

Snow sticking – resorts ready to open

Snow is rapidly accumulating at lake level, with it coming down even harder on the ski slopes. About 1.5 inches have fallen at the South Shore as of 4pm Friday. This is good news because Squaw, Northstar and Heavenly are expected to open Saturday.

Heavenly had to delay it’s opening a day because of high winds. Those same winds shutdown Mt. Rose on Friday.

Winds have knocked power out in parts of Northern California and Northern Nevada. And where the lights are on, they are often flickering.

Gusts of 80mph grounded flights at Reno-Tahoe International Airport Friday afternoon.

Slick roads are being blamed for a fatal accident on Interstate 80. Spin-outs were seen on both sides of Spooner Summit between Carson City and Lake Tahoe Friday afternoon.

Forecasts called for a chance of snow all weekend.

All guns firing at ritzy Northstar

It is only fitting that *æstar* is in its name.

As well as hosting the opening of the Lake Tahoe region's first 5-star resort with expanded lift access and more

snowmaking, Northstar-at-Tahoe gets in on Olympic action by launching the 2009-10 season with a biathlon course and instruction by competitive athlete Glenn Jobe at its Nordic center.

Weather permitting, the season will start Saturday.

It may be a year to mark the return of the Olympics to the West Coast in Vancouver, but Tahoe's own Northstar brings the only permanent biathlon range to the West. Appropriately so, the sport of biathlon has returned to Tahoe where it was introduced in the 1960 Olympics hosted by nearby Squaw Valley.

One of the oldest winter sports, biathlon's roots come from the military when troops skied then shot at the enemy. Now the tracks range in distances from 7.5 to 20 kilometers, with points added depending on the scores of the shots. Cross country skiers glide to each target. Five targets have been installed near the caboose warming hut on Northstar's cross country trail network. Half are shot at lying down and the others standing up.

It's one of the most watched sports in the Olympics. It's huge in Europe, but it hasn't been popular in the United States because of the lack of permanent courses," said Jobe, who competed in the 1980 Olympic Games in Lake Placid, N.Y., before becoming a cross country ski coach and

instructor. He will provide private, three-hour lessons Monday through Friday for ages 13 and older at \$199 per person. Two people may get lessons for \$249.

The Sierraville resident admits to being extremely excited about Northstar installing a range and course, which will be on display for a mock race and demonstration at the resort on Jan. 10 for Olympic Heritage Week.

From gold to red

Stein who? Destination skiers who travel the globe to stop in the likes of places like Stein Eriksen's Lodge in Park City, Utah, may find more competition in luxury accommodations based on Northstar's mid-mountain. The Ritz-Carlton Highlands rolls out the red carpet next month, featuring its own Highlands Gondola to carry guests from the Village to mid-mountain where the ski-in, ski-out mountain valet experience awaits.

“The lodging pace for this winter is looking positive,” Northstar spokeswoman Jessica Van Pernis said of the Ritz inquiries.

The hotelier built the conglomerate with 170 guest rooms, 23 private residences and 25 fractional ownership units. When the guests aren't skiing or boarding, a 17,000-square-foot spa and fitness center and restaurant run by Executive Chef Traci Des Jardins is sure to keep most busy and satisfied.

On the slopes, Northstar beefed up its snowmaking capacity at the beginner teaching area located in the Highlands region. Early season conditions will play less of a factor for those itching to slide or skate out of their room or even discover how to do it. The snow surface enhancement coincides with more teaching programs and beginner terrain about twice the size as last year to further the family-oriented experience the resort is known for.

And this year, young boarders ages 4 to 12 will no longer be bored with instruction from a family member because the Burton Snowboard Academy is opening. Plus, a special development program from the introductory Northstar Training Lab can get many a skier out of the rut of bad habits.

First timers will have more to cheer about when making turns with a package for ages 13+ that includes a 2½-hour lesson, lift ticket and rental equipment for \$99. A handful of programs for novices at bargain prices have been added to increase the number of people coming on board the snow sports and to keep the interest going amid challenging economic times.

“When the snow flew, people still came skiing, despite the economy. We saw a lot of (close by booking) and visits from our drive markets – Reno, Sacramento and the San Francisco Bay Area,” Van Pernis said, echoing many resorts’ observations.

