Douglas County officials got a lesson in how to blow things up.

Tahoe-Douglas Fire District employees showed off the Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) vehicle and other equipment that was recently bought with a Homeland Security grant.

Courthouse dispute pits city v. county

Back room discussions are going on regarding the El Dorado County courthouse in South Lake Tahoe, with the public being kept in the dark.

Marjorie Springmeyer, whose family donated the land for a city hall that never got built, pleaded with the council this month to come clean.

“I have asked for a complete accounting on the government center,” Springmeyer said. “You sued me for city hall and then you abandoned it. I’m going to ask again or have my attorney ask for a chain of title on the government center.”

Now in her 80s, Springmeyer wants this resolved. Documents dating to the 1970s when the transaction occurred are not complete and much of what was agreed to was done verbally.

The Johnson-Springmeyer clan expected a city hall to be built where the government center is. Instead, a courthouse is there.

Another issue is a 5-acre land swap between the city and county that may not be complete. The city believes the county still owes it that acreage. Springmeyer also asked for that issue to be addressed.

Councilman Hal Cole, who owns property with Springmeyer, said he would like to accommodate Springmeyer and also wants the chain of title to be made public.

Adding to the confusion of the whole property matter is the 2002 Trial Court Facilities Act that mandates all California courthouses owned by counties become state property. The land becomes the state’s as well if the county owns it.

In the South Lake Tahoe case, the deed for the land remains the city’s. The portion of the building used as a courthouse will go to the state.

Even though this was supposed to be a simple transfer, the city in the last year has neglected to signoff on the transfer because of reasons that are discussed behind closed doors.

City officials want the 1972 land agreement resolved before signing anything. The county contends one has nothing to do with the other.

The topic was discussed in closed session by the City Council on Oct. 20 and is expected to be back there again on the Nov. 3 agenda. It's possible when the Board of Supervisors has its once a year meeting in Tahoe on Nov. 10, it will be on the agenda.

"We haven't heard anything from the city," Supervisor Norma Santiago said in an Oct. 21 email.

"At this time, I am unable to provide you with information regarding this matter. I am sorry that I cannot be of more help at this time," City Manager Dave Jinkens said in an Oct. 22 email.

Quality child cares makes a difference

Research shows that parents who know their children are being cared for in a safe and healthy environment are better able to perform on the job. This research is not a surprise to any

parent who has looked for quality child care for their child. In response to many recent calls to Choices for Children for information and referral assistance, here are some basics to finding quality child care.

The state Department of Social Service, Community Care Licensing Division is charged with the task of inspecting and licensing Family Child Care Homes and Child Care Centers. In order to do this, they follow a set of clearly defined regulations that are meant to keep children safe and free from harm. An abbreviated list from the Child Care Center Self Evaluation form has the following:

- Criminal Record Clearances and Child Abuse Index checks done for ALL staff

- Children are visually supervised at all times; volunteers must be supervised by a teacher

- Staff to child ratios are met at all times

- Teachers, aides and the director all meet mandated qualifications

- The maximum capacity for the facility is adhered to at all times

- Children's personal rights are protected • No corporal punishment or excessive time out

- The facility must be in good repair and no hazards or dangerous materials are accessible

- CPR and First Aid cards are up to date

- Have and maintain a Emergency Disaster Plan with a current roster of all children in care

- Post all parent notification requirements for any Type A deficiency or citation

This list is only a small example of an exhaustive set of regulations that all FCCHs and centers must follow in order to meet the state licensing mandate. The goal is to protect our most vulnerable population; our children. Do these regulations equate to quality? The most these regulations can do is ensure the health and safety of children. Quality is much bigger than just making sure the facility meets the minimum requirements. Beyond the basic health and safety requirements, the following are a list of things to look for that identifies a FCCH or Child Care Center striving for a quality environment for our children:

- Lower child to teacher ratios – the facility works to include parent volunteers or additional aides

- An environment rich in culturally sensitive materials

- Parents are encouraged to participate

- Specific age appropriate activities

- A plethora of manipulatives and learning materials for the child to choose

- Highly educated staff in Early Childhood Education and Development

- Staff who clearly enjoy working with children

- A warm and inviting atmosphere

- Clear and consistent communication with the parent about the child's day

- Children's continued growth and development monitored through accepted tools such as ECRS and Desired Results

- NAEYC accreditation

It is essential parents stay involved and active in their child's education – starting with the earliest of years.

Forest Service seeks project proposals

The U.S. Forest Service, Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit is accepting Round 11 project proposals for Lake Tahoe restoration projects authorized by the Southern Nevada Public Land Management Act (SNPLMA). Project proposal packages will be accepted through the close of business on Nov. 20.

Lake Tahoe Basin projects under SNPLMA must qualify as an Environmental Improvement Program (EIP) project and be the responsibility of the federal government (federal share responsibility); and have a willing and ready federal sponsor.

Project nominations must be consistent with one of the focus

areas in the June 2006 Federal Vision (pp. 8-9) and fit into at least one category.
