Audio 101 is a three-day workshop with six-hour sessions at Tahoe Production House in South Lake Tahoe.

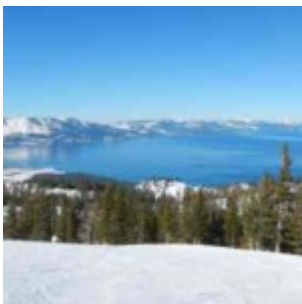

Meeting to focus on Placer County's plans for Tahoe

Placer County will host a town hall meeting to gather public comment on the recently released Community Plan Policy Framework – a document that includes draft goals and guiding

policies that will frame the Tahoe Basin Community Plan, and to provide North Shore residents with an update on the work Placer County has accomplished to date.

The meeting will be Jan. 29 at 6pm at the North Tahoe Event Center, 8318 North Lake Blvd., in Kings Beach.

The county is asking for feedback on the goals and guiding policies in the policy framework document. Comments received before Feb. 1 will be considered in preparation of the public review draft of the community plan policy document.

There will be additional opportunity for residents to comment on policies after publication of the draft Tahoe Basin Community Plan Policy document in the spring.
