

Outdated restrooms being replaced by NTPUD

North Tahoe Public Utility District is going forward with new restrooms at North Tahoe Regional Park.

It will cost \$140,634 for two pre-fabricated restrooms. The completed buildings are expected to be delivered in October.

Grants from Placer County Parks Dedication Fees and internal NTPUD recreation funds are paying for the facilities.

They will replace the existing new restrooms that are more than 30 years old and do not meet current code or Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.

Nevada has money for Tahoe projects

The Nevada Division of State Lands is offering grants for projects that will preserve and restore the natural environment of the Lake Tahoe Basin.

Approximately \$350,000 generated from the purchase of Nevada Lake Tahoe License Plates will be available. Proposals that include the implementation of construction projects listed on the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency's five-year environmental improvement program list will be prioritized in this funding cycle.

Since the first license plate was purchased in 1998, the Tahoe License Plate Program has generated \$7.6 million and funded

141 projects.
