- South Lake Tahoe is asking residents to take a Community Wildfire Protection Plan survey.

- Seventy-two Vail Resorts employees helped clean Highway 267 last week.
- Truckee has launched a second survey to collect input from the community on the Truckee Trails and Bikeways Master Plan Update. The survey will run through May 12.
- Debbie Brown is going to open a brewery-restaurant where the Swiss Chalet restaurant used to be in South Lake Tahoe.
- In April, Truckee police officers issued 22 written warnings for cell phone violations and 15 citations for cell phone violations. Of those that were warned or cited, 68 percent reported a Truckee address. Also in April, officers investigated 11 traffic accidents; none involved distracted driving.
