City trying to clear the air on medicinal marijuana

The on again, off again discussion of pot dispensaries in South Lake Tahoe is on again.

The City Council plans to discuss the matter at the Nov. 3 meeting at Lake Tahoe Airport. No action is expected that day, though the council could direct staff to draft policy or an ordinance.

Three medical marijuana outlets exist within the city limits. Because state and federal law don't jive, it can create problems for local municipalities when it comes to regulating the businesses. At it stands, the three are not paying any taxes to the city – either through a business license fee or sales tax.

California and Nevada are two of the 14 states to allow medicinal marijuana use. California did so through Proposition 215, called the Compassionate Use Act of 1996.

In 2003, state Senate Bill 420 – "The Safe Access" bill that was designed to give cities and counties in California better guidelines was approved by the Legislature and took affect the next year.

Earlier this month, the Obama administration issued an edict stating federal law enforcement will not arrest people associated with or close medical marijuana establishments that are following state law.

“This is a step forward in the clarification process. Now federal law should be changed if the feds are to allow states to regulate. As long as existing federal statutes remain in place prohibiting the use, the matter is arguably muddled,” City Manager Dave Jinkens said.

On Nov. 3, the City Council is expected to discuss Proposition 215, SB420 and federal law.

“The council looks forward to receiving input from the public, medical marijuana dispensaries and any other interested party on the issue,” Patrick Enright, acting city attorney said.

Council meetings begin at 9am and are at Lake Tahoe Airport.

Winter storm preparation

Northern California’s first big storm slammed the region Oct. 13 and gave residents a warning: winter is here. Thousands of Placer County residents lost power when this system hit. Were you prepared?

Every family and home should be prepared to handle a local disaster and have the resources to survive at least three days without services.

“From our homes along the valley floor to the crest of Sierra, we’ve seen our share of disasters – wildfires, flooding, powerful winter storms, heavy snow, back-country avalanches, power outages and high winds. We should expect them,” said Rui Cunha, Director of Office of Emergency Services.

Let this early winter storm be a reminder that we all need to create a family readiness plan. Talk to your children about what to do in an emergency. Learn First Aid and CPR. You can register for classes with the American Red Cross at www.sacsierraredcross.org.

Before the next storm hits, the Office of Emergency Services offers a few hints to help prepare:

- 1) Buy and store an extra supply of drinking water. One gallon a day per person.
- 2) Have a 3-day supply of ready-to-eat nonperishable foods; a can opener, matches, knife, foil and plastic bags. Do NOT use outdoor cooking devices, such as barbecues.
- 3) Buy extra batteries and/or flashlights.
- 4) Before a storm hits, clear rain gutters, repair roof leaks and cut away branches that could fall on your house or other structures during a storm. (Don't do these chores in the middle of a storm!)
- 5) Do you have a fire extinguisher? Do all family members know how to use it?
- 6) Pack a bag with medications, first-aid supplies, blankets, warm shoes and clothing, rain gear, toiletries and personal items, household tools, list of important phone numbers, and games/toys for the kids.
- 7) Plan ahead of time how you will handle your pets; food and water for pets and livestock.
- 8) Have a battery-operated TV or radio on hand.road failure
- 9) Check what you have lying around outside. Will a strong wind blow it away or cause damage?
- 10) Know the location and how to turn off water, power,

propane and gas coming into your house.

11) Winterize your car. Keep half a tank of gas in the car, good tires and keep tools such as a shovel or scraper. Keep blankets in the car.

12) If you are exposed to freezing temperatures, remove wet clothing and immediately warm up with hot soup and a blanket. Avoid caffeine and alcohol.

13) Recognize symptoms of exposure: dizziness, exhaustion and shivering are signs of hypothermia. Skin discoloration and numbness are signs of frostbite.

Stay well informed. Turn on the radio or TV news or visit online media websites for emergency information, instruction or warnings.

Sheriff Neves talks about resignation

El Dorado County Sheriff Jeff Neves is resigning in December, more than a year before his term ends.

He told *Lake Tahoe News* on Tuesday morning it has everything to do with wanting to spend more time with his family “to make up for missed anniversaries and birthdays celebrated without him.

Some speculate the reason Neves is leaving is so the candidate he wants to replace him will have a leg-up in the June 2010 primary.

To that theory, Neves said he believes the Board of Supervisors will not appoint one of the seven candidates who has declared his candidacy for the 2010 sheriff's race. However, his resignation letter strongly urges them to appoint a captain in the department. Neves on Tuesday said he believes the board will appoint Undersheriff Fred Kollar to fill out the remainder of the term.

Neves's Oct. 23 resignation letter to the Board of Supervisors didn't say much despite filling an entire typed page. (Click letter to read his words.)

In his resignation letter Neves tells supervisors he thinks candidate Capt. Craig Therkildsen should be appointed interim sheriff. As a back up, he says Kollar would be his second choice.

Kollar says he has no desire to be sheriff except on an interim basis, and that he had intended to retire when Neves left office. If Kollar is not appointed sheriff, it's unknown if the interim top cop would keep Kollar. The sheriff appoints the undersheriff.

"I would take the job merely because we are going into a very contentious election year where several people are vying for sheriff. By putting me in you get someone who is not involved in that process," Kollar said. "I would bring

stability, continuity and hopefully keep election year politics out of the office as much as possible.â€

On top of that, as undersheriff he is integrally involved in the budget process. The county will begin working on the 2010-11 budget right after the first of the year. The fiscal year for the county begins July 1.

Kollar has been with the department for 30 years â€” with about a dozen of those years in the South Lake Tahoe office.

Supervisors are expected today to discuss in closed session the looming sheriffâ€™s vacancy because sheriffâ€™s department personnel issues were already on the agenda. Because the sheriff matter was not original on the agenda itâ€™s possible the discussion could violate the Brown Act, the state opening meeting law.

Neves, who was first elected to the highest law enforcement position in the county in 2002, months ago said he was planning to retire at the end of his second term.

Instead, his last day will be Dec. 26. After 30 years in law enforcement, all with this sheriffâ€™s department (seven years at the Lake Tahoe office), Neves said he plans to do more volunteer work and continue his work on nonprofit boards.

The sheriffâ€™s primary is in June. Itâ€™s possible more candidates could declare before then. A candidate needs 50 percent, plus one vote to win it outright; otherwise the top two finishers would be in a runoff in November, with the winner taking office in January 2011.
