Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance

The 38th annual Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance will be Father's Day – June 18-20 – at the Sierra Boat Company in Carnelian Bay on Lake Tahoe's North Shore.

"We changed the date from August to June last year for the first time, allowing our event participants a full summer's use of their cherished woodies, and providing attendees with a fun Father's Day weekend activity," Dave Olson, chairman of the 2010 Lake Tahoe Concours d'Elegance and president of the Tahoe Yacht Club Foundation, said in a press release. The Concours offers a unique opportunity for an up-close look at more than 85 antique and classic boats, with great food, live music and exhilarating wooden boat rides all part of the show experience.

In addition to the dozens of restored wooden boats from all makes, models, and years, the Marque Class for 2010 will be "Classic Glass" (up to 1964), and will consist of two subclasses: "Transitional Fiberglass," to include boats manufactured with wood hulls and fiberglass accessories such as fins, hard tops, or decking, and "Full Fiberglass," boats manufactured primarily out of fiberglass. Come feast your eyes on early models from Chris-Craft, Century, Arenacraft, AristoCraft and Correct Craft, featuring gleaming afterdecks, 'vertical' tails and swooping rear fins constructed of fiberglass.

Proceeds go to educational and charitable opportunities that enhance the expertise or understanding of maritime skills in the Lake Tahoe Basin.

Wild & Scenic Environmental Film Festival

The Tahoe Earth Day Foundation is hosting two screenings of the Wild & Scenic Environmental Film Festival at two venues.

The first screening is April 20 at the Tahoe Center for Environmental Sciences (291 Country Club Drive, on the campus of Sierra Nevada College) in Incline Village. The second screening is April 23 at the Resort at Squaw Creek (400 Squaw Creek Road) in Olympic Valley.

Each screening will begin at 7pm and feature 90 minutes of selected environmental films, chosen among hundreds screened at SYRCL's 8th Annual Wild & Scenic Environmental Film Festival in Nevada City.

The film festival is the first of several events scheduled for the Tahoe Truckee Earth Day celebration. The films will address a variety of topics, including water, climate change, energy, conservation, wildlife, and adventure. Each venue will feature different packages of film, featuring Flathead Wild in Incline Village and Generations at Squaw. Food, beverages, and raffle tickets will be available for purchase at both events.

Tickets are \$10 and advanced tickets are available at New Moon Natural Foods in Truckee and Tahoe City. Tickets will be available to purchase at the door, though seating is limited.

Photo exhibit captures off-beat Nevada



Sierra Nevada College is hosting the exhibit “Stop the Car, Dad!” a series of photographs by artist Erik Lauritzen.

While traveling the often deserted roads of Nevada, photographer Lauritzen was captivated by the evidence of human presence affecting the Western landscape. From abandoned military installations to roadside vernacular architecture, the sites Lauritzen photographed reveal a certain irony often underlying everyday encounters in the Nevada desert.

“Stop the Car, Dad!” is on display through May 21 at Sierra Nevada College in Incline Village, Prim Library, main floor.

The series “Stop the Car, Dad!” takes its name from the moment of curiosity that often accompanies the discovery of a roadside attraction. Whether bizarre, beautiful, or disturbing, these unexpected sites are strangely alluring. Lauritzen’s images in particular record places where development has given way to dilapidation. Now abandoned, these way stations are evidence of the “boom and bust” lifestyle accompanying the mining industry of Nevada.

Solitary signs and deserted buildings emerge as intriguing records of history. Lauritzen often traveled the Silver State as part of the Nevada Arts Council’s Artist in Residence Program.

Lauritzen founded the photography department at Truckee Meadows Community College and is founding director and curator of the Red Mountain Gallery.

Organized by the Nevada Arts Council, "Stop the Car, Dad!" is part of the Nevada Touring Initiative – Traveling Exhibition Program, and is funded by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Nevada State Legislature. The Nevada Arts Council is a division of the Department of Cultural Affairs.

V-Day performances on the South Shore

On April 16 (Spanish version) and April 23 (English version) at 7pm, V-Day Lake Tahoe will present a benefit reading of “A Memory, A Monologue, A Rant and A Prayer” at Opal inside of MontBleu Casino at Stateline.

This is the eighth year a V-Day event has been conducted in Lake Tahoe.

Last year more 4,200 V-Day benefits took place around the world raising funds and awareness toward ending violence against women. Since 1998, V-Day and these events have raised more than \$70 million for local beneficiaries working to end violence against women and girls.
