

Homeless youth in EDC to benefit from state group

Each year, the Child Support Directors Association of California raises funds to help support a nonprofit selected by the CSDA president. Next year's funds will support El Dorado County students identified as homeless by the McKinney-Vento Act through a charity called the Homeless Children Matter Fund.

Don Semon, director of El Dorado County's Child Support Services, is the incoming director of the state association.

The money will help students throughout the county.

Fundraising activities will begin this month and continue until the CSDA annual training conference in May. Historically, these fundraising activities have raised more than \$25,000 annually for the selected charity.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act ensures that children identified as homeless (defined as lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence) receive access to all school programs and services for which they are eligible. These services include academic support, school nutrition, and transportation to the school where they were enrolled when permanently housed. In El Dorado County nearly 1,000 enrolled students have been identified by McKinney-Vento as homeless.

Road Beat: Another great choice in luxury

Volvo's been kind of quiet lately. Facing financial difficulty after being discarded by Ford, Volvo received a stability infusion from the Chinese automaker Geely (it bought Volvo from Ford) and Volvo is on the way back, big time. The new S90 is an example of the new modern, high performance Volvos.

Instead of the slope back design of a 1947 Chrysler as in the P544, then to the three box 140 series of the late 1960s and '70s, Volvos evolved, now making extremely stylish cars; witness the new S90. Even the S80 introduced almost 15 years ago was a handsome ride. But the new S90 is a giant leap

forward.

However, careful study of its new body looks as if it was melded from the prior generation of the Kia Cadenza and an Audi A6. Nothing wrong with that, but the resemblance is strong in the grille, window line and cut off rear end. The bottom line is that the new S90 improves on those designs, while adding a few touches of its own with its subtle character line and hood treatment to bring us a very handsome body and face. It is a great looking ride but maybe the Volvo nameplate in the grille is a bit too large.

Size-wise it is a large midsize with outside dimensions of 195 x 74 x 57 inches. Its slickness is confirmed by a drag coefficient of 0.28. The rear seat feels like a limo and the trunk is huge at nearly 18 cubic feet.

With the AWD system comes Volvo's T6 2.0L turbo and supercharged inline four-cylinder engine. The T5 in the FWD is a turbo only version of the same engine and makes 66 less hp and about 40 pounds less twist. At a relatively low peak hp rpm of 5,700 rpm, this mini-mite unit cranks out 316 hp and 295 pounds of twist at anywhere from 2,200 rpm-5,400 rpm which is basically the full power range of this engine. The comparison demonstrates the power gained from the mechanical supercharger. Understand that whether the supercharging is done by a mechanical device connected to the engine or by a turbo supercharger driven by exhaust It is still supercharging which is the principle of shoving more air and fuel into each cylinder under pressure.

Performance of the new S90 is world class as 0-60 mph comes up in just 5.84 seconds. It backs up that quick off the line acceleration with a 50-70 mph simulated pass in just 2.96 seconds and the same run up a steep grade only slows that time by about a second to 4.10 seconds. Those are the times of a world class sedan. While there is no turbo lag because of the supercharger, there seems to be a disconnect in the fly by wire throttle system as there is a lag time between mashing the throttle and the engine lighting off to full tilt boogie. More on this disconnect later.

Fuel economy is EPA rated at 22/31/25 mpg city/highway/combined but the big Volvo does a bit better with a constant 70 mph on a level highway returning 34.3 mpg average. In my run from Placerville on Highway 50 to Carson City and back it averaged 28.4 mpg and overall it averaged 25

mpg with almost no time spent on the highway, substantial stop and go and all performance testing.

Suspension is double wishbone up front and an integral axle in the rear. Although 19 inch alloys are standard, my tester had the optional 20 inch alloys shod with monster 255/35 rubber. Steering is a quick electric power rack that guides the Volvo's wide track of 63.7 front and rear. The whole system can be adjusted from the cockpit from comfort to dynamic with positions for ECO in which you lose the tach or you can custom tune your settings to your liking. Dynamic felt too disconnected and artificial. In comfort the steering felt more natural and that is where most Volvo drivers will operate. Also in dynamic, the engine and tranny are remapped, holding the car in the lower gears too long, an annoyance. If you need power the eight-speed auto cog swapper will do the job for you without the engine racing along.

