

Future of Tahoe City firehouse properties to be discussed

There will be a project update meeting for the Tahoe City firehouse properties near Commons Beach in North Lake Tahoe on April 4 from 6-8pm at the former Fire Station 51.

Placer County staff will share four request for information responses received for a long-term lease and reuse development concept for the Tahoe City firehouse properties.

The county-owned Tahoe City firehouse properties include three buildings: the former North Tahoe Fire Station 51, Tahoe Community Center building and the former visitor center building.

Staff will also share an overview of the process for moving the project forward, including a summary of selected RFI submissions and an outline of next steps. RFI respondents will be present to answer questions as time allows.

The Board of Supervisors will receive an update on the project at their April meeting in North Lake Tahoe.

LTUSD slow to create safe school environment

Teachers are now human shields, ready to take a bullet for a student. And students – little kids, not just teenagers – no longer feel safe at school, a place that not so long ago was a sanctuary of sorts.

During the recent Tahoe Valley Elementary School lockdown teacher Jody Dayberry peeked into the hallway. She saw the fear in the first-graders' eyes, and the tears rolling down. One 6-year-old asked if someone had a gun and told her teacher she didn't want to die.

This is what it's like today to be a student – and a teacher – in the United States. A certain innocence has been lost.

Dayberry relayed this exchange to the school board members at their meeting this week. Fortunately, that event was a false

alarm, but for the kids it was still a scary time.

“We as educators can’t stay silent,” Dayberry said. “We can’t idly sit by and hope the odds are on our side. We must make plans. We must have procedures.”

She lobbied for training in how to talk to students and getting help with identifying at-risk students.

Talk about safety measures is cheap until someone dies.

Talk is what Lake Tahoe Unified School District is good at. There was even more talk on March 13, with board members wanting to talk even more before they pull the proverbial trigger to actually do something.

Safety in this South Shore district has been talked about for at least a decade. School shootings seem to spur the discussion. So it was in **summer 2013**. At that time the board said yes to cameras and other measures.

The cameras, well, they still aren’t all in. The wiring isn’t even in place for many. The district has more than 80 cameras and wants to triple that number.

Safety was an issue in **2010 as well**. A gate at Viking Way was talked about, but never came to fruition. Cameras were also part of the discussion then.

What the board decided to do on Tuesday was allow staff to come up with plans, and to have community meetings to gather input from the public, students and staff. In other words, more talk and no action.

The latest impetus to do more was prompted by last month’s deadly school shooting in Florida.

Shelby Lyon, South Tahoe High School’s rep on the board, articulated her peers’ opinions, saying they don’t want a fence – that now is the time to build bridges, not fences. She

presented the district with a petition signed by students regarding their stance against a fence.

STHS teacher Eric Beavers said, "Fences are not going to bring our community together. I think we put up fences and gates because we don't know what else to do."

District staff admitted fencing in STHS would be a difficult endeavor. This is the most difficult school to secure because of all the buildings, therefore points of entry.

Staff is contemplating reinforcing windows so they wouldn't be easy to shoot through, having entrances more secure so it would be near impossible to get to where students are assembled, and installing cameras in hallways so an intruder would be tracked more easily. These measures could be for all schools. There was also talk of installing panic buttons in classrooms and/or front offices that would link to law enforcement. Having more modes of communication was broached.

"We are also recommending a school resource officer at the middle school. We need it for cannabis, and safety and security," Superintendent Jim Tarwater said.

He said that person can carry the gun, but does not want teachers to be armed.

Tarwater also wants a social worker for K-3.

Creating a threat assessment management team is another idea. Members would include law enforcement, probation, mental health and others. After all, even when someone is expelled from school, they are still in the community and can be a threat.

Tahoe bears breaking into homes with people inside

NDOT working on roads in Carson Valley

Nevada Department of Transportation on March 18 will begin overnight single lane closures as part of an ongoing project to install a traffic signal on Highway 395 at Airport Road and improve other highway intersections in the Carson Valley.