Still considered a bargain at most standards, season pass rates held their own in sales last year into this season. Adult daily lift ticket prices remain the same this year at \$79.

Mt. Rose opening \$4 million

Mt. Rose Ski Tahoe slides into another season with a new lodge set to open next month that offers a panoramic view of Washoe Valley, a feature not likely to be lost on its most faithful riders.

Skiers will be accommodated with signature food service and full bar inside the new 7,865-square-foot “Winters Creek” aka Slide Lodge that seats 150. Another 400 may take to the deck located 4,000 feet above Washoe Lake on the southeastern edge of the Slide Bowl near the Blazing Zephyr chairlift. This side of Mount Rose is known for its local following.

A mix of glass and steel materials marks a European architectural style for the \$4 million complex, a major investment in the ski industry today. Skiers and boarders who crave warmth as much as good deals, exciting events and various creature comforts will enjoy the sun’s full force against the glass panels that help to heat the lodge through solar energy.

If it’s energy one seeks out of a ski experience, Mt. Rose “which rises to 9,700 feet at its summit – plans to deliver again with some new thrills mixed in with the traditional variety. The resort is hosting a “Saturday in the Park” rail jam this Saturday in Ponderosa Park at 1pm.

When the ski area opened Halloween weekend, it was on a limited basis. On Thursday it began operations seven days a week.

On Thursdays through the winter, women on boards and two planks with season passes may take advantage of free ski

clinics as part of an overall recognition of recession-busting measures most ski resorts are trying to make.

Daily lift ticket sales fell slightly last year, but resort officials discovered that most who partake in the sport want to seize on the financial benefit of purchasing a season pass for return visits.

“We were down a bit on daily lift ticket sales, but up on season pass sales, so that tells us that our season pass holders were utilizing their passes more and sticking close to home,” Mt. Rose Ski Tahoe spokeswoman Kayla Anderson said. “We’ve had daily specials for our guests for about 15 years, so that’s nothing new. When people visit Reno or Lake Tahoe, we’d like them to check out Mt. Rose for at least one day of their vacation.”

A whole lineup of daily specials minus holidays will mark the season with bonus Mondays – \$29 with a lift ticket purchase on Saturdays and Sundays, “Over the Hill” ticket sales on Wednesdays for those over 50 running \$35 (the student discount as well) and the weekender that gives you three days to ride for \$130. The same price can grant a family a package called “Runs and Roses” that includes two adult tickets and two children’s. Youth programs have also been introduced.

The all-day adult lift ticket normally runs \$65. Half day is \$50. Season passes cost \$333.

The ski area known as Sky Tavern started operating a rope tow in 1941, and a dozen years later opened a resort named Reno Ski Bowl. During the 1960 Olympic Games at Squaw Valley the area’s Slide Mountain hosted the women’s downhill course.

South Tahoe youth stand in line for H1N1 vaccine

A line of parents and children streamed out of Bijou Community School and down the hall — all in an attempt to not get the flu.

Barton Community Hospital staff dispensed the nasal vaccination for the H1N1 flu for free to ages 2-9 on Thursday.

“I figured we might as well give it a shot. He goes to preschool and is around lots of other kids,” said Jeff Michalak after his 3-year-old son, Alex, was vaccinated. “If it can prevent him from getting sick, I might as well do it.”

Alex wrinkled his nose and clearly did not like it when nurse

Marla Handsaker-Turk put the small device in his nostril.

She and the other nurses doling out vaccines did their best to calm the youngsters, though a few were in tears even without a needle involved.

The event went from 4-8pm, but the line started forming at 2pm.

Barton received its first batch of the swine flu vaccine on Nov. 10. That allotment was doled out to health care workers.

The 600 doses for the children arrived Monday.

Barton expects to get more, but doesn't know when. The nasal vaccine is a two-part process, so all the kids who were at Bijou Thursday will repeat the process " most likely in December.

The 30 Barton employees were also using the flu clinic as a training drill " which authorities said went according to plan.

South Tahoe groups receive \$60,000

An email to association members says, "Please be advised that the Election Committee has met and reviewed this year's election. As you may be aware, the ballots for this year's election were mailed out on a Friday, and a number of members faxed their completed ballots to the STAR office over that weekend. When staff arrived on Monday morning, they immediately saw that there was a problem with the fax machine. It was out of ink, and two of the ballots were completely illegible, with 7 more were very difficult to read, or partially illegible."