While there is some body roll, the Volvo has amazing grip. But the handling is still a bit disconnected meaning if attacking the twisties you will have to guide it; however, you can make some good speed at the twisty tango. Not bad for a 4,100-pound car. Turning circle is 38 feet.

Ride quality is firm maybe enhanced by the super low profile tires. In freeway cruising it is quite solid and there is little cush. In top gear the engine spins just 1,900 rpm at 70 mph and the Volvo is quiet.

Safety is Volvo amazing with about every electronic intervention, including Volvo's pilot assist, semi-autonomous driving which I let operate at close guard. It works, but I prefer human intervention. Brakes (four-wheel discs) are huge and powerful and the headlights are fantastic. I am sure the Volvo designed body will protect you like an Abrams tank, but I wasn't about to put the slightest scratch in is gorgeous flawless extra cost (\$560) light Mussel Blue metallic paint. It is a fabulous color.

Inside is a Nappa leather interior and in Volvo tradition the seats, all except perhaps the middle rear are sublime. Instrumentation is complete, Speedo, tach and ancillary gauges. With a trip info gauge pop up in the lower tach area and the center counsel is made up primarily of a huge vertical color screen with more functions than most computers. You can even bring up the owner's manual or a fuel economy analysis. It wasn't that hard to learn, 10 minutes of dual and your good to go. The only issue were the fingerprints. Volvo comes with a special cloth to clean it when it begins to look like a crime scene investigator's nirvana.

With the Inscription, there is plenty of real linear walnut inlays and the materials covering the dash and door panels are leather. This is a luxurious ride.

Volvo is out for your business. This All Wheel Drive Inscription stickers for \$56,250 plus \$995 for the boat from Gothenburg, Sweden. What and you thought it was made in Shanghai? My tester had more options including the 20-inch wheels (\$750) as 19 inch are standard, a Bowers and Wilkins Sound system (\$2,650), the vision package which includes a 360-degree surround camera (\$1,950) and more bringing up the price of admission to \$66,105. It is less than the comparable competition, but it's your decision. You should check out the fit. It could be your glove.

Why kids need exposure to germs

As a new parent, Jack Gilbert got a lot of different advice on how to properly look after his child: when to give him antibiotics or how often he should sterilize his pacifier, for example.

After the birth of his second child, Gilbert, a scientist who studies microbial ecosystems at the University of Chicago, decided to find out what's actually known about the risks involved when modern-day children come in contact with germs.

"It turned out that most of the exposures were actually beneficial," Gilbert says. "So that dirty pacifier that fell on the floor – if you just stick it in your mouth and lick it, and then pop it back in little Tommy's mouth, it's actually going to stimulate their immune system. Their immune system's going to become stronger because of it."

Etheridge's lyrics continue to resonate with fans

SPARKS – From her gritty heartland rock to the resurging heartfelt soul, Melissa Etheridge's love of her craft has stood the test of time.

It shows in concert when she switches guitars, engages her audience with a wink, a nod and a roll of the eyes as well as those times she belts out those confessional lyrics with that signature raspy voice.

Once again, she proved it in front of hundreds of adoring fans at the Nugget Saturday night in Sparks with a four-member band. At one point near the end, the singer-guitarist-songwriter clad in blue jeans and a black leather coat even joined the drummer with synchronized percussion.

Always dancing to her own drummer, Etheridge from the opener to the end gave the audience a taste of her diversity between light beams on stage with a few classics like "Hold On, I'm Coming" off her current album "Memphis Rock and Soul," a follow up to the more contemporary "This is M.E." compilation.

"I have so much music to play for you tonight," she said, with a coy smile in the beginning.

And the crowd reciprocated, raising phones to chronicle the moments. Throughout the night, many rocked out with abandon when she knocked out some of her biggest hits “I’m the Only One,” “The Way I Do,” “Come to My Window,” “I Want to Come Over,” “Resist,” “If I Wanted To” and her career-launching “Bring Me Some Water.”

With the help of good acoustics, the concert was delightfully refreshing and certainly nostalgic. After all, Etheridge is more than a singer in these last 30 years.

She’s a songwriter with 15 Grammy Award nominations – winning two in 1993 and 1995. She’s an accomplished guitarist, who can lay down the blues to accompany the searing rock anthems she’s known for. She’s a no-holds-barred activist, who has collaborated with other artists and organizations ranging from her contributions to gay causes and participation in the environmental movement. The latter led to an Academy Award for Best Original Song “I Need to Wake Up” for Al Gore’s documentary “An Inconvenient Truth.”