One lane of northbound 395 will be closed near Johnson Lane Sunday through Thursday between 6pm-6am. Speeds will be reduced to 55 mph through the work zone. The road construction schedule is subject to change, based on weather and rate of

snow melt over the weekend.

The overnight single lane closures will continue through the coming months on 395 between Airport Road and Stephanie Way. Periodic roadway shoulder closures will also continue to be in place on southbound U.S. 395 between Stephanie Way and Airport Road over coming weeks for project-related utility work.

Drivers should anticipate a short-term closure of left-hand turns between southbound U.S. 395 and Airport Road later this spring as a signal is installed at Airport Road. Nearby detours will be available via Johnson Lane.

Program promoting Nevada products falling short

A winter storm warning remains in effect through 5am March 17. The National Weather Service in Reno say there could be another 8-15 inches at lake level, with 1-3 feet above 7,000 feet.

The Sierra Avalanche Center in Truckee has issued a backcountry avalanche warning for the greater Lake Tahoe area. That is in effect through 7am Saturday.

Edgewood drives Soroptimist out of golf tourney

Edgewood Companies this week proved it has abandoned its roots as a family cattle company that grew into an integral component of the South Shore community and is now just another

corporate entity that looks more at the bottom line than the front line.

The company officially severed a 28-year relationship with Soroptimist International of South Lake Tahoe because it wants a bigger share of the food and beverage take at the American Century Championship golf tournament.

SISLT has been affiliated with the celebrity golf tournament since the inaugural event in 1990. In that time the nonprofit service club went from operating one food tent to four. In 2017, the organization put in more than 2,500 volunteer hours at the golf tournament.

The time and hours involved keeps growing because the tournament is growing. With a record crowd of nearly 50,000, it means that there are that many more people who want to eat and drink.

Back when the tournament started Edgewood Companies was known as Park Cattle Co. **In 2013**, the Park family split its assets. Those who retained the rights to Edgewood Tahoe Golf Course brought in professional managers and the family presence was lost.

There was another management shakeup late last year with the departure of longtime General Manager Bobby King and Patrick Rhamey, who oversaw the real estate sector. Corinna Osborne, who had been director of hotel operations for Edgewood, is now the general manager.

She is who has been corresponding with Soroptimist representatives. She did not return *Lake Tahoe News'* phone calls.

Osborne asked club members to meet with her and John McLaughlin, Edgewood Tahoe president/CEO, in early February.

"We got the feeling at the meeting they had no idea what we

do,” SISLT President Pam Barrett told *Lake Tahoe News*. “The new management doesn’t seem to respect our efforts of the past to continue the relationship.”

That was the lone in-person meeting. Discussions have been by email since then.

The prior general manager at Edgewood had a hands off approach with Soroptimist. According to Barrett, the club had no problem with the relationship. They met with Edgewood folks before the tournament, knew the hours to staff the food booths, turned in the money each night to Edgewood, and returned the next day – the next year.

Edgewood supplied the food. It started with hot dogs, and last year included salads, sandwiches and burritos, wine, beer and non-alcoholic drinks.

For their efforts, SISLT received a portion of the proceeds. Usually it was just less than half of the take. Last year the group received about \$50,000.

The club and Edgewood split the cost of the equipment. Every year SISLT has paid to store these items, which it only uses at the golf tournament.

Osborne wrote to SISLT members, “As far as supplies and equipment that you have purchased, stored, etc... Edgewood has no record of such a scenario.”

Barrett said since then the club has been told it can keep the stuff.

Edgewood offered to pay the club the equivalent of \$10/hour for each person who worked this coming year. Club members would be doing so alongside Edgewood employees and possibly other nonprofit volunteers. (Nevada’s minimum wage is \$8.25/hour, California’s is \$11/hour.) This would amount to less than half of what the group made last year.

"That's a pretty measly offer," Barrett said. "They call what we get a donation. We don't think of it as a donation because we worked for it."

