Money from oil drilling pays for forest improvements

Money paid to the federal government by energy companies drilling for oil and gas on the Outer Continental Shelf is helping Lake Tahoe area entities.

It was announced April 6 the national forest system received \$41.6 million from the Land and Water Conservation Fund.

Regionally the money will go to:

- Eldorado Meadows, Eldorado National Forest: The \$1.5 million will be used to leverage non-federal funds to consolidate a checkerboard pattern of land ownership in the Sierra Nevada.
- Sierra Nevada Inholdings, Tahoe and Eldorado National

Forests: The \$2 million leverages a large land donation to purchase areas threatened by development. Purchase will preserve an ancient petroglyph and conserve meadows, wetlands and streamside areas at the headwaters of the American and Yuba rivers.

- Pacific Crest National Scenic Trail, multiple national forests: California, Oregon and Washington will collectively receive \$1 million to protect key sections of the Pacific Crest Trail, stretching from Mexico to Canada, as well as migration corridors for wolves, grizzly bears, elk, deer, coyote and moose.

Vonn gives girls advice about fitness

Olympic gold medalist and World Cup alpine ski champion Lindsey Vonn said she thinks it's important for young girls to have "general strength" and be healthy overall, but when it comes to working out and weight-training, moderation is crucial and hard-core weightlifting is unnecessary.

"Push-ups, sit-ups, body-weight squats," Vonn said, "when they want to and they're ready."

Vonn was back home in Vail last weekend to get an MRI on her knee to assess whether she'll need surgery and to meet with a few of this past season's participants in the Ski Girls Rock

program at Vail Resort that Vonn inspired and designed.

“I love kids,” she said. “They’ve got so much energy and potential.”

Vonn said she wanted to be involved in a program like Ski Girls Rock – which offers ski and snowboard lessons to girls ages 5-15 in groups of no more than four per instructor, with a focus on creating opportunities to bond, build confidence and develop teamwork and social skills – because she thinks that having good role models makes a difference.

One of her idols was fellow World Cup alpine ski racer and Olympic gold medalist Picabo Street, who also was in Vail to help welcome Vonn back.

What to do when a bird hits the window

What should you do when a bird hits a window? The first thing to do is to place the bird into a brown paper sack or shoe box and close the container securely.



Get the bird in its container to some place warm and dark. If you have a heating pad, place the container half on and half off of the heating pad and set the heat on low.

After two or three hours, take the bird (and the bag or box)

into a bathroom in your house, shut the door and the toilet lid and open the bag or box.

If the bird flies out and around the room, catch it again, take it outside and release it. If it is past 7pm, keep it in the bag (or box) until morning.

If, in the morning, the bird still shows signs of not wanting to fly, hopping around, is holding its head at an angle, or its second eye lid is rapidly opening and closing, then call Lake Tahoe Wildlife Care (530.577.2273) because the bird needs additional help – and soon.

A bird has a high normal temperature. Robins are 106 degrees, hummingbirds are 115 and most raptors (hawks, owls, falcons, etc.) are 104 to 108 degrees. If the bird is allowed to sit in the snow or on the ground for any amount of time, its body heat will drop rapidly.

Birds hide their illness and injuries well. They can appear normal, even with a slight concussion. If you have a window that birds hit regularly, put up a flag or a pretty swirly decoration that twists and turns in the wind.

Tahoe City Golf Course officially changes hands

On April 3, more than 200 people turned out at the Tahoe City Golf Course to honor the Bechdolt family and the legacy they have created, and to celebrate the new public ownership of the Tahoe City Golf Course.

The direct descendants of Carl Jr. and Elsie Bechdolt all received special plaques honoring the family's contributions and legacy to the Tahoe City Community. All funding partners – Placer County, North Lake Tahoe Resort Association, Truckee Tahoe Airport District and Tahoe City Public Utility District – were recognized for their contributions to the acquisition of the golf course property.

The Tahoe City Golf Course is now under ownership of the TCPUD. A five-year lease has been signed with Duncan Golf Management to operate the golf course, bar and restaurant. The nine-hole public course will open when weather permits.

Workshops teach erosion control techniques for Tahoe

The annual workshops for erosion control best management practices in the Lake Tahoe Basin are April 20 and April 27 in Incline Village and Stateline, respectively.

The workshops train and update contractors and do-it-yourselfers in proper BMP installation procedures for the Lake Tahoe Basin, featuring outdoor presentations, exhibits and activities in addition to indoor lectures.

The Basic Contractors Workshop on April 20 is at the Tahoe Center for Environmental Sciences in Incline Village from 8am to 4:50pm and will focus on how to interpret a BMP site evaluation and install BMPs correctly in order to pass inspection.

The half-day refresher workshop, which reviews BMP installation and provides regulation updates, will be April 27 at the Tahoe Regional Planning Agency in Stateline from 8am to noon. To enroll in the Refresher Workshop, participants must have successfully completed either workshop within the past two years.

Mats effective in killing invasive clams on East Coast

LAKE GEORGE, N.Y. — Scuba divers will plunge into the chilly waters of Lake George this month to start the second year of a campaign aimed at eradicating the invasive Asian clam before it spreads through the lake.

Last year, after divers put hundreds of plastic mats over a clam-infested, five-acre patch of lake bottom north of Million Dollar Beach, it proved to be 99 percent effective in suffocating clams by denying them oxygen.

But researchers also found a few clams from under the mats that appeared neither alive nor dead, raising questions whether the creatures may enter a kind of suspended animation in cooler water to avoid suffocation, said Sandra Nierzwicki-Bauer, director of the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute's Darrin Fresh Water Institute.

"This was not something that we had seen before," she said. For now, such zombie-like clams are being labeled as "inactive" by researchers. "We are hoping that in surveying by divers this spring, we will find out what happened, if those clams eventually died or were able to recover."

First found in Lake George in the fall of 2010 and likely brought into the lake by unwitting boaters, the dime-size clams excrete nutrients that can fuel algae blooms. The sharp-edged clams can wash up dead by the thousands along shorelines, making it risky to walk in bare feet.

Capable of self-fertilization, clams can release up to 400 young a day during reproduction in May and August.

Rapidly growing colonies can carpet a lake bottom, reaching densities of thousands per square yard. Infestations have spread out of control in Lake Tahoe.