Experts: Don't get excited about El Nino

Alarmists and the apathetic beware: one thing is clear when facing a tropical phenomenon like El Nino this winter – weather is not an exact science.

With a moderate El Nino predicted to bring average temperatures and slightly more precipitation, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and the 2010 Old Farmer's Almanac have at least agreed in forecasting a season of extremes with snowfall and rain events quickly giving way to warm and dry California conditions.

The latter has led to a three-year drought in the state and Lake Tahoe falling below its natural rim for only the seventh time in the 109 years that records have been kept. Since Oct. 1 – when the water year starts – it dropped below the 6,222-foot mark twice. This week the lake level fell almost a quarter inch.

Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger has declared this another drought year.

Even with a rare post-Columbus Day storm that drenched the region and brought the lake level up by 2.6 inches over the 120,000 acres, the drought-like conditions returned and allowed evaporation of all that water that equals 8.7 billion gallons.

These extremes have climatologists, ski resorts and even basic weather watchers scratching their heads.

“There are certainly more variables, or I should say, extremes. But it’s been that way since the ‘70s,” said Gary Barbato, the National Weather Service hydrologist stationed in Reno.

The “Almanac” reports a winter of shoveling in December and power outages in January followed by an early quick thaw at the end of February into March.

Another water official is concerned about the frequency of the dry years and the intensity of the storms when they do show up.

“Lake Tahoe can weather one year, but it’s harder with three, and we’ve had three in a row,” California Department of Water Resources hydrologist Morris Reuss said. “We’re hoping for a fairly decent water year.”

The average rise and fall of the lake level over the year may measure 3 feet. But when the loss totals 6 or even 9 feet over a three-year period, the pressure is applied to Mother Nature to make up the difference. And when she does, it’s sometimes too much, too fast. The runoff carries debris, sediment and silt into the watersheds. This movement into Lake Tahoe presents a whole other billion-dollar problem called lake clarity.

The Western Regional Climate Center has categorized the lake level drop as “not common, but not impossible,” said Reno climatologist Kelly Redmond, who just returned from a conference in Denver highlighting the properties of drought. The roundtable discussions included the possibilities of displaced populations in an “old-style” drought similar to, but not equal to, the Dust Bowl of the 1930s.

A report issued from NOAA this week noted October as having the sixth warmest global (land and ocean) surface temperature since 1880. The combined temperature measured 1.03 degrees Fahrenheit above the 20th century average of 57.1 F.

“With climate change, we expect a drying out of the Southwest and a wetter Northwest,” Redmond said.

Redmond, a resident expert on El Nino, indicated NOAA has remained rather “noncommittal on Lake Tahoe” facing any big winter.

“It should be slightly more wet, but not by much,” he added.

To put it into perspective, El Nino is a tropical weather phenomenon that originates off the shores of South America in

which sea surface temperatures in the eastern Pacific Ocean show a warming trend around Christmas – hence the –Christ child– Spanish name for the weather phenomenon. According to NOAA, the current El Nino has prompted ocean temperatures to rise 11 degrees Fahrenheit. This rise creates weather disturbances and storms that can slam California.

El Nino’s above average precipitation focuses on weather in the Southwest section of California, with the Lake Tahoe Basin teetering on the cusp of a rainy South and a dry Pacific Northwest.

Indeed, certain El Ninos – usually considered strong ones as in 1982-83 and 1986-87 – have produced abundant snowpack in the Sierra Nevada.

Whether it measures up to the anticipation from the scores of Tahoe die-hards who showed up in full force over the past week at Pray for Snow parties remains to be seen. –El Nino– flew off the tongues of skiers and boarders eagerly waiting winter as much as the beer, snacks and snow calls.

Either way, today’s forecast is a good start.

A winter storm warning was issued by the National Weather Service starting at 1pm and ending at 10pm Friday. Moderate to heavy snowfall measuring 8 to 16 inches along the Sierra Nevada crest above 7,000 feet and 3 to 8 inches is forecast at lake level. Near zero visibility is expected due to strong wind, which could make for hazardous driving conditions.

The calendar says winter starts Dec. 21, but Tahoe says it’s here now.