Lake Tahoe News was provided a statement through Weidinger Public Relations from Edgewood.

"Reflective of our long held tradition of community involvement, we are looking to benefit Tahoe-based organizations in an impactful and immediate way," CEO McLaughlin said. "In reviewing tournament food and beverage procedures the executive committee agreed the previous arrangement with Soroptimists [stet] required a more transparent process to guarantee funds are distributed annually and invested in a manner that benefits our community immediately. To that end, we're talking to other local organizations about their involvement. Soroptimists [stet] have done a wonderful job over the years, we sincerely appreciate their involvement and hope the monies raised through their efforts with the event have helped many."

Because there was no actual direct dialogue between *LTN* and Edgewood, clarifying questions could not be asked.

In response to McLaughlin's statement, Barrett said, "I don't exactly see how he can say the donations are not transparent. I think his problem is that he doesn't think Edgewood got enough credit in the media. He says the money was a donation from Edgewood. We say we worked for that money. The reason there was not a lot of publicity is that Bobby King never asked us for any publicity."

Barrett said Edgewood starting this year wanted to dictate how the club disbursed its money from the golf tournament. The group said no way.

Soroptimist groups worldwide are about enhancing the lives of women and children. That is reflected locally with how grants funds are allocated.

What Edgewood's issue is with how SISLT used its money is unknown.

Going forward the company wants to involve more nonprofits, at least at the tournament.

Osborne said to SISLT, "The tents will not be designated to any organization. These will be designated as 'Edgewood Charitable' tents. This is currently in development. Once we have selected the charities, we will have appropriate signage and messaging representing the organizations."

Edgewood as the host of the golf tournament has control over all the food and beverage operations.

It's hard to know who Edgewood will partner with since it has cut ties with other groups.

The other South Shore Soroptimist group – Soroptimist International of Tahoe Sierra – had become a partner in its sister club's service at the golf tournament.

In SITS's weekly email sent March 15 the comment in respect to the Edgewood news was, "They seem to be putting profits over the people of this community."

Edgewood has told Live Violence Free it cannot have its annual gala there this year. The Lake Tahoe Boys & Girls Club is also not welcome back to Edgewood for its fundraiser.

CTC chief receives 10 percent

pay raise

After more than an hour of deliberations, the California Tahoe Conservancy board on Wednesday voted unanimously to give Executive Director Patrick Wright a 10 percent raise.

This comes after getting two less than stellar reviews in the last year.

Even so, Wright received a 4 percent bump in pay on July 1, 2017.

The latest raise brings his annual salary to \$137,874.

Staff had recommended a 32 percent raise.

Part of the issue is the deputy director and the CTC attorney make more than Wright – and still do even with the current adjustment. The deputy makes \$151,488 and the lawyer \$149,508.

These compaction issues occur because the state gives raises, not the local board, to employees. Wright is the only CTC employee the board has any say over.

The staff report had multiple charts comparing other state executives who work in the Tahoe area, as well as local government chiefs' salaries.

So, the issue of who gets paid what is not being based on

merit, but instead with keeping up appearances, which the powers that be say is the only way to then be able to recruit for that job in the future.

Had the staff recommendation been approved, Wright's salary would have had him be the highest paid employee at the CTC – which is normal for the top person to be paid the most.

The increase is still subject to review by three other state agencies.

Wright's next review is scheduled for June.

Calif., Trump clash over raising Shasta Dam

The Trump administration is pushing forward with a colossal public works project in Northern California – heightening the towering Shasta Dam the equivalent of nearly two stories.

The problem is that California is dead-set against the plan, and state law prohibits the 602-foot New Deal-era structure from getting any taller.

But in these times of unprecedented tension between Washington and California, the state's objection to this \$1.3-billion project near the Sacramento River is hardly proving a deterrent. The Trump administration is pursuing the project with gusto, even as it seeks to make deep cuts in popular conservation programs aimed at California's water shortages.
