having a great time?

High school students interested in science may apply for the Youth Science Institute (YSI) program by Dec. 30. This afterschool program is offered on Wednesdays from 4-6pm at the Tahoe Center for Environmental Sciences in Incline Village beginning Jan. 27 and running through May 26.

UC Davis Tahoe Environmental Research Center and Space Science for Schools will be hosting the third annual Youth Science Institute. This 15-week program is for students in grades 9-11 who have an interest in exploring different scientific disciplines.

Students will conduct science experiments and activities including stream monitoring, fish dissection, earth science geology hikes, astrobiology, biochemistry, green building demonstrations, lake science on the UC Davis Research Vessel

John Le Conte and more.

The students will not only gain knowledge and skills in various scientific fields and work with scientists, but will receive opportunities for paid internships, fulfill community service hours, and receive letters of recommendation.

Eligible students for the 2010 program will be in grades 9, 10, and 11, return a completed application, have a minimum GPA of 3.0, and have a commitment to the program. All applicants will go through an interview and accepted students will need to pay tuition of \$250. Many students in past years have been able to receive both partial and full scholarships.

From South Tahoe High School's Frank Kovac, “Assuming you'll be in South Lake Tahoe (today) and assuming the skies are clear, we have a great opportunity to view NASA's International Space Station at 5:09pm. No binoculars or telescopes necessary. It will appear as a bright light traveling at about the speed of an airplane (but it does not have any blinking lights). It will fly practically over our heads through the center of the sky. It's orbiting at about 205 miles altitude and moving at over 17,000 miles per hour. P.S. Even cooler: I just noticed the Space Shuttle will appear in the sky about a minute behind the ISS.”

“We have been getting brides and grooms scheduling weddings on our sleighrides,” Dwight Borges, who took over the day-to-day operation from his parents, told *Lake Tahoe News*. “The sleigh also has wheels in case we need the sleigh to go on the streets. We have been getting calls from carolers wanting to ride in a sleigh around their neighborhood.”

The newest sleigh brings the number to six. Sleighs vary in size, with two to 20 people able to fit in one.

The 30- and 60-minute sleighrides during the day are usually available starting Thanksgiving weekend. Mother Nature has something to say about that each year.

Private and dinner rides are also offered.

The South Shore rides start on the north side of MontBleu casino in Stateline.
