Caesars blames slowing economy for nasty second quarter

Caesars Entertainment posted second quarter results after the bell on Monday, missing top and bottom line estimates as its losses widened. The company blamed the slowing economy, along with lower trip activity and spend per trips in their properties for the disappointing results.

The casino and hotel operator posted a net loss of \$241.7 million, down from a \$155.56 million loss a year ago. In a per share basis, Caesars' shareholder lost \$1.93, a wider loss than the 83 cents expected by analysts. Adjusted EBITDA, a measure of cash flow, slid 2.6 percent to \$512.4 million.

Caesars, which still has no properties in Macau, the world's largest casino market, saw revenues stay pretty much flat at \$2.17 billion, falling shy of the \$2.32 billion estimate.

Caesars is the parent company of Harrah's Lake Tahoe and Harveys at Stateline.

Ruptured gas lines temporarily close 2 Tahoe highways

Highway 50 was closed for a few blocks in South Lake Tahoe on Monday night because of a gas leak.

All residents and guests in hotels between Fairway and Herbert avenues were requested to shelter in place.

A backhoe had severed a 2-inch high pressure natural gas line.

The highway was closed between those streets from 11pm Aug. 6 to 1:30am Aug. 7.

At approximately 12:45am Southwest Gas was able to secure the gas line.

There was a separate Southwest Gas issue on Tuesday morning on the West Shore that caused Highway 89 to be closed for a few hours. It is now open.

Diamond K out of Texas, which was doing work for Southwest, ruptured a gas line at approximately 8:20am.

Fire near Sly Park 90% contained

The Hazel Fire near Jenkinson Lake off Highway 50 is 90 percent contained as of Tuesday morning.

The fire, which started Aug. 5 in the Sly Park area, has burned 45 acres.

The cause remains unknown.

U.S. Forest Service officials said today they plan to begin mop up operations, and continue to construct and secure a fire line. Smoke may be visible in the area today.

Overdue payments cost California millions

If you've ever paid a bill after it was due, you're familiar with late fees.

It turns out the state of California is familiar with them, too.

The state paid more than \$34.3 million in penalties for overdue bills from July 2004 through June 2011, according to new figures from California's Department of General Services, the state's business manager.

The state accrued a third of those late fees – more than \$11.7 million – in the 2010-11 fiscal year.

Some of those fees could have been avoided if former Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger and the Legislature had agreed to a budget by July 1, 2010, as required by the state Constitution,

said Eric Lamoureux, a spokesman for the Department of General Services. Lawmakers approved the budget 100 days after the start of the 2010-11 fiscal year, preventing some departments from paying their bills on time.

"We cannot speak to all the reasons all these penalties were incurred by the previous administration, but historically, late budgets have left departments unable to pay their bills on time," Lamoureux said.

K's Kitchen: Breakfast quiche good enough for family

When I do eggs they are scrambled. I might add veggies to them, but little else changes.



But I so enjoy when others do something more for breakfast.

This spring we were at the Wild Rose Inn in Genoa where owner Sue Knight concocted a great quiche. Not having a crust surely made it even a bit healthier. It certainly makes it easier to assemble.

I decided to find the recipe she had given me and make it for my mom and sister, Pam, when they were here in late July. We

all thoroughly enjoyed it.

Besides being so tasty, it is super easy to put together. Plus, depending on what veggies you have on hand or are in season, the flavor can keep changing. I used mushrooms, green onions and zucchini.

Changing the cheese would also alter the flavor.

No need to use a quiche dish. I put everything into a glass pie plate. Even a square pan would work.

Wild Rose Inn's Crustless Mushroom Quiche (6 servings)

$\frac{1}{2}$ pound mushrooms, sliced

1 bunch green onions, chopped

3 T butter or margarine

3 eggs

$\frac{1}{2}$ C, plus 1 T Biscuit mix

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt

$\frac{1}{4}$ tsp pepper

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp nutmeg

$1\frac{1}{2}$ C milk

$1\frac{1}{2}$ C shredded Monterey jack cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sauté mushrooms and onions in butter or margarine. In a large bowl, beat eggs. Add Biscuit mix, salt, pepper, and nutmeg; beat 1 minute.

Slowly add milk to egg mixture and blend thoroughly.

Place half of the mushrooms and onions in the bottom of a greased 9-inch quiche dish. Top with cheese, followed by

remaining mushrooms and onions. Pour egg mixture over top.

Bake for 30 to 35 minutes, until set.

Friends' tips, radio still drive musical choices

The digital revolution may not be as revolutionary as believed, according to a music survey that found listeners more in tune with friends' tips and radio than blogs and social networking.

The Nielsen study shows that file sharing, legal and illicit, is not a primary source of discovering and acquiring music, and that only 10 percent of fans share music on social network sites. Those uploading music: 8 percent.

Positive recommendations from friends are most likely to influence music purchases for 57 percent of respondents, compared to the 27 percent who prefer music blogs and chat rooms.

Data were collected from 3,000 online surveys for the Nielsen Music 360 Study, a comprehensive look at U.S. consumer interaction with music: where it's consumed, through which devices, apps and services, digital vs. physical preferences, the process of discovery, buying decisions, retailer choices, concert attendance and more.
