

Final Kinder Cup Race on March 20

The Heavenly Ski and Snowboard Foundation will host the Kinder Kup Race Series finals at Heavenly Mountain Resort March 20 from 8am to 2pm.

Open to all skiers and snowboarders age 6 and under as of Dec. 31, 2010, the Kinder Kup series is designed to introduce young athletes to competition in a friendly environment. No previous race experience necessary. Entry is \$20 and includes a World Cup only competitor lift ticket.

On-site registration is available the morning of the event at the Heavenly Foundation building from 8am to 9am. Practice begins at 9am, each competitor is allowed two practice runs; the race starts at 10am. Every competitor is awarded a participation medal and a swag bag filled with goodies. Overall champions will be awarded trophies at the final event.

The foundation will serve coffee and bake sale items throughout the morning. The barbecue begins at noon and combos include a burger or hot dog, chips and a drink for a \$7 donation to the foundation.

Wind, snow and more snow blowing to Tahoe

Snow could be coming down at a rate of more than 2 inches an hour.

The Weather Service is calling for accumulations of 6 to 12 inches for Northeast California, mainly west of Highway 395 and in the basin below 7,000 feet.

For spots above 7,000 feet, which includes the passes, up to 1.5 feet could fall.

Fifteen to 25 mph sustained winds could be associated with this storm, with gusts up to 45 mph. Ridge gusts may hit 75 mph in the Sierra. This all is a recipe for whiteout conditions.

Disappearance of minnows from Tahoe concerns scientists

Lake Tahoe's native minnows appear to be dropping significantly in number, with declining water clarity and predation by non-native warm water fish possible factors in the population crash.

Densities of minnows surveyed at 26 sites around the lake declined by 58 percent between 1988 and 2009, according to new research by scientists at University of Nevada, Reno and Ohio's Miami University.

"That's not good. That's bad news," said Sudeep Chandra, a UNR fisheries expert.

"I was surprised the decline was that much," Chandra said. "The interesting question is what will be the future?"

Chandra and colleagues surveyed native fish populations in the shallow depths of Tahoe's near shore, home to minnows such as Lahontan redbase shiners and speckled dace.

Minnow numbers dropped significantly since the last such survey more than 20 years ago, with populations of redbase shiners alone dropping between 24 percent and 100 percent in 42 percent of surveyed locations.

"I would say that yes, they are in trouble," said Christine Ka Lai Ngai, another UNR researcher in the fish study. "And if we don't do anything about it, they will be in more trouble."

One possible contributor to the minnows' decline is competition or predation by non-native warm water fish including largemouth bass and bluegill.

Mancuso on top of podium in World Cup downhill

LENZERHEIDE, Switzerland – It had been a long four years since Squaw Valley's Julia Mancuso had topped a World Cup podium. She was back with vengeance today as women's competition at the 2011 World Cup Finals kicked off with the downhill and plenty of excitement in Lenzerheide, Switzerland.

Mancuso's impressive win, the fifth of her career, left no doubters as she screamed down the course 0.81 seconds faster than second-place finisher, Swiss Lara Gut. Downhill world champion Austrian Elizabeth Goergl finished third, 1.15 seconds back. Mancuso's last win came in March 2007 with a downhill victory in Tarvisio, Italy.

"It's the first time in four years, it's great to be back winning," said Mancuso. "I watched Lara ski so I knew I had to ski really fast because she nailed it. That's all it was, all or nothing this time, last downhill of the season so it feels good."

Vail's Lindsey Vonn claimed her fourth consecutive downhill globe mathematically two weeks ago in Tarvisio but was finally able to lay a big kiss on her trophy today after finishing fourth. Perhaps the biggest news of the day also followed Vonn as she took back the overall lead from German Maria Riesch (17th today) for the first time since late December. Today's results saw a 50-point swing in the overall standings as Vonn went from 23 points behind to 27 points ahead of her friend Riesch with three races (SG, GS, SL) ahead before the season ends this weekend.

"It was tough conditions out there today with really soft snow and flat light," said Vonn. "It was really easy to make

mistakes and unfortunately I made one on the top of the course in a pretty bad place and lost a lot of speed but I was able to ski the bottom well. Fourth place is still a great result, I'm really happy for Julia for winning, she skied amazingly well."

The win was enough to move Mancuso into third in the season-long downhill standings behind Vonn and Riesch in second.

Mancuso, who had the second fastest time in yesterday's training run, said the turny course fit her style.

"Leaving the start gate I knew I had to push really hard and be fast and I wanted to win," said Mancuso, the penultimate racer down the course. "I knew it would be a good opportunity here for me and those don't come around all the time so I took advantage of it and I'm just really happy.

"I've been working through injuries and working hard for the past four years and I'm finally back on the podium, it feels great," said Mancuso who was also back in the top three of any discipline standings for the first time since 2007. "I switched to Voelkl skis [this season] and everything has been working really well for me so it just gives me a lot of confidence that next year is going to be even better."

Helly Hansen's Big Mountain Battle returns to Squaw Valley for the third year on March 19. The event was postponed earlier this winter due to heavy snowfall at the resort.

The Big Mountain Battle's Squaw Valley stop is a favorite among local skiers. The event will challenge teams of two to ski and snowboard a big-mountain course on Squaw Valley's legendary terrain.
