LAKE LOUISE, Alberta -- Despite another day of flat light and a late start number, Travis Ganong (Squaw Valley) powered through light snow to finish 22nd at the Audi FIS Alpine World Cup super G opener Sunday.

Two-time World Cup overall champion Bode Miller (Franconia, N.H.) finished right behind Ganong in 23rd with another promising result in his first super G after missing the 2013 season.

Norway's Aksel Lund Svindal reeled in the victory for his fifth super G victory in Lake Louise.

Four-time World Cup giant slalom champion and reigning super G World Champ Ted Ligety (Park City) was knocked off course in the difficult visibility and did not finish.

Mancuso struggles, Shiffrin shines in GS

BEAVER CREEK -- Slalom world champion Mikaela Shiffrin (Eagle-Vail, Colo.) earned her first Audi FIS Alpine World Cup giant slalom podium Sunday, taking second during the final event of the Nature Valley Raptor women's World Cup week.

After laying down an inspired first run for the roaring hometown crowd, Shiffrin produced a fluid final run that nearly snatched the win away from Jessica Lindell-Vikarby of Sweden.

Shiffrin's previous best GS result was a sixth in Soelden, Austria, to open the 2014 Olympic season.

Julia Mancuso (Squaw Valley) made the top 30, advancing to the final run in 28th, but missed a gate and did not finish her second run.

"It's definitely a step in the right direction but still a little off on time. We have a lot of races and I feel like it's tougher once you reach a certain level in your career," Mancuso said. "When you have ups and downs you have to remember that it keeps going. When you're having breakthroughs when you're younger everything seems to work a little easier. When you've been around for a long time it's hard when you're

struggling to find that extra bit of energy.”

The race was on the future site of the 2015 FIS Alpine World Ski Championships at Beaver Creek Resort.

Most insurance companies won't disclose their track record for paying out claims, making it nearly impossible to judge whether insurance is worth the money, the league says.

Opinion: AIDS becoming a forgotten disease

I saw my first AIDS case in 1981, the year the disease was identified. And for most of the time since then, I've conducted laboratory research to better understand the precise mechanisms by which the virus HIV causes AIDS.

Lately, however, I've been equally worried about a related condition that is prevalent, persistent and threatens to bankrupt us. People in my world call it AIDS fatigue.

AIDS fatigue has several telltale symptoms. One is thinking that the AIDS crisis is under control. Another is believing that AIDS is someone else's problem, while still another is assuming that antiretroviral medications cure HIV/AIDS. All three notions, unfortunately, are false.

World AIDS Day – Dec. 1 – is a great opportunity to begin treating these malignant misconceptions, which we must do to address one of the most lethal pandemics ever to strike mankind. As a global community, we are not supplying – and may not even be able to afford to supply – enough of the lifesaving drugs required to prevent an HIV infection from progressing to AIDS for all the people who need them.

Our best option is to cure this disease – thereby eliminating the need to fund a lifetime of expensive medications for tens of millions of people – while also developing a vaccine to

prevent new infections. And to do this, we must first treat AIDS fatigue with the only medicine known to address it: facts.

Wealthy Russians, Putin bicker about Olympics

In August, Russian President Vladimir Putin flew to the Black Sea resort of Sochi, where his country is spending a record \$48 billion on the 2014 Winter Olympics. A regular visitor, with an official residence in town, Putin watched mixed-martial-arts contests at Oblaka nightclub with Russian Prime Minister Dmitry Medvedev and Kazakh President Nursultan Nazarbayev.

After the first fight, the leaders suddenly were plunged into darkness for almost three minutes, giving them a taste of the blackouts that have plagued Sochi for years. Putin, poker faced when the power returned, strode into the ring to congratulate the fighters as the tournament concluded.

“Here in Russia, we have always valued and respected men who know how to stand firm to the last,” he said.

Putin is bracing for a fight of his own in the mad rush to the Feb. 7 opening ceremony, Bloomberg Markets magazine will

report in its January issue. With concerns about terrorist attacks, lack of snow and anti-gay laws dominating headlines, Sochi has endured its share of pre-Olympics tension.

Yet another, potentially longer-lasting battle is playing out behind the scenes – involving Putin's government, some of Russia's wealthiest industrialists and a state-owned bank. The government is demanding that the country's biggest companies stand firm on commitments to bankroll the games.

Contractor at center of carbon monoxide death case

Truckee police detectives expect to soon forward the carbon monoxide death case to the Nevada County District Attorneys Office.
