

Luxury home market in Tahoe holding its own

Home values for the region's luxury homes fared better than the overall housing market in the third quarter, with some areas even seeing price gains, according to Dickson Realty's latest Luxury Trends Report.

South Lake Tahoe's luxury home market posted the biggest jump in median sales price in the region, up 83 percent from the same quarter last year at \$2.2 million. Truckee's high-end market also reported an increase, with its \$2.3 million median sales price representing a 33 percent jump. Reno-Sparks saw median sales price for its luxury homes rise to \$1.15 million, up 13 percent from the third quarter of 2008.

Information for drivers in Nevada

Motorists traveling Nevada highways during the Thanksgiving holiday may receive instant, free information on road conditions with the Nevada Department of Transportation’s

511 Nevada Travel Info System.

The system posts current Nevada road, construction, weather and accident reports to an easy-to-remember 511 phone number and www.nevadadot.com website. Before traveling, motorists simply dial 511 toll-free, 24 hours a day from within the state. Designated by major section of state road, callers then select their state route number for automated road conditions, weather forecasts, scheduled event road closures and construction updates. Out-of-state callers can dial 1-877-NV-ROADS to receive the same information.

The road listings are also available under "511 Travel Info" at NDOT's www.nevadadot.com website. On the site, a Nevada road map zooms into the user's desired state travel route, with different icons detailing construction, accidents and weather closures. Similar information is also available in easy-to-read text format. Online and by phone, users must select their chosen road by state route number.

Leadership group providing free holiday lights to businesses

RSCVA won't cut events to balance \$1.6 million deficit

The Reno-Sparks Convention and Visitors Authority is facing a projected \$1.6 million deficit for the current fiscal year, because of falling room rates and room taxes, as well as a decrease in revenues from its facilities, RSCVA documents reveal.

To balance the budget, about \$1 million will be cut from the operations budget and a portion of the water rights at its closed Northgate Golf Club will be sold, said Ellen Oppenheim, RSCVA president and CEO.

The RSCVA board of directors voted unanimously to allow Oppenheim to proceed with the plan to balance the budget late last week.
