Time for students to register at LTUSD

It’s time for children entering kindergarten in the Lake Tahoe Unified School District in August to be registered at their local school.

Parents are to register their children at their designated elementary school. Boundaries are available online or a map

may be picked up at the Education Center (1021 Al Tahoe Blvd.).

To be eligible for enrollment a child must be 5 years of age on or before Oct. 1. If your child was born in the months of October or November and will be 5 before Dec. 2, he or she qualifies for the two-year transitional kindergarten program.

South Tahoe Middle School registration begins Aug. 12.

South Tahoe High School registration will be Aug. 13-15.

School starts Aug. 26.

2-day class about mental health first aid

Nevada has money for water pollution projects

The Nevada Division of Environmental Protection has nearly \$1.25 million in federal funding available to provide grant assistance for projects that prevent or control nonpoint source water pollution, the leading cause of water quality impairment in Nevada.

Nonpoint source water pollution occurs when rain, snowmelt and irrigation water flows over developed or disturbed land, carrying with it contaminants including oil, sediment, pesticides, bacteria and nutrients.

All proposals must follow the guidelines for application outlined in the request for proposals, which is available for download online. State, local and tribal governments, nonprofit organizations and educational institutions are eligible to apply. A nonfederal match (cash and/or in-kind) of at least 50 percent of the total project cost is required.

Proposals will be accepted between 8am July 19 and 5pm Sept. 6.

Time to give blood in South Lake Tahoe

BloodSource is having a blood drive Aug. 5 in South Lake Tahoe from noon-6pm.

Blood drive participants will receive a parking validation for the Lake Tahoe Resort Hotel parking lot at the blood drive check in.

Donors must weigh at least 110 pounds, be at least 17 years old (16 with a signed BloodSource Parental consent form) and be generally healthy. There is no upper age limit for blood donations. Donors must bring a photo ID and should drink plenty of fluids before donating.

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Loop road proponents ready to meet about relocation

The Tahoe Transportation District is trying to figure what it will take to relocate people after acquiring their property so the loop road on the mountain side can be put in near the state line on the South Shore.

A meeting about the relocation assistance plan and a community impact assessment will be July 25 from 5-7pm at Lake Tahoe Resort Hotel in South Lake Tahoe.

One purpose of the gathering is to inform people who would be impacted by the proposed road alignment of their rights as a property owner or renter.

The loop road is what transportation officials want to build behind the east part of South Lake Tahoe, and Harrah's and MontBleu. This would be the new Highway 50. The current highway would become city streets through what is called the tourist core of the South Shore.
