2 flu clinics in South Lake Tahoe

El Dorado County Health and Human Services is providing low-cost community flu clinics Oct. 8 from 9:30am-12:30pm at the senior center, 3050 Lake Tahoe Blvd., and at Bijou Community School, 3501 Spruce Ave. in the teacher's lounge from 3-6pm.

The seasonal influenza vaccine will be available in nasal mist and flu shot forms at the clinics. The pneumococcal vaccine (which protects against pneumonia) will also be available at the flu clinics for those who medically qualify.

The cost per vaccine is \$10, but no one will be denied service due to inability to pay; cash or check accepted.

Candidates forum on North Shore

The North Lake Tahoe Candidates and Issues Forum is Oct. 14 from 6-8:30pm at the Tahoe City Public Utility District board room on Fairway Drive in Tahoe City.

Candidates running for positions on the TCPUD board, NTPUD board, Tahoe Forest Hospital District board as well as proponents of the Tahoe Truckee Unified School District's bond issue for lakeside schools, Measure E, will be present to address the audience in a moderated question and answer

program.

The format for the evening will be to allow candidates for each agency the opportunity to provide a one-minute opening. This will be followed by questions from the moderators as well as written questions collected from the audience. Candidates will be given a one-minute response time. At the end of the Q&A time, there will be a final opportunity for a one-minute closing statement.

Nevada historic preservation grants available

The Nevada Historic Preservation Office will distribute federal grant funds to nonprofit organizations and local and state agencies throughout the state to support historic building rehabilitation or restoration, public education, surveys and planning.

The deadline for the 2015 Historic Preservation Fund grant applications is Dec. 5. Application forms are available online.

HPF grants are a 60/40 match, with 60 percent provided by the HPF and 40 percent provided by the grantee.

Applications will be reviewed in early January.
