This event is free.

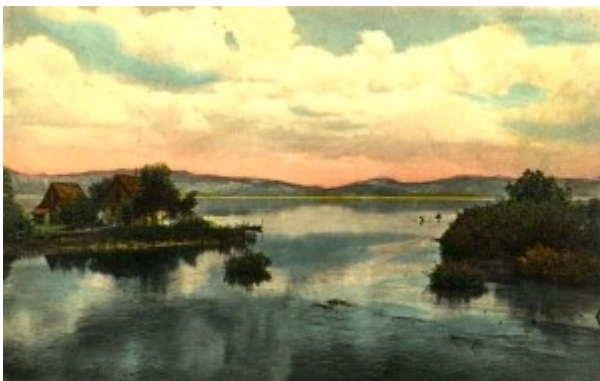

Then and now: Tahoe City didn't always have a dam



This hand-tinted photo postcard (courtesy of Theresa and Darrell Eymann) was postmarked Sept. 9, 1908, as "TAHOE, CAL" and mailed to Richmond, Calif. It depicts the source of the Truckee River at Tahoe City.

1908 was five years before the Tahoe City Dam was built to

control the top 6 feet of Lake Tahoe's surface elevation and the flow into the Truckee River.

For comparison, 105 years later, the second photo was taken in April 2013 standing on the dam.

The third photo, also one I took, shows the 100-year-old dam between Fanny Bridge on the Truckee River and the lake outlet.

Pinnacle Peak – more than a

walk in the desert

SCOTTSDALE – It's a bit of a freeway as people zip past us. They are running. Sweat drips. And the sun hasn't been up long on this last Monday in April.

Hiking in the desert this time of year means getting an early start. Temps are in the triple digits and there are no towering pine trees to provide shade. And even though some of the trail is in the shade, it's still hot.

My friend Penny lives near Phoenix and makes the decision about our start time. I whine. I don't do mornings well on a good day and I really don't relish a 6:15 start while on vacation.

It didn't take long before I was thanking her. I was hot before 7am. And to think I used to live in Vegas and loved, loved, loved the heat. Not so much anymore. I'm kind of wimpy. (It's so hot in Scottsdale now that on May 19 the park will open at 5am.)

But the hike was worth it – even with all the people – even with feeling the heat so early in the day.

The 150-acre Pinnacle Peak Park is run by the city of Scottsdale. While the starting point is at 2,570 feet, the low point is actually 2,366 feet. The highest point is 2,889 feet. But with all the up and down of the trail, the elevation gain is about 1,300 feet.

Day hikers never actually reach the summit. Rock climbers with the appropriate gear may access it.

The Sierra Club rates this a moderate hike. If it weren't for all the stair stepping, it would probably get a lower rating.

It is 3.5 miles out and back.

The trail winds around, providing an expansive view that goes for miles and miles. At the base of the peak are massive houses. Close by are lush golf courses. Farther out are the McDowell Mountains, Four Peaks and Granite Mountain.

One of the great things about the hike is all the signage on the plants. In some ways it's like being at a botanical garden.

While much of it is cactus; they are all so different. And the blooms are as stunning as the wildflowers found on a Sierra hike – just in a different way.

With all the people on the trail, the critters were hiding. But animals that have been seen along this trek include desert tortoises, rattlesnakes, gila monsters, coyotes, grey foxes, mule deer, javelina, bobcats and mountain lions. It is considered a wildlife sanctuary.

We were fortunate to have seen a javelina earlier on the Troon North Golf Course. Pinnacle Peak is a constant fixture when walking the course. The flowers and variety of cacti and other plants on the golf course are reasons to play a round – or just rent a condo and walk it with a glass of wine after the golfers have all left for the day.

Placer County seeks permits for biomass facility

The Cabin Creek biomass facility between Tahoe City and Truckee is moving forward.

Placer County Board of Supervisors at the last meeting unanimously denied the third-party appeal of the Dec. 6, 2012, Planning Commission certifications of the project's final environmental impact report and approval of the project's

conditional use permit. The county and the appellant formulated several new conditions of approval for the project which were approved.

The next step is for permits to be obtained from the Placer County Air Pollution Control District to operate the proposed facility.

One of the goals of the project is as the county strives to reduce the threat of wildfire by thinning forests, the biomass facility would generate economically-sustainable forms of energy or other beneficial products.

Placer would be the first county to implement elements of the state's Bio-energy Action Plan.

Letter: Nurses make the difference

To the community,

This week is National Nurses Week. It was May 12, 1820, that Florence Nightingale was born. Nightingale is most known for her work during the Crimean War of 1854. She and a team of 34 nurses improved the unsanitary conditions at a British base hospital, reducing the death count by two-thirds.

She became known as “the Lady with the Lamp” or the “Angel of the Crimea.” She was given these names because of her constant watch and care of the soldiers – when she and her team arrived at the hospital, not only did the soldiers need wound care, but the hospital was filthy and in unmentionable conditions.

Her writings sparked worldwide health care reform. In 1860 she established St. Thomas' Hospital and the Nightingale Training School for Nurses.

Climber airlifted from Lover's Leap

A climber was airlifted from Lover's Leap late this afternoon to Sutter Roseville with at least a broken arm.

It took several hours for search and rescue crews to get the male climber – whose name, age and hometown are unknown at this time – off the rock.

CHP Officer Chuck Brothers told *Lake Tahoe News* the climber fell about 80 feet.

El Dorado County sheriff's Deputy Greg Almos told *Lake Tahoe News* the climber was about 200 feet from the top. He was climbing Cravens Image on the western wall.

Lover's Leap is a popular outing for rock climbers because it has technical and non-technical routes. It is on Highway 50 across from Horsetail Falls.

The call came in about 12:30pm May 11 and the CalStar helicopter left the scene just before 5:30pm.

El Dorado County sheriff's deputies and SAR led the efforts, with assistance from Lake Valley Fire, California Highway Patrol and CalStar, and El Dorado County Fire.

No one else in the climbing party was injured.

Dental van to be at South Shore schools

Parents do not have to be present at the appointment. Dental services may include X-rays, cleaning teeth, applying fluoride varnish, sealants, filling cavities and removing decayed teeth that cannot be repaired.

Washoe deputies don't hesitate to write tickets

In the first four months of the year, Washoe County sheriff's deputies have issued 449 citations to drivers talking or texting on their handheld cell phone device.

Nevada prohibits the use of any handheld cell phone while driving. It is punishable by fines of up to \$250.

The department supports the state's traffic safety goal of zero fatalities on Nevada roadways.

"My office will continue enforcing traffic laws because I want Nevada roadways and highways to be as safe as they possibly can be, however, I urge those who continue to risk their lives and the lives of others to consider the most devastating consequences," Sheriff Mike Haley said in a statement. "Maybe then, drivers will understand that the consequence outweighs the importance of using a phone and change their driving behavior."
