TAHOE CITY — A 17-year-old Tahoe City youth died over the weekend after being ejected from an off-road vehicle.

Evan Norman was pronounced dead at the scene Saturday by Placer County Sheriff's deputies.

County Chief Deputy Coroner Dennis Watt said Norman died of head injuries.

Sierra's little touches make it a destination

Sierra-at-Tahoe's Huckleberry Canyon is part of those 8 minutes that's all about Lake Tahoe in Warren Miller's latest movie.

This backcountry terrain that opened last year has been accumulating white stuff since the snow started flying in September.

Located along Highway 50, Sierra expects to open some time in December. Sierra relies on the real white stuff, so opening day is dependent on Mother Nature.

Exploring the 320 acres of expert terrain in Huckleberry will be a little easier this year â€” but that doesnâ€™t mean itâ€™s for beginners or low intermediates. Free tours on Fridays at 10:15am and 1:15pm will be offered to small groups.

â€œItâ€™s to give people an introduction to the route of the canyon,â€ resort spokeswoman Kirstin Cattell said. Reservations are necessary â€” call (530) 659.7453, ext. 150.

Wider trails, bigger burgers at Heavenly

A mix of natural and man-made snow will allow Heavenly

Mountain Resort to open Friday on a limited basis.

The resort that straddles California and Nevada always strives to open before Thanksgiving “ and often hits the mark because of its state-of-the-art snowmaking system that is one of the largest in the world.

In addition to what drops from the sky, 69 percent of Heavenly’s trails are covered with another 120 inches via snow guns.

Improvement to some trails will be noticeable “ especially to snowboarders who may have had some trouble accessing places like Milky Way Bowl.

Meteor, Sky Shoot and Auto Shoot trails have all been widened.

Near Pinnacles some larger rocks are gone and wind fences are up to make it easier for groomers to get on the slope.

For a change of pace or for the non-skier, the tubing hill at 450 feet is now double the length it was, it’s four lanes and has a 65-foot vertical drop “ the same as falling four stories.

The zipline is still closed pending clearance from the U.S. Forest Service and CalOSHA after a death on the ride last

summer.

Fun areas that will be open once enough snow accumulates are the various terrain parks. More recycled features are part of the mix.

Adventure Session for \$119 a person is like hiring a guide to take skiers/boarders to areas of the mountain they might not be familiar with. Groups will be limited to a handful.

Food is a big component of what's new at Heavenly this season.

"This year we have completely reworked the hamburger," Russ Pecoraro, Heavenly spokesman said. "We sell more hamburgers than anything else."

The Epic Mountain Burger is available at all Vail Resorts owned ski areas. At Heavenly it costs \$12.95 for the two quarter-pound Angus beef patties on a gourmet bun shipped in from a Denver bakery.

Lunch value meals "entr e, side, drink" run \$9.95.

"We are trying to step up the vegetarian options. We are trying to diversify," Pecoraro said.

Heavenly relaunched its website " www.skiheavenly.com – to offer features to make people feel like they are on the slopes by integrating Google mapping.

A booking engine allows users to store a trip folder on Heavenly's site.

"You can retrieve data, share it with friends, retrieve old itineraries. There are a lot of cool aspects with that," Pecoraro said.

Heavenly is notorious for not releasing its daily lift prices until moments before it opens. Often early season is less

expensive than when the whole mountain is open. The resort's website is the place to check for pricing.

Big Bad Voodoo Daddy roars into Tahoe

Perennial Harrah's Lake Tahoe favorite, Big Bad Voodoo Daddy brings high-energy, neo-swing to the South Shore Room on Nov. 21.

Mixing 20 years of hits, holiday classics and great music from their new CD "How Big Can You Get? â€" A Tribute to Cab Calloway", BBVD is a cinch to blow the doors off the venerable showroom.

The foundation of Big Bad Voodoo Daddy was built by singer/songwriter Scotty Morris in 1989 in Ventura. Morris and his surfer buddy, drummer Kurt Sodergren, both loved swing music and the "big band" sound. They recruited string bassist Dirk Shumaker and baritone saxophonist Andy Rowley, and immediately began performing in bars and nightclubs along the California coast. They quickly became key players in the rousing revival of swing music.

Over time, the band evolved into the current seven-piece lineup which also features Glen "The Kid" Marhevka on trumpet, Karl Hunter on tenor sax and Joshua Levy on piano.

Big Bad Voodoo Daddy helped revive big band music for the '90s. They concentrated on the swinging days of the '30s, '40s and '50s, borrowing some the era's "cool cat" lingo in addition to wing tip shoes, spats, snap-brimmed hats and double-breasted zoot suits. It's no surprise that Morris

favorite singer is Frank Sinatra.

Officially launched in Los Angeles in 1992, the group quickly built up a following on the local lounge circuit, playing to Gen-Xers enamored with the kitschy charm of the original swing era and their perception of it as “cocktail nation.” This burgeoning lounge scene was captured in the hit 1996 independent comedy film *Swingers*, which featured the band and their Hollywood hangout, The Derby.

As 1997 came to a close, the band had already self-released two albums “Big Bad Voodoo Daddy” and “Whatchu’ Want for Christmas” – which were big hits and led to a major-label contract with Capitol Records. By this time, through tireless self-promotion efforts and touring, the band had developed a reputation as one of the best, most exciting live bands in the country. In February 1998, Capitol released the group’s major-label debut entitled, “Big Bad Voodoo Daddy”, which was not the same album the group had previously released on their own. “This Beautiful Life”, followed a year later.

Big Bad Voodoo Daddy is one of the few neo-swing bands to boast a gold record and alternative radio hit.