All of this is a far cry from those young days at age 8 when she first started strumming the guitar in Leavenworth, Kansas.

I wondered if she expected the extent of success and fame, so I asked her in an interview before the Sparks concert.

“That was the dream growing up, but it certainly was not what I thought it would be,” she told *Lake Tahoe News*.

I saw her play at the 3772 Club in Pasadena.

“Yeah, but back then we called it Vermie’s,” she said, snickering.

It was the mid-1980s. She sat on a stool with a microphone and a guitar in front of about 30 people. I couldn’t understand it. People were talking over her, and I kept urging them to be quiet. They didn’t realize they were witnessing the early stages of musical greatness.

Etheridge met a record executive through a friendship at that tiny bar.

I also followed her outdoors.

During the West Coast Women’s Music Festival in the mid-80s outside Yosemite National Park, the announcer took the stage to announce “a special treat” of a performer. When the announcer yelled “Melissa,” most in the few thousand gathered didn’t know who she was.

But after that, I’m sure they remembered who they saw. She belted out “Piece of My Heart” in pure Janis Joplin style. The audience went crazy.

Her career hit full throttle.

And in the midst of it, I witnessed it again at the 5,000-seat arena of the Harveys Outdoor Summer Concert Series about a decade ago.

There's only one Melissa. She has such a sense of a longing spirit. She is someone who knows the fragile state of love, writing about the angst like a poet. She also provides the impression of someone who would overcome life's hard knocks. This especially became apparent when she was diagnosed with breast cancer about a dozen years ago.

But don't call her a survivor.

"I'm a thriver," she told *Lake Tahoe News*. "I never thought I would be battling anything other than myself."

It makes sense. Much of her chronicling her music history Saturday night involved "redemption and resurrection." She sings it because she lived it – through failed relationships that have taken her on a journey leading to the best time of all. She's content, married with children, and still playing her music.

Indeed, she gets her strength from internal forces – but gives it out externally to others.

"I'm downright happy," she said. "I'm proud of my life's choices. They weren't always the best choices. But they're the best I could ask for."

This is what they mean by "live and learn."

She gravitates toward the intimacy of the smaller venues, recalling with affection those early days before being discovered. But the party and ride have been fun along the way.

"I've done it all. There's certainly a joy when playing to 30,000 people, but there's certainly a distance," she said.

She keeps touring because the opportunities arise, declaring her favorite venues are in Amsterdam, Montreal and Chicago, but she would agree to play in Lake Tahoe again.

Then, there are personal reasons.

"I've had two marriages and four children," she said, hinting at the financial aspect.

"This is what I love to do," she said, further admitting to having no plans "to slow down."

As long as she continues to approach new projects and more opportunity for music exploration to match her life's exploration, she intends to chug along and fight the good fight.

Her music catalog spans 13 albums since 1988.

The compilations exemplify times in her life, and she touched on those times by addressing the crowd on July 29 with an understanding of getting your heart ripped out such as the stirring "Stronger Than Me" from the aptly named "Breakdown" album of 2000.

Throughout the highly personal setbacks and challenges, Etheridge has always used her life's experiences as an opportunity to professionally share insight.

She even used a selfie stick to record her audience connection.

"Say hi to Twitter," she yelled to the crowd, adding her extra fascination with Northern Nevada: "This is Reno Sparkssssss."

She left with the most obvious words of wisdom from a life bent on peaks and valleys.

"Choose love, spread peace," she called out.

Book delves into Nevada politics

CARSON CITY – Those interested in Nevada history can check out

a significant new addition on the subject with the publication of "Mister Speaker to Madam Speaker," a labor of love for Carson City resident Cindy Southerland.

The hardbound volume is a compendium of biographies of the speakers who oversaw the Assembly in the Nevada Legislature, starting with three territorial officials who served in what was then called the House of Representatives.

It takes the reader up to the 2013 session of the Assembly, recounting all 65 speakers along the way, including two women: Barbara Buckley and Marilyn Kirkpatrick. The 1995 Assembly also had the distinction of having two speakers who shared duties – Joe Dini, a Democrat, and Lynn Hettrick, a Republican – because there was a 21-21 tie.
